

The Future of the Carrs

A new management plan has been created for Warsop Parish's favoured beauty spot. The plan, which is currently in its draft report stage, sets out the district council's vision for the management of The Carrs up to the year 2020.


The report has been produced for Mansfield District Council by EMEC Ecology and uses Natural England's definition of The Carrs as being an 'urban fringe site with wet deciduous woodland, scrub, grassland and pond habitats along the River Meden'... but to many local residents, it is simply The Carrs, home to the mill dam or mill pond and the annual carnival

The report acknowledges the importance of the position of The Carrs from a wildlife point of view: The Carrs is potentially the middle link in a chain of nature reserves extending down the river Meden, with the Bottoms (Local Nature Reserve) at Meden Vale, approximately 800m to the northeast, and Sookholme Hills and Holes (Site of Special Scientific Interest) about 500m to the west. The River Meden connects all three sites, providing a wildlife corridor. There are a number of nearby woodlands that adjoin the site often connected to The Carrs by field boundaries (hedgerows).

However, it also acknowledges the use of the area by residents: The Carrs provides for a wide range of leisure and conservation uses – informal activities such as: walking, dog walking, picnicking and play. The open space allows a number of sports to be played due to the large expanse of open space available. There is opportunity for a wide range of educational activities focused around natural history, the arts, local history and geology.

A survey in 2013 identified approximately 48,000 visitors attended the park throughout the year; this is an increase of approximately 5,000 since 2010. The Carrs is the home to the annual Warsop Carnival which boasts attendances in excess of 8.000. The carnival is managed by the Warsop Carnival Committee, which is responsible for the arrangements of the event throughout the year.


The Carrs, situated close to the local Church and with excellent views of the willows and pond, is probably one of the most photographed open spaces in the district. Wedding photos taken on The Carrs are widely posted on websites which in turn provides an excellent advertisement of The Carrs itself.



can be found in the area. It also has detailed sections about the management structure of the District Council, who are ultimately responsible for the management of the area and hints at the partnership that exists between the council and The Friends of the Carrs: It is envisaged that through supporting the Friends of The Carrs and other voluntary groups, the authority will be able to bring the local community into the management and running of the park.

The report is a suggestive management plan and ultimately it is up to Mansfield District Council to action it.

Along with The Friends of the Carrs and local Parish Councillors, Mansfield District Council are currently working towards obtaining Green Flag status for our much loved park.



The report recommends the following 11 key management objectives:

- River Meden, Mill Dam & Riverside Path Edges: Appropriate management and enhancement of marginal vegetation. Management of silt levels at 'Silt Trap'.
- Mill Dam Island: Maintain and enhance the open habitat of the 'Mill Dam Island' as a secure wildlife refuge.
- 3. Grasslands: Enhance the structural and floristic diversity of particular grasslands and grassland/ruderal mosaics through sensitive management and further sowing and planting. These areas include 'Top Meadow', 'Medenside Meadow', 'Riverside Path Edges' and 'Bottom Meadow'
- 4. Woodland, Scrub & Scattered Trees: Enhance the woodland and dense scrub areas ('Willow Carr Scrub', 'West Willow Carr Wood' & 'East Willow Carr Wood') to encourage the healthy growth of trees and create a mosaic of woodland habitats. Manage individual trees along the river banks e.g 'Seven Weeping Willow Trees' & 'Riverside Trees'.
- Wetland Area: Reduce the level (by at least 2m) of the 'Mound' by landscaping. This will allow a diversity of wetland plant species to thrive in this location once again. The area can be enhanced and the process of vegetation establishment' speeded up by additional planting of appropriate wetland plant species.
- Hedgerows: Maintain and enhance the hedgerows ('Bottom Path Hedge', 'Top Path Hedge', 'Field Hedge' & 'Ditch Hedge') through appropriate management and 'gapping-up'.
- Dipping Pond: Enhance the new 'Dipping Pond' to create an area for education for use by local schools and families. Install a 'dipping platform'.
- Supplementary Habitat for Faunal Species: Install bird nest boxes and bat roost boxes to increase the value of the site for faunal species.
- Local Community and Visitors: Ensure paths are maintained. Ensure the site is free of litter and vandalism. Update existing interpretation boards.
- 10. Monitoring: Monitor the effects of management
- 11. Legal Obligations: Fulfil all legal obligations.

