Collaborative Efforts:

Warsop Parish Council, Mansfield District Council & Lifespring Church Join Hands for a Landmark Asset Transfer

Warsop Parish Council has been navigating a critical point in its history as it deals with significant financial constraints, prompting a thorough exploration of viable solutions for Warsop Town Hall.

Amidst mounting pressures on the council's budget, the fate of this historical landmark has been a hot topic within council meetings and led the council to delve into an array of potential options to ensure the preservation and sustainable future of Warsop Town Hall.

An extensive building survey in 2019 revealed that Warsop Town Hall requires approximately £250,000 worth of urgent repair and renovation work, worsening the financial burden already on the Parish Council. With limited resources and mounting expenses, the council faced an uphill battle to preserve the building's integrity and historical significance.

Complicating matters further, the Town Hall was bound by clauses in the agreement from Mansfield District Council. This legal restriction significantly constrained the council's ability to explore alternative avenues for alleviating the financial strain.

Also in 2019, a public consultation highlighted a strong sentiment within the community against continued financial support for the Town Hall through the precept. The results of the consultation prompted the formation of a community group known as SWITCH, which rallied local residents to find a viable solution for the upkeep of the Town Hall. Notably, the involvement of Lifespring Church, a prominent local charity known for its community-driven initiatives, further shaped the direction of the discussions surrounding the fate of the Town Hall.

Lifespring is a growing church providing quality services and facilities to contribute to the social, educational and health needs of people in the towns and villages of north Nottinghamshire. Lifespring Church operates from two sites, one in New Ollerton on Sherwood Drive and one in Church Warsop on Carter Lane. The original site in Ollerton is a well-used and accepted location in the community. The newer site in Church Warsop has enhanced its reputation through its community outreach during COVID-19.

As well as developing two places of worship, the church promotes community activities, runs a café and a charity shop called Turnaround in New Ollerton. The shop is now an integral part of the retail offer in the town.

Lifespring Church is asset rich already and does not need an additional asset to extend its spiritual work. The current facility on Carter Lane is quite adequate for prayer, Bible study and worship.

While they are a successful church, they are also a church with a social conscience and a sense of responsibility to the community. For this reason, they are seeking to redevelop Warsop Town Hall as we see it as a building with great potential for community activities.

The current church building in Church Warsop was built as a single-purpose building for Bible study, prayer and worship. With the expansion of the church's work into social engagement, the building is no longer fit for purpose. The current facilities do not provide the necessary space for further growth of community activities. The strip of land is long and narrow and would make it impossible to fit breakout rooms into the current design.

The plan is to sell the building and invest the proceeds in Warsop Town Hall if the District and Parish Councils agree to transfer the assets to Lifespring. Liz Phillips who is driving this project forward for Lifespring Church said;

"Lifespring are excited to have the opportunity to work closely with the people of Warsop Parish. There have been many people that have helped us get to this point for which we are grateful. There is much to do but together we can make the Town Hall into a thriving community hub as it once was".

In a bid to facilitate the transfer of ownership and alleviate financial strains, Warsop Parish Council made a formal request to remove the restrictive clauses from the Town Hall agreement. Subsequently, a series of meetings between the Parish Council, the Mayor, and officials from the District Council paved the way for a delegated decision, taken by Councillor Craig Whitby, to eliminate the clauses within the agreement.

All three parties are now moving forward with the asset transfer of Warsop Town Hall to Lifespring Church with the knowledge that a historical building has been saved and a new community hub created which will allow the Parish Council to be more financially responsible and proactive in the service provided to residents. Warsop Council Chairperson spoke about the project and said;

"This will make a huge difference to what we can achieve for Warsop Parish, and I would like to thank the Mayor for recognising the value of the Lifespring proposal and enabling us to take it forward. It's been a pleasure working with both Lifespring and the Mayor on this project, and I believe it will bring many benefits to our Parish".

Christmas Reflections –Have we been naughty or nice?

In celebrating Christmas, we are continuing ancient traditions that have evolved and merged over time, many having their origin in our connection with nature and the land.

Today's Father Christmas has changed form many times, from ancient links with the Green Man, a symbol of life, death and re-birth, our dependence on nature and the changing seasons, to a winter sprite, presiding over drinking, feasting and making merry. His later persona incorporates Santa Claus, the bringer of gifts to children - the Dutch Sinter Klaas rewarded children according to who has been "naughty or nice" and evolved from stories around St Nicholas, patron saint of children, from 4th Century Lycia (Turkey).