GARDENING MONTHLY...

General tasks and garden maintenance



Frosts can still be a hazard, so keep vulnerable plants protected at night if frost is forecast. March winds are also notorious for their ferocity so check exposed plants are well supported.

Now is the time for a thorough spring clean; weed and dig over your borders incorporating as much organic matter as you can - those chilly winds will really help to dry out the soil. Mulch bare soil once you have done the work and remove moss and weeds from paths, terraces and driveways. They may be boring tasks but if you don't get on top of the garden now (especially the weeds!) it will be a nightmare for the rest of the season.

Make new beds and borders - mark the shape with sand trickled from a bottle, remove the top layer of growing vegetation and dig the ground over, incorporating as much organic matter as possible. If you are making a bed in the lawn, remove the turf and stack it upside down somewhere out of the way - after a year or two it will rot down into fantastic compost. Alternatively chop it up and bury upside down in the planting hole a good spade's depth down. Beware - if you just dig it in the buried grass will regrow and regrow and regrow and...

Clean and repair your garden tools, book the lawn mower in for a service and check garden furniture for any rot. When it is warm enough, treat sheds, fences and trellis with wood preservative; brushes and rollers are fine for most things, however a sprayer is well worth buying for tricky projects such as woven panels!

Birds

Do keep on feeding the birds - they become accustomed to regular food supplies and it's a real treat to see wild birds visiting the garden. For avid bird watchers, we stock a great range of bird houses and feeding stations as well as bird food - a wonderful idea for Mother's Day!

Lawns

If it is very wet keep off the lawn as much as possible - damage to waterlogged lawns is easily inflicted and irritatingly hard to rectify. When the weather improves and the lawn has had a chance to dry out, give it a first cut with the blades on the highest setting - don't be tempted if conditions are wet! Reseed bare patches, neaten the edges with a half moon cutter or spade and remove molehills and wormcasts. If you are planning a new lawn, start preparing the ground for seeding or laying turf. Ask for advice in your local garden centre if you are unsure of how to begin.

Trees, shrubs and climbers

Plant and move evergreen shrubs, conifers and trees and remember to water them well until firmly rooted in. Plant evergreen hedges such as laurel, yew and box and again keep them well watered in dry spells. A good soak once a week is better than superficial watering on a regular basis.

Feed woody plants with general purpose fertiliser - this applies to roses, trees, climbers, hedges and shrubs.

Feed acid loving plants such as camellias and rhododendrons with ericaceous feed if you are on neutral or alkaline soil. A dose of sequestered iron also helps prevent the leaves turning yellow. (Tip - mulch regularly with fresh or composted pine needles. This can acidify the ground slightly.)

Finish pruning your roses and start spraying them with fungicide to ward against black spot and mildew. Repeat every fortnight until the autumn. Remember that if an infection sets in, all the stricken leaves must be burnt - do not leave them on the compost heap as this will become the perfect incubation site.

Prune hydrangeas - do not remove stems with a bud at the top, but snip off old stems bearing deadheads to just above the topmost healthy bud and remove weak shoots altogether from the base. With established plants, remove some of the older shoots right down to the base - this will keep the plant compact. The latter also applies to forsythia (prune once it has finished flowering by cutting back flowered shoots down to a new shoot further down - all the new growth this season will flower next year) and to flowering currants (Ribes).

Vegetables

Many vegetable crops can be sown this month - wait until the weather turns warmer, check the instructions on the seed packets and plant away! Broad beans, early peas, carrots, lettuces, spinach, salad leaves, leeks and chard are just a few ideas to get your healthy, cheap and home-grown food underway!

Plant Jerusalem artichoke tubers - bury them 1" deep and 12-18" apart - but remember they spread like wildfire unless you dig up every last one at harvest time. Plant shallots, garlic and onion sets as well as asparagus crowns in friable, well-drained soil. Harvest the last leeks, Brussels sprouts, sprouting broccoli and cabbages.

Footpath & **Countryside Group**

The crazy weather of recent months make any predictions about what we may expect to see in the countryside this March very unreliable. Last year, the first leaves opened on hawthorn hedges during March as usual, in 2016 some were open in the middle of January!

If events have reverted to their normal timing we should now be seeing woodland flowers appearing in shaded areas. Dog's Mercury, Lesser Celandine, Dog Violets and Wood Anemone should be brightening our woodlands and hedgerows. The first grassland species should also be flowering, look out for Speedwell and both Red and White Dead-Nettles will have been blooming for a while by now. Watch out for a yellow Brimstone butterfly, it is usually one of the first to appear each year.