Traditional Christmas decorations are from nature, too - holly, ivy, mistletoe - with direct links to ancient religions which became incorporated into Christianity and the Christmas story - carvings of the Green Man can be found in many cathedrals and churches. Holly and Oak represent Winter and Summer; Holly was considered holy and planted in sacred places, notably churchyards. Holly and ivy were thought to ward off evil and ivy was grown on buildings to conceal them from evil spirits! Mistletoe was revered by the Druids as a cure-all with the power of good, growing on sacred Oak Trees; the Yule Log originated in an ancient Druid winter solstice tradition.

So today's Christmas celebrations continue traditions rooted in a spiritual respect for and connection with the natural world that sustains us. But modern Christmas has also become mired in consumerism and excess. Many people feel forced to go into debt to give presents they cannot afford, adding to our over-consumption and pollution problem that is badly impacting nature - the latest State of Nature report shows UK has, since 1970, lost on average 19% of the species studied, some insects by more than a third. We've lost more than half of flowering plants and mosses from areas where they used to thrive. One in six UK species face extinction.


Plus this year, tens of thousands of people globally and swathes of the natural world have fallen victim to record-breaking extreme weather events, consequences of humanity's impact on nature – a warming climate.

It seems pretty clear that if the Green Man was in charge of the naughty list, we would be on it!

Reflecting on our Warming Climate Town Hall's 90th birthday celebrations, chatt

In July, our group took part in Warsop Town Hall's 90th birthday celebrations, chatting, handing out leaflets and enjoying the tea and cake! People were very interested in our poster showing the difference in world temperature between when the Town Hall opened in 1933 and recent times:

Global average temperatures in 1933 when the Town Hall opened: Temperature Anomaly FO PNG AII




A picture tells a thousand words – What a difference!

Friends of the Earth

In 1933, the actual average global temperature was around 13.7C. In 2022 it had risen to 14.7C, a whole degree warmer. In July this year, it broke all records when it briefly hit 17.23C!

Over the last two decades, a warming climate has brought a staggering increase in extreme weather events - more frequent and intense storms, droughts, flooding and wildfires - but 2023 has been truly record breaking - sea surface temperatures, wildfire extent, ice loss, heatwaves, rainfall and flood events, all broke previous records around the world, impacting humans and wildlife.

Many species are struggling to adapt to the speed of warming (unprecedented in the history of the Earth, says Prof Bill McGuire) on top of other destructive human activity. This graph, compiled by Prof Ed Hawkins of Reading University, shows temperature and CO2 since the very first Christmas, and clearly illustrates the rate of change since the advent of fossil fuels.



Climate breakdown has begun

After a year of catastrophic weather events around the world, in September the United Nations announced: "Climate breakdown has begun."

The World Meteorological Organization reported 2023 was the hottest Northern Hemisphere summer on record – July was the hottest month ever recorded, followed by the hottest August which reached around 1.5C warmer than pre-industrial average. Then came the hottest September on record at around 1.75C warmer - one climate scientist called it "gobsmackingly bananas"!

Scientists warn of worse to come in 2024 as global warming merges with the developing cyclical weather phenomenon of El Nino, a period of increased sea temperatures off the coast of South America, which influences weather systems around the globe.

Controversial response

As climate destabalizes around us from burning fossil fuels, the UK Government response was controversial, announcing 100 new oil and gas licences, a relaxing/postponing of Net Zero and biodiversity targets, and approving the Rosebank oil field in the North Sea, ignoring both scientists' warnings and public opinion – July's YouGov poll showed 82% of us are concerned about climate!

Climate physics clearly shows that delay in cutting emissions has already created irreversible change and the more we emit, the hotter it will get, for a very long time – it will take at least 10,000 years for the planet to re-absorb excess CO2 and for oceans to cool down through natural processes after we reach Net Zero (Royal Society). Meanwhile, CO2 in the air warms the planet more every day, on course for 3-4C this century and, as we go beyond 1C-1.5C, we are seeing natural, self-amplifying warming - "tipping points". So we need to cut emissions and restore nature urgently, today, rather than "by 2050".

On course for a hostile planet

Prof Johan Rockström, Director of the Potsdam Institute for Climate Impact Research, is a world leader on climate "tipping points" and "safe boundaries" – he worked with David Attenborough on Netflix's "Breaking Boundaries", well worth watching! His new study shows humans have already breached 6 of the 9 "safe operating" planetary boundaries.

From today's world of over 8 billion people, he stated that, in a 4°C-warmer world: "It's difficult to see how we could accommodate a billion people or even half of that... a rich minority of people will survive with modern lifestyles, no doubt, but it will be a turbulent, conflict-ridden world".

So this Christmas, let's return to ancient traditions that respect and celebrate nature and cut our consumption. Let's make a New Year resolution to reduce our emissions. Let's ask our MP for more urgent action on climate and protecting wildlife.

Let's change from "naughty" to "nice"!


Events will be running each year meaning the car park will be closed on those occasions. Events help to bring much needed footfall to Warsop Parish businesses.

The level of creativeness displayed by Warsop Poppy Gang is awe-inspiring.

Their tireless efforts deserve every accolade, and this award is a small token of appreciation for their extraordinary work. They have made an indelible mark on our community and may their continued efforts inspire others to follow in their footsteps.

The group were invited to the full council meeting on Monday 17th July where the Chairperson presented them with their award on behalf of the Parish Council and the whole Parish of Warsop. Refuge Point CCTV Installed at Warsop Park

A new state-of-the-art CCTV camera with a Refuge Point button to speak to control room staff has been installed in Warsop as part of a major community safety project.

The high-spec camera in Church Road, Church Warsop is close to the play area at The Carrs local nature reserve and can rotate to give a 360-degree view, as well as providing a refuge point. New street lights have also been installed at the park to increase the feeling of safety for visitors.

The camera uses the latest technology to act as a Refuge Point which is monitored 24 hours a day. Anyone in distress can press a button on the camera column which gives them direct access to the council's CCTV control room to ask for help.

Each Refuge Point has a sign giving its What3Words location, in case anyone needs to share their position with a friend or emergency contact. The exact location can then be found using the three words in the What3Words app.

Similar to lift alarms, a caller can speak through an intercom, directly to CCTV control room operators, who will triage any emergency call and will be able to immediately advise the person asking for help. They may direct them to their nearest "Safe Space" provider or, if necessary, ask the police to attend.

Safe Spaces could be local shops and businesses that have signed up for CCTV cameras and whose staff have been trained to support people who come through their doors looking for help.

They will display Safe Space signs to make them visible and give people seeking support the peace of mind that help is close at hand while they are out and about.

Executive Mayor Andy Abrahams said: "Fear of crime, especially among women and girls has been an issue in Warsop and we hope this wide ranging community safety action plan we are putting in place there with partners, will go a long way to offering re-assurance – in this instance that help is hand at the push of a button.

"What we want is for people in this area – and indeed the whole district – to feel safe. It is by



addressing these kinds of community concerns we can improve the quality of life for local people."

Two others with a Refuge Point buttons can be found in Carr Lane, near Warsop Army Cadet base, and Sherwood Street, near the junction with Short Street. A Refuge Point button without a camera has also been installed near the junction of Sherwood Street and High Street.

A total of 11 new cameras have been installed. The locations include Carr Lane Park, Coral Crescent, and Clumber Street.

New automatic number plate recognition (APNR) cameras have also been added to help the police catch law breakers in the area. In addition, pre-existing CCTV cameras in the area have been upgraded. These include those near the library and near The Talbot pub in High Street; in Sherwood Street (near Clumber Street); Burns Lane (near Sherwood Street); Church Street (near Sherwood Street traffic lights); and in Church Street (near Hetts Lane).

The cameras and lights are part of a huge package of crime reduction measures being paid for by national Safer Streets funding, after the Office of the Police and Crime



Commissioner for Nottinghamshire was successful in a bid for £3 million for projects across the city and county.

Over £300,000 of community safety measures and improvements are being carried out in Warsop and other parts of the Mansfield district, delivered in partnership with Mansfield District Council, the Office of the Nottinghamshire Police and Crime Commissioner, Nottinghamshire Police and other support agencies.

Nottinghamshire Police and Crime Commissioner Caroline Henry said: "It was amazing to visit Warsop to see some of the innovative Safer Streets interventions in action.

"The refuge point cameras are so important in ensuring people in Warsop have access to help when they need it, and the addition of this brand new Refuge Point in The Carrs park, as well as brand new street lighting, which has been made possible through the Safer Streets programme, is amazing to see.

"Especially when we talk about feelings of safety for young women and girls across the district, knowing that help is just a button push away will help people across Warsop feel a lot safer whilst out and about."

The project in Warsop included funding for to offer local people free access to the Hollie Guard personal safety mobile phone app. A simple shake or tap can active the app when people are in danger, immediately notifying their chosen contacts, pinpointing their location and sending audio and video evidence directly to the contact's mobile phones

The scheme is also funding support for families, and youth work to help prevent anti-social behaviour by encouraging young people to make alternative life choices and by offering them diversionary activities.

Approximately 50 trees around Market Warsop have been trimmed or removed at various locations, including The Carrs, the Burns estate, and Warsop library, to improve the effectiveness of street lighting.



More local groups supported by Warsop Parish Council!