Frogs will be starting to mate around now, you may hear them before you see them. Frogs have been having a hard time recently so how about creating a wildlife pond to see if you can help them? They could pay you back by helping deal with your slug problem.

Many people who care about our local countryside are very concerned about the impact on the Hills & Holes and on Sookholme Lane of the proposals in the Mansfield Local Plan. Warsop Footpaths & Countryside Group have responded to the draft plan highlighting several issues related to the designation of building development land up to the boundary of the Hills & Holes and alongside the lane.

We have raised issues relating to potential harm from the spread of garden plant species, interaction of domestic pets with wildlife and dumping of rubbish due to building close to the boundary of the Site of Special Scientific Interest. This site is protected and its description from Natural England states "The site contains some of the finest remaining limestone and base-rich flush plant communities in Nottinghamshire and is of Regional importance." Sookholme Lane is an ancient route lined with a very old hedge on the northern side on the Warsop side of Hammerwater Bridge. This section of hedgerow contains at least 13 species of tree and shrub, suggesting an age of over a thousand years. Building opposite this hedgerow or an increase in traffic would cause irreparable damage to a significant part of our heritage.

Last month. I commented on a flooded area adjoining the River Meden. This area is 50 metres from the edge of the proposed housing land. The meadows of the Hills & Holes regularly flood following heavy rainfall, preventing flood risk further downstream. Any development that impacts on the ability of adjoining land to absorb water could cause major problems.

We have also highlighted that the river corridor is important for wildlife habitat connectivity and is an important contribution to the sense of wellbeing for local residents and visitors. The River Meden also marked the boundary of Sherwood Forest for many centuries. The council's vision does not give this landscape the recognition it deserves and ignores its potential for increasing the number of visitors to Warsop with the associated benefits for local businesses.

Our next group walk should be on Saturday 19th March with the destination still to be decided We usually meet at 10am outside Warsop Library but the date and time may change so get in touch if to confirm details if you would like to join us.



Council Welcomes 'Satisfaction with **Life' Survey Results**

Mansfield District Council has welcomed the findings of a new report which shows that people in the district are among the most satisfied in England.

The Office for National Statistics has released new figures which reveal happiness, anxiety and satisfaction levels and where in the country people feel their lives are most or least worthwhile.

In the table for being most satisfied with their lives, Mansfield came in as third best place in England.

Asked to rate their overall life satisfaction out of 10, 32.3% of people in the district gave themselves a nine or ten - just behind the leaders Cornwall (33.3%) and Cumbria (33.2%).

Languishing at the bottom of the satisfaction table were the London Borough of Camden (16.7%) followed by Wolverhampton (16.9%).

"However, there is always more to be done and we are constantly working on ways to improve the lives of people in this area.

Overall, the largest proportion of happy people in England are living in Mid Sussex, while the smallest number of happy people live in $Wolver hampton, according \ to \ the \ statistics.$

Data was collected over three years and was used to measure the well-being of more than 300,000 people across the UK.

Green Light for Market **Transformation Project**

Work has begun on transforming Mansfield Market after a decision on Friday 29th January that gave a green light for the £100,000 regeneration project.

The new-look market will be launched in April after Mansfield District Council's Portfolio Holder for Corporate Services Councillor Stewart Rickersey made the final executive decision to

Extra consultation was carried out after his original decision taken on 20 November was "called in" by Labour councillors, which resulted in two further reports.

The council's Select Commission 2 considered the reports and concluded that Councillor Rickersey's decision was appropriate and reasonable.

Cllr Rickersey said: "The time for thinking and talking is over. Mayor Allsop and her cabinet have given their support and I firmly believe that this project is in the best interest of the town. "We are brave enough to see this through and make radical changes to the way Mansfield Market operates for the long term benefit of customers, residents and the traders themselves.

"We are putting Mansfield Market at the heart of our town centre, improving the visitor experience and driving up quality and consumer choice. These are all important aspects in a successful retail environment.

"I am certain that the majority of traders will soon see that this is change for the better and that their businesses will thrive Council staff are working to make immediate changes and from the week commencing 4 April, one market will operate in the town centre.