Another 5 local groups have benefited from Section 137 funding this year.

Warsop Parish Council sets aside a sum of money each year which can be applied for by local organisations for projects which will be of benefit to residents within the Parish of Warsop. This is called a section 137 grant.

The Parish Council's grant is open to established voluntary or community groups, as well as new or informal groups of parishioners who are or intend by the date of application to become formally constituted.

The Parish Council have supported Warsop Carnival who are an integral part of our community traditions with a £4,000 grant towards the event. This event not only serves the people of the Parish but those who travel from neighbouring villages/towns. This can bring many opportunities for local businesses and charities with the volume of people it attracts.

The second group to benefit from this funding is Friends of Warsop Vale who have brought an old community building back to life. A £1,000 was granted to The Centre, formally the Malcolm Sargison Centre in Warsop Vale has been re-vamped and is offering a community space for Warsop Vale and the rest of Warsop Parish.

Warsop Army Cadets reached out to the council as they run on very little funding and found that families were struggling with the cost of equipment or camp trips. They were awarded £188.00 to help ensure that all of the cadets have the same opportunities.

Ever heard of the DUWC? The Derbyshire Unemployed Workers Centre is based in Shirebrook and offers advice, support and representation to residents on issues concerning benefits/credits as well as adverse decisions made by statutory authorities. They will also signpost people to other help that may be available. Although the DUWC are based in Derbyshire, they see a high number of residents from Warsop Parish and each year they will present the council with data on how many residents in the Parish they have helped. The organisation was awarded £500 to continue serving the residents of Warsop Parish.

And lastly, we have Christmas Smile which was started by a Parish Cllr back in 2017 and has continued with new Cllrs stepping in to continue this fantastic project. This voluntary group helped 150 Parish residents last year at Christmas time and gave joy to those going through hard times. They provide food hampers, Christmas presents or sometimes just providing the basic grocery essentials. £500 was awarded to the group to continue this much needed service.

Could Warsop Parish Council help a local group you are involved in? If so, here are some details about who is eligible and what can be funded.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO APPLY?

To be eligible for the award of a grant under Section 137 an organisation must:

- be established for charitable, benevolent, social, cultural, recreational, or philanthropic purposes
- have a constitution, or set of rules, which define its aims, objectives, and operational procedures
- be able to provide a copy of its latest annual accounts and be able to demonstrate that the accounts are checked and signed by a person independent of the group
- have a bank account operated by a minimum of at least two joint signatories.

WHAT CAN BE FUNDED?

- the project should be something which makes the local community a better place in which to live, work or visit
- it should benefit people who live in the parish
- there must be clear evidence that local people support the project and are involved in carrying it out
- each group may only make one application per financial year. Please contact the Clerk via theclerk@warsopparishcouncil.co.uk for more information or if you think your group could benefit from a \$137 grant.

Warsop Health Hub Construction Works Commence

Construction has started on the new health hub at Carr Lane Park in Warsop that will significantly expand the parish's leisure, wellbeing and community provisions.

Due to open in June 2024, the new hub will see the installation of a new 15 x 8-metre swimming pool, a splash play area, changing village, a gym, a multi-purpose hall, a café viewing and IT area and community space. A stone's throw away from the main site will also see the creation of a new and improved multi-use games area due to open in early 2024.

Planning permission for the hub was approved in March 2023, and representatives from Mansfield District Council, the Department of Levelling Up, Housing and Communities (DLUHC), Sport England, Serco/More Leisure and building contractors Pellikaan toured the construction site today (29 June) as work gets underway.

The delivery of the council's £9.2m hub was made possible thanks to key funding agreements secured by the authority from various partners and agencies, including a £1.8m capital grant from Sport England, a £3m allocation from the Government's Towns Fund and £103,967 from the DLUHC to create a dedicated changing place within the building.

The hub is just one of six projects funded from the £12.3m awarded to Mansfield District Council in 2021 from the Towns Fund allocation.

The remaining funding is coming from the authority directly, with £1.5m from reserves and £3.5m from council borrowing.

Councillor Andy Burgin, Portfolio Holder for Environment and Leisure, said seeing diggers on the site was exciting and overwhelming.

"It has been a long time in the making, but I am elated to be here on site today and see for myself the works getting well underway to make way for the new community hub," he said.

"This project has been a partnership effort from the beginning, with stakeholders and funders and the Warsop community. They have been telling us what they wanted to see in the parish, and now we are delivering it here. The change and impact this will bring to the community will be long-lasting and revolutionary.

"My thanks go out to everyone who has made this possible, and I look forward to seeing the project progress."

The Warsop Health Hub project aligns with the delivery of three of the council's corporate priorities: wellbeing, aspiration and place. Levelling Up Minister Dehenna Davison said:

"I'm delighted that work has started on a major community hub in the heart of Warsop, which is one of six projects we're supporting through our £12.3 million Town Deal for Mansfield.

"The Warsop Health Hub will be a huge asset for the area, helping to boost people's wellbeing with a new swimming pool and gym. It will also be furnished with fully accessible changing facilities, thanks to an additional £100,000 in government funding.

"This exciting project will be enjoyed by the community for years to come and again demonstrates the real benefits levelling up can provide for local people."

In 2019, Sport England jointly funded the Living Well in Warsop study with the council, which reviewed the leisure and community provision in the parish. Residents, businesses and organisations were all asked for their views at consultation events and in a community-wide survey. The outcome was a list of suggestions and ideas that would lead to the right mix of activities, services and facilities to meet the community's needs.

Lisa Dodd-Mayne, Executive Director, Place at Sport England, said:

"Sport England's Uniting the Movement strategy aims to provide opportunities for all people to access sport and physical activity, regardless of their backgrounds, bank balance or postcodes and we know that having accessible and available facilities is essential in achieving this.

"We are pleased to see work starting on the Warsop Health Hub, which is one of the first facilities to use our new Leisure Local concept. The opportunities to take part in sport and physical activity that will be made possible by this development are exciting to see and will benefit the local community for years to come, helping people lead healthy and happy lives."

In March, Mayor Andy Abrahams took an executive decision to confirm the total project costs, the council's borrowing amount and to make Serco Leisure Ltd/More Leisure Community Trust the centre operator.

Brian Taylor, Chair of More Leisure Community Trust, added:

"We're very proud to have been chosen as operators for this exciting new community-focused health hub, which looks certain to be warmly welcomed by local residents when it opens in June next year. We look forward to playing our part in improving the health and wellbeing of the people of this parish"





So having been on and off diets all her life Annie took the plunge and joined him at his Mansfield group with Consultant Chervl who was warm and welcoming. She explained that the secret is 'free food and speed food',

"Foods that you can eat as much of as you like, keeping full all day long. No going to bed hungry and dreaming of what's for breakfast tomorrow.

That first week Annie lost 3lbs and that was where her Slimming World journey began. Tony and Annie are now both target members and decided to take it to then next level, helping others to get fitter and

It was Warsop Slimming World Group in The Oakland Centre that Tony would attend after work and it had been run successfully run by the same Consultant for many years. One day on the drive from the Mansfield Group meeting and another successful weight loss, the idea was born to become a consultant and almost immediately Warsop came to mind. Three months and a lot of training later. the plan has come into fruition, Warsop Slimming

Annie explained,

"It's all about choices and making tweaks to our normal food. Neither of us are ever hungry and we haven't once had to sit down to a watery soup, crispbread and a salad! A whole cooked breakfast can be 'free food' and that includes the sausage, bacon and beans!



"A Slimming World meeting is a place where we can get together, welcome and encourage each other to achieve our personal goals, swap ideas, and get suggestions with areas we are struggling with. It has taken me months to achieve my personal target which would have taken far longer alone; I would have given up many times along the way alone. We call this part IMAGE Therapy – Individual Motivation and Group Experience. Many members know more about this than I do, they are Target Members. Whilst they keep within range of their goal Target Members attend for free, sharing their stories, experience and knowledge, it inspires us and helps them keep from slipping off the

About the Hollie Guard app

Anyone can download the basic Hollie Guard app free from the App Store or Google Play. The app acts as a discreet panic button that can be activated in stealth mode by shaking it or tapping it without indicating to those around that a user is on their phone.

It tracks the users' precise location in real-time so that if they activate an alert, the app pinpoints a location and sends details to a user's chosen emergency contacts.

It also activates the phone's camera and microphone to capture evidence. A user's emergency contacts can access these recordings in real time. The recordings are not stored on the user's phone but on cloud-based secure servers for future use as evidence.

The app also has a timer function that enables users facing a potentially dangerous meeting or situation to set a specific countdown. If a user marks themselves as safe, the countdown is deactivated. If it is not de-activated, an alert will automatically be sent once the countdown

Another feature of the app is being able to log a journey. Users set a start and end point. The app then monitors a user's journey and alerts their nominated contacts, and once they mark they have safely arrived, it triggers an alert.

The Extra paid-for version of the app also sends any panic button alerts to a control centre staffed LOTTERY FUNDED www.thynghowe.org.uk

or if a user's emergency contacts are unable to

respond. All app users can choose when to share

their location and have control over their data. The Hollie Gazzard Trust developed the app to protect both women and men from possible danger. The Trust was set up by the parents and sister of Hollie Gazzard, who was murdered by an ex-partner in 2014 at her place of work in Gloucester.