Westgate stalls will be relocated to the Market Place to create a focal point for footfall and encourage stall browsing. Some infrastructure changes will be made to allow for more room in the market square.

Monday markets will no longer operate, however Tuesday will become a full market day, giving stallholders the opportunity to switch trading days. Sundays will be home to car boot sales, events and special markets.

The market stalls will be adapted, refurbished or replaced where needed and all will have new canopies, signs and optional posters. The council will also be investing in marquee style stalls for entertainment and events.

An enhanced food area is integral to the new layout of the market along with a designated entertainment area in front of the Town Hall. A promotional plan for the market includes live entertainment from famous Covent Garden acts, supported by local performers. Around £20,000 has been committed to awareness raising and encouraging day visits.

There will be a focus on encouraging new products to Mansfield through the introduction of rent-free incubation units, business support and access to the council's apprenticeship grant scheme. The quality of produce will be at the heart of the revamp with the council reaffirming its sign-up to the Nottinghamshire wide Real Deal scheme supported by Nottinghamshire County Council and Trading Standards. The council's community safety department will also be stepping up their presence to carry-out a zero tolerance approach to antisocial behaviour around Mansfield

"Mansfield market will be safe, welcoming and inviting for shoppers. We will not have drinking, cycling and general bad behaviour in that area. I'll be looking to our street wardens to play an important role in this," said Cllr Rickersey.

The highlight of the launch will be on Saturday 9 April when the town will have its first Covent Garden day with live performances and street entertainers

Planning is progressing well for our big King Canute themed reenactment event at Sherwood Pines over the weekend on 14th and 15th May. Thanks to gaining sponsorship, we expect that the Regia Anglorum group will be able to bring their replica Viking longship to this annual 'Spring Thing' event.

Before the Spring Thing weekend, we will be busy with the archaeological investigation of Thynghowe and celebrations to mark the 200th anniversary of the 1816 perambulation of the Manor of Warsop. More news about these events next month.

The 'Spring Thing' re-enactment is just one of the ways that the Friends of Thynghowe share stories of the past of Sherwood Forest with people in our local communities. Therefore, we are concerned to read the proposal included in the draft local plan for Mansfield to designate an area close to the ancient Forest boundary as building development land. The ancient boundary of Sherwood Forest followed the River Meden as documented in perambulation accounts dating from between the 13th century and 1662.

The stretch through Warsop is one of the few sections of this boundary that the public can access and parts of the river flowing through the Hills and Holes Site of Scientific Interest lie within 50 metres of the proposed development land. Any development would have an impact on an area that is important for both its historical and natural heritage. The vision contained in the District Plan does not fully acknowledge the significance of the heritage of the wider Mansfield district, particularly relating to its place in the Sherwood Forest



Dr Who Author Opens War Meden School's New Library

Meden School, in Market Warsop, officially opened their new library on Monday 18th Janaury. Cutting the ribbon was Dr Who author, Daniel Blythe, who visited the school for the day to help celebrate the opening.



Throughout the day, Daniel ran workshops with students, signed books and answered questions from budding writers. Students were keen to find out where his inspiration came from and to ask for advice with their own writing and ideas.

Daniel Blythe said the students were really enthusiastic about his visit: "They've been extremely receptive, asking lots of questions and being generally very lively and interested in what I had to say. They were keen to participate and are a credit to the school."

"This is a lovely new library with great shelving and lighting which really does make such a difference, it now feels like the heart of the school. I feel it's so important for pupils to have a place they can come that feels like a safe haven, somewhere that is friendly and welcoming. This is just that."

The whole day took place in the new school library which has had a major overhaul; the old library had been used since the school first opened over 50 years ago and was in desperate need of modernisation. Work began last summer, replacing the carpet, fitting new shelving, furniture and lighting, installing air conditioning and an expansion to include an unused classroom, giving a much larger space. A major part of the renovation has also been organisation of the books. School librarians spent hours cleaning and sorting the existing books and also ordering new ones to ensure the library is as up to date for students as possible.

"It's really exciting to finally have this fantastic new space. It was so dated before and was an uncomfortable place to be. It now has a much more modern feel and is a nice, comfortable place to work and visit. We're a lot more popular with the college students now and we're finding people are spending more time here in general. I love it," said Library Assistant Rebecca Kennedy.