The Hollie Guard App

Warsop pupils learn how to use Hollie Guard app to keep them safe.

Female students in Warsop have been learning how to keep themselves safe by using an app that enables their mobile phone to act as a body cam and panic button.

The pupils at Meden School learned about the free-to-download Hollie Guard app which helps to track users and can be discreetly activated to record evidence of real time events if a user feels

Of 24 students who attended the presentation, 18 signed up for the app after the session.

The educational workshop was part of a £300,000 Safer Streets campaign in the Warsop area delivered in partnership with Mansfield District Council, the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner, Nottinghamshire Police and other support agencies in the area, which is focusing on making women and girls feel safer.

The campaign is also funding a year's free access to Hollie Guard Extra, an enhanced paid-for version of the free app.

The Extra version gives users 24/7 access to a professional police-approved monitoring team who can send help if required.

Of 200 free subscriptions available to residents in the Warsop area, nearly half have been claimed. The rest are available on a first-come, first-served basis by emailing saferstreets@mansfield.gov.uk. Portfolio Holder for Wellbeing, Health, and Safer

Communities, Councillor Angie Jackson, said: "We hope this gives people, and particularly women and girls who feel vulnerable or at risk in Warsop, more confidence to get out and about with peace of

mind that help is at their fingertips. "All the Safer Streets measures, we hope, will lead to an improved quality of life for everyone in Warsop.

The Warsop Safer Street campaign is part of a wider £3m scheme funded by the government via the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner

for Nottinghamshire for projects across the city and county.

Nottinghamshire Police and Crime Commissioner Caroline Henry said: "Through Safer Streets we have delivered a range of projects to make women and girls feel safer in Warsop, including Safe Spaces in shops and new CCTV cameras in public spaces.

"We are always looking for innovative ways to do more to make people feel even safer. By making young people aware of the Hollie Guard app and offering free subscriptions we are trying to do everything we can to support local people – whilst showing perpetrators that there is zero tolerance for violence against women and girls in Warsop."

As well as the Hollie Guard app, the students at Meden School also learned about other improvements being made in Warsop to make it safer, including:

- New CCTV cameras which are being installed in Carr Lane Park, Clumber Street, Sherwood Street, Coral Crescent, The Carrs
- Improved street lighting planned at the The Carrs, Sherwood Street and Clumber Street.
- Youth engagement activities and outreach sessions being run \bar{w} it \bar{h} youth engagement organisation Switch Up at Carr Lane Park and other locations.
- One-to-one mentoring sessions being held with secondary school pupils
- Healthy relationship lessons being run in schools.
- Businesses in Warsop offering a Safe Space for anyone who feels worried, at risk or in danger. So far Jins Chinese, The Plough Inn, Greetings, Cedars veterinary practice, Warsop Library and Vibrant Warsop are offering Safe Spaces. More will be added in the coming year.

Comprehensive Plan to Help Manage the Challenges of Winter

Sherwood Forest Hospitals NHS
Foundation Trust, which manages King's
Mill, Newark and Mansfield Community
hospitals, started planning for what is
likely to be a challenging winter, following
record heatwaves at the height of summer.

The winter plan, which was approved by Sherwood Forest Hospitals Board of Directors on Thursday 5 October, 2023, sets out a range of measures aimed at ensuring there is sufficient capacity to meet winter demands; with patients more likely to be admitted only if it is essential and also helping to reduce the length of time they need to stay in hospital.

The majority of the funding will provide at the peak 44 extra beds for adults and children, rising to 60 at weekends, between October and March. Nurses, doctors, therapists, pharmacists and administration staff will be employed to support these extra beds.

The funding will also be used to provide:

- A Children's Assessment Unit from November, providing extended opening hours (10am to 10pm) seven days a week – giving children and their parents better access to urgent and emergency care when they need it.
- A Frailty Rapid Access clinic to ensure frail patients are seen in a purpose designed way quickly – helping to prevent deterioration which can often result in hospital admission
- Doubling the number of Respiratory Physicians at weekends – helping patients with seasonal conditions get faster treatment and shorter stays in hospital.
- Weekend MRI scan reporting which can often cause delays to patients going home.

Winter is traditionally a challenging time across the NHS with increased pressures from seasonal illnesses such as respiratory infections, Covid and Flu. Icy weather can lead to more slips with an increased number of people visiting Accident and Emergency (A&E) with suspected breaks and sprains. In addition, this year there is expected to be the added challenge of continued industrial action.

Delays (outside of the hospital's direct control) in discharging medically fit patients once they are ready to go home mean that seriously sick patients sometimes have to wait for a bed longer than they or hospital staff would like for one to become available

Rachel Eddie, Chief Operating Officer at Sherwood Forest Hospitals, said:

"We want our patients to have confidence that we can provide the care they need. Keeping patients safe and the quality of the care we provide is our priority.

"We know that winter can be a busier time than usual for our hard-working staff, but by planning earlier, we can reduce the impact and ensure a more positive experience and better outcome for our patients."

Dr David Selwyn, Medical Director of Sherwood Forest Hospitals, added:

"Our ask is that you help us care for you by taking care of yourself. We want you to plan to stay well this winter.

"Keep medicines supplies updated and, if you are eligible, please take up the offer of Covid and Flu vaccinations. Details of the national campaign can be found here.

"There are many services that can provide you with help on the day you need it. You can get this help through your GP team, a pharmacy, NHS 111 online or by calling NHS 111 to get advice and treatment for minor injuries and illnesses. But remember if it is a life-threatening emergency please phone 999 immediately or an to A&F."







A4 paper • Cutting mat • Scalpel • Glue stick • Wool

- Cut 12 0.5cm strips across the full width of the paper. Take two and stick together to make a cross (fold in half to find centre points).



Hundreds of Extra NHS Health Checks to Launch Next Week

Hundreds of extra health checks will be available to patients in areas of Nottinghamshire from next week, as part of plans to bring the county's first 'Community Diagnostics Centre' to Mansfield.

Up to 255 blood tests will be delivered each week at a drop-in service running at Mansfield Community Hospital from Monday 2nd October. It's the first in a series of 'accelerated' checks that will be delivered while plans progress to build the dedicated Centre.

The tests will be available between 9am and 5pm on weekdays, with patients needing a referral from their GP to access the tests. They will initially be offered as a drop-in service before being made available as pre-booked appointments over the coming

These fast-tracked health checks are being rolled-out as part of the next phase of Sherwood Forest Hospitals' work to bring Nottinghamshire's first Community Diagnostics Centre or 'CDC' to Mansfield.

Sherwood Forest Hospitals announced plans earlier this year to build the purpose-built 'Community Diagnostics Centre' – or CDC – where a derelict building currently stands alongside Mansfield Community Hospital in Stockwell Gate.

The multimillion-pound plans went on to receive national funding in February, prior to them receiving the vital planning approval they needed to progress in April.

Once built, the Centre will become a 'one-stop shop' for patients from across Nottinghamshire to access the tests and investigations they need in a single visit, reducing the time it takes for patients to be referred to help them receive an 'all clear' or diagnosis sooner.

By the end of 2023, almost 500 extra blood tests, MRI and ultrasound scans will have been available to patients each week as part of this 'accelerated' phase of activity linked to the project.

The full Community Diagnostics Centre is expected to open its doors to patients in 2025.

David Ainsworth, the Director of Strategy and Partnerships for Sherwood Forest Hospitals, said:

"Community Diagnostic Centres are redefining the way patients access the vital tests and health checks they need across the country and we are proud to be bringing Nottinghamshire's first Community Diagnostics Centre to our area.

"By thinking creatively and working alongside our NHS colleagues across Nottinghamshire and even nationally, we are delighted to be able to start delivering these vital health checks here in Mansfield sooner from as early as October.

"That is great news for local people, as it means that tens of thousands more patients will be able to benefit from these life-saving tests and checks – long before the bricks and mortar of the full CDC is in place."

Getting a rapid diagnosis for conditions such as cancer will help patients access the treatments they need more quickly – something that could be genuinely life-saving, as earlier diagnosis is key to improving survival rates and quality of life for those suffering chronic diseases.

Checks available at the full Centre once it is developed will include a host of X-rays, scans and other tests for a range of other conditions, including cancer and other long-term conditions – like heart and lung disease.

As well as delivering tens of thousands of additional health checks each month, the Centre will also create 120 jobs for local people in a range of clinical and non-clinical roles.

Amanda Sullivan, Chief Executive at NHS Nottingham and Nottinghamshire, said:

"It's fantastic news that the Trust has been able to bring forward access to additional testing capacity ahead of the permanent CDC openina its doors.

"Local residents will benefit from shorter waiting times for blood test and scans delivered from convenient locations."

There are often reports on social media that one of our resident swans has fishing line caught in its beak or a hedgehog is injured and requests for help for these creatures seems to be constant. Now, thanks to this small group of volunteers that are on hand to help where possible (we do need to remember they still have jobs, families, etc) and hopefully help alleviate some of the pressures faced by our local wildlife charities.