The library, named 'The Learning Zone' now has two designated areas: one houses all the books with lots of soft seating and quiet reading spaces, the other is for learning and study, with modern tables, booths and seating as well as computers for students to use both in and out of lesson.

The next plan for the new library is to continue to update the books that are available and to install new computers where the old ones currently are. This is just one step in Meden's overall development plan, alongside a new College Hub and canteen/coffee bar.

Recycle the Right Way

Mansfield District Council is asking residents to take more care when depositing waste in their blue recycling bin.

Items such as glass bottles and jars, plastic trays, old clothes, soiled nappies and food waste are just some of the things that have been found in recycling bins collected from homes across the Mansfield district in recent months.

These items contaminate the contents of the bin with the result that the waste cannot be recycled, so has to be sent to landfill.

If a blue bin is found to contain incorrect materials, council operatives will place a sticker on it, telling the resident to remove all contaminated items.

The bin is then collected on the resident's next blue bin collection day. If a householder consistently contaminates their blue bin, a Fixed Penalty Fine may be enforced, or in extreme cases the bin

Only materials that can be recycled should be placed in the blue bin. These include:

- · Paper: newspapers, magazines, envelopes, directories, catalogues, office paper
- Cardboard: greetings cards, cereal boxes, egg boxes, general packages
- Plastic bottles and yoghurt pots: pop and milk bottles, cleaning product bottles, toiletry bottles, margarine tubs
- Clean food tins, empty aerosol cans, drink cans, biscuit and sweet tins

Sign up for Garden **Waste Service**

Invoices will be going out for people in the Mansfield district to renew their brown bin service for garden waste.

The year-round service costs £30 but anyone new signing up for the service between now and 1 April will receive the service from the date they sign up until the end of March 2017, which means they get up to an extra three collections free, depending on how early they sign up.

Collections are fortnightly from March to November and monthly from December to February and are a convenient way for people to dispose of their garden rubbish, which then goes for recycling to be made into compost and used in agriculture.

You can use your brown bin to recycle:

- grass cuttings plants leaves hedge trimmings
- cut flowers weeds small branches & twigs.

It cannot be used to dispose of food, kitchen waste, soil, garden furniture, treated wood, bricks or rocks, large logs, or building waste.

Portfolio Holder for the Environment Andrew Tristram said: "This is an excellent value for money recycling service - it works out at about 60p a week.

"And it is so much easier than bagging up your garden waste and taking it to the tip so I hope as many people as possible will take advantage of it and sign up for the year.

"It will not only help to keep Mansfield looking tidy, it will also make a valuable contribution to the area's recycling efforts."

Where appropriate, recyclables should be washed before being put

The following items should not be placed in the blue bin:

- · Shredded paper, kitchen roll, tissues, metallic wrapping paper
- Tetra packs, juice cartons, takeaway pizza boxes
 Carrier bags, ice cream tubs, food cartons and trays
- Paint and oil tins, pots or pans
- Glass bottles including wine bottles and food jars

The council is currently working on a joint project with Nottinghamshire County Council and Veolia ES to reduce levels of contaminated waste in targeted areas in Bull Farm and Forest Town. This involves sampling and monitoring levels of contamination in waste and issuing bin stickers reminding residents of what can be recycled.

Cllr Andrew Tristram, Portfolio Holder for the Environment at Mansfield District Council, said: "If a refuse collection vehicle is found to contain contaminated materials, the entire load could be rejected and sent to landfill. This would cause all the recyclable material within the load to be wasted and the council would incur large financial penalties, which would then have to be passed back through council tax bills to local residents.

"Unfortunately, a small minority of people are putting the wrong materials in their blue bin, which ruins the efforts of those people, who recycle their waste correctly. We are asking people to be more vigilant, when disposing of their waste, as we want to recycle as

A site visit to the Biogas Plant by members of the Committee has been scheduled for the beginning of February. Restoration work on the pit tip was again reported as being on schedule. The Planning Application to Bassetlaw District Council has now been completed and submitted and will be discussed at the next full Planning Committee meeting which will be held in February, when a decision should be made. The proposed name for the development site is Welbeck Colliery Business Park, this has been chosen to mark the history of the site and to avoid any confusion with the Welbeck Abbey Business Park.

The Treasurer reported that the accounts were satisfactory but could be better.

"The council has some challenging times ahead as we implement a new management structure which we hope will enable us to deliver our services in a modern, corporate and efficient way."