Here is some information on the behaviour patterns the swans may present.

It will soon be time for our beloved cygnets, that have thrived beautifully this year, to find their feet and wings. This means you will notice them going for walks and attempting flying practice.

During this time, they may crossroads and end up in places where they probably shouldn't be. If this happens or you have any concerns for the swans, please contact one of the members of Warsop Wildlife Rescue Team on the numbers provided.

You may also notice the parents, especially the male driving the cygnets off the waters. It may seem like bullying behaviour but it's completely natural and the cygnets, once ready, will soon find homes of their own.

Getting Better Together in Warsop

A campaign to encourage people to be good neighbours is starting to bring a community closer together.

"Through my job I see lots of people who benefit from a helping hand and many who are lonely. I think using people in the community like me to help each other out and share information is a very good idea."

Cllr Angie Jackson, Joint Portfolio Holder for Wellbeing, Health & Safer Communities, said: "Better Together has built on the excellent community spirit that already exists in Warsop and helped a good number of people so far.



"It has linked people up, introduced them to organisations working in Warsop, and created real feel-good benefits. We recognise that not everyone visits service-provider websites or has social media accounts, so what better way to get information out than by using people living and working in the community to share it.


CCTV



Anti-Social Behaviour can come in a wide range of forms. Antsocial behaviour is any behaviour that causes or is likely to cause harassment, alarm or distress or damages quality of life. It is important that if you see or experience any ASB, you report it to the appropriate authority.

We work together with Mansfield District Council and many other agencies to tackle ASB but we cannot take action if we are not aware please don't assume someone else will report the issue and, even if they do, it is important that we understand the extent of the issue and those affected in order to be able to take the appropriate action.

- Call 999, if life is threatened, someone is injured or there is a crime
- Call 101, report to Nottinghamshire Police online if an offence has happened and the offender is no longer at the scene
- Call 101, report online or contact the Mansfield Neighbourhood Policing Team (by going to www.nottinghamshire.police.uk and typing in your street or post code) or at your local Beat Surgery if you wish to report on-going issues or concerns in your local community.

You can also report ASB to Mansfield District Council, either by calling 01623 463 463, emailing mdc@mansfield.gov.uk or via the 'Report It' mechanisms on their website www.mansfield.gov.uk/report, which also allows for anonymous reporting. 

WARSOP

Footpath & Countryside Group

Winter is a fine time for walking through woodlands as the low sun illuminates the forest floor and the reduced leaf cover reveal wider views of the landscape and its wildlife.

The first spring flowers often appear along woodland edges and beside hedgerows. Wrap up warm, get out there and enjoy our splendid local countryside.



The weather in 2023 has been another mixture wet and warm periods that have produced a fine crop of long grass along the local footpaths. The Footpaths Group's team of volunteers managed to complete our programme of path mowing on schedule although it was a bit of a struggle cutting some of the longer grass. Our mowers have now been put away for the winter and we are concentrating on other tasks.

Our autumn and winter jobs start with managing the grassland area of the Rhein o'Thorns at Warsop Vale to encourage wildflowers and prevent the area being taken over by scrub. We then move on to the Doorstep Green at Church Warsop to tidy up the paths, trees and hedges. More tree and hedge work along with bramble clearance follows as we move onto part of The Carrs LNR. By early next year the hedgerow fruits should have been eaten by birds so we can start trimming back hedges that are invading public paths, particularly around Meden Vale and Market Warsop. Another task is giving the Dukeries Trail at Warsop Vale an early spring clean by clearing the litter along the former railway line to Shirebrook.

There have been times when a shortage of volunteers has prevented us from completing all of work on schedule. If you think you may be able to help us please contact us.

The periods of wet weather over summer have allowed many of the tree planted around the rugby field at Warsop Vale to get off to a good start. The other area of new trees on the former pit site should eventually provide a wildlife corridor between the woodlands in the north of the parish and the River Meden corridor. These new wooded areas should be good for people, for wildlife and for the climate!

There have been mixed results with our attempts to control the invasive non-native plant Himalayan Balsam this year. Upstream from the Mill Dam only one solitary plant has been found along the banks of the Meden, Sookholme Brook and Shire Brook. However, downstream from the mill this plant is out of control in some spots, damaging the riverbanks and causing problems with silt. New patches are developing around Gleadthorpe and we are focussing on preventing it spreading into the forest.


Interesting proposals have been published for new bridleways connecting Cuckney Hill, Gleadthorpe and Meden Vale. If these are approved they will provide some fine circular walks and bike rides around that part of the parish.
