More efficient Heating for Mansfield Residents

Mansfield District Council has approved the decommissioning of communal heating to more council owned properties to make way for the installation of modern, energy efficient and cost effective central heating systems to each home.

The current district heating schemes on Skegby Lane, Newcastle Street, Park Hall Road and at Beech Court will be decommissioned during 2018/19 and 2019/20 once individual gas supplies and central heating systems are installed in each property, which will improve customer choice and comfort.

The council will also carry out the upgrade of the current boilers in Vale Court, Sherwood Court and Melville Court. These properties will continue to have communal heating but from a more reliable and cost effective system as they will be connected to an individual gas supply with a stand-alone boiler, which gives each household control of their heating usage and associated costs.

Since 2011, the council has been replacing its coal and gas fired communal district heating systems with gas fired central heating systems in its tenants' homes. The National Grid has funded the installation of mains gas pipes to almost 1,500 council properties through their Affordable Warmth Solutions obligation, with the council spending around £3,500 on each home to convert the domestic heating and make good any repairs. An annual budget is available to allow this work to be undertaken.

Out of a total of 2,200 properties, 1,850 have already been disconnected from communal heating and connected to an individual gas supply.

According to the National Grid, an average three bedroom semi-detached home could save up to £200 a year when switching to individual gas from communal heating. The new highly efficient boilers give tenants the control so they can better manage how they heat their homes.

Councillor Barry Answer, Portfolio Holder for Housing, said: "The new gas fired central heating will provide our tenants with more control over their own heating and save them money – on average about £200 a year. Earlier this year, two residents who benefitted from the same upgrade have seen savings of about £600 a year. These are significant savings and will make a real difference.

"There are lots of benefits of taking up the new gas option including a reduction in CO2 emissions, a reduced cost to the council for maintenance and operation of the system as well as better control and a more modern, efficient and reliable system for tenants."

Private home owners who are attached to the district heating scheme and have bought their properties will not be left out. The council will offer to install the new heating to their homes, which they can pay for with a zero percent interest loan. The cost of the heating upgrade is then paid back to the council when the property is sold.

The next phase of mains gas pipework will commence in April 2018.

Wonderland, which first opened at Hampstead theatre in June 2014, has at last come home and will be at Nottingham Playhouse on Friday 9th February until 24th February 2018.

Beth, who is the daughter of Nottingham miner born and raised in Warsop, won the Evening Standard Award for Most Promising Playwright in 2014. The play was also a finalist for the international Susan Smith Blackburn Prize 2014 for best new play in the English language by a female playwright.

Wonderland was her first major play to be produced on the London stage following her writing debut Ditch in the Old Vic Tunnels. Beth continued her playwright success with her 3rd play, Labyrinth, which also opened at Hampstead Theatre in 2016.

Wonderland marked the thirtieth anniversary of the Miners' Strike and this epic drama presents the full sweep of the turbulent events that transformed the country – from the corridors of Westminster, to pitched battles with the police, to the coal faces of Nottinghamshire. Expect dark humour and tension in Adam Penford's first play as Artistic Director in this gripping 360° look at the events leading up to and during the miner's strike.

Wonderland entwines the story of two young lads initiated into the close camaraderie of sweat, toil, collapsing roofs, explosions and bawdy humour, with the machinations of the politicians and businessmen who will decide their fate.

Set in 1983 Nottinghamshire, Wonderland sees two 16-year-olds, Malcolm (played by Chris Ashby) and Jimmy (played by Joshua Glenister) wait nervously at the pithead. Guided by veteran miner Colonel (played by Deka Walmsley), they descend into the brotherhood, banter, searing heat and liquid blue light of Welbeck Colliery.

Meanwhile in London, an American CEO known as The Butcher is brought in to reform King Coal. Pits close and a strike is called.

A Tory MP tussles with his leader's hard line ideology, whilst an eccentric dandy is sent undercover to break up the strike. Cracks appear on all sides as the embattled miners are torn apart trying to protect their livelihoods and families. Nothing will be the same again.

Taking the stage in this all-male cast as The Times reporter David Hart will be Jamie Beamish, while Nicholas Khan - well-known to the Playhouse for his role in The Kite Runner - will play pit manager Tisley and transport secretary Nicholas Ridley. Holding roles as pitmen in the story will be Tony Bell as Bobbo, and Jack Quarton as Fanny.

TV stars Harry Hepple and Matthew Cottle have been previously confirmed to play pitman Spud and real-life politician Peter Walker in the Nottingham-based show.

GARDENING MONTHLY...



General Tasks and Garden Maintenance

Continue to dig over existing beds and borders, again incorporating as much organic matter as you can. Forking over not only helps prepare the soil for spring, it helps reduce pests by exposing them to hungry birds.

Although temperatures should start to rise this month, there is still a risk of frost and even snow. Protect vulnerable plants, pots and taps from frost by wrapping insulation such as garden fleece around them and check pots and containers are raised off the ground if possible. Tender trees and shrubs will thank you for a generous application of dry mulch to protect their roots from freezing conditions.

Once the ground isn't frozen, make new beds and borders - mark the shape with sand trickled from a bottle, remove the top layer of growing vegetation and dig the ground over, incorporating as much organic matter as possible. If you are making a bed in the lawn, remove the turf and stack it upside down somewhere out of the way - after a year or two it will rot down into fantastic compost. Alternatively chop it up and bury upside down in the planting hole a good spade's depth down. Beware - if you just dig it in the buried grass will regrow and regrow and regrow and...

Remember not to let leaves accumulate around alpines - they will die if left damp for long. Cover bare patches around clumps with gritty compost to encourage regrowth.

When the weather allows, carry on clearing paths, check walls (but avoid concreting until there is no chance of frost), clean and insulate greenhouses and ensure heaters are working properly. Even a little insulation will make a huge difference to your heating bill

Clean and repair your garden tools, book the lawn mower in for a service and check garden furniture for any rot. When it is warm enough, treat sheds, fences and trellis with wood preservative; brushes and rollers are fine for most things, however a sprayer is well worth buying for tricky projects such as woven panels!

Trees, shrubs and climbers

Plant bare-rooted shrubs and trees and container-grown climbers. As long as the ground isn't frozen, February is a great month for planting as the soil will soon be warming up, encouraging new roots to grow and helping the plant to become established. Remember to plant climbers about 10" away from walls so they are not in a rain shadow.

This is an important month for pruning - cut late summer and autumn flowering clematis down to 12" - seems draconian but they will quickly grow to their old height and produce flowers all the way up into the bargain! Attend to overgrown hardy evergreens, straggly hedges and wisteria if you haven't already done so (cut all shoots coming from the permanent branches to 2-3 buds of the previous season's growth - this will encourage the development of more flowering spurs). Prune deciduous coloured leaved shrubs grown for their foliage, like the purple-leaved elders - be brutal and leave literally a couple of shoots or buds on each stem unless you want a larger specimen, in which case leave a few lightly pruned stems to spring forth. In all cases feed your shorn plant with organic fertiliser and mulch with manure or compost for a great start to the growing season.

Lastly, prune roses by taking out all dead, weak and crossing stems. Cut hybrid tea roses back to about 8" to an outward facing bud and cut floribundas (those with flowers in clusters) down to 10-12".

Once the weather eases off, remove the top layer of soil from pot-grown shrubs and replace with fresh potting compost that contains a slow-release fertiliser.

Keep off the lawn as much as possible whilst it is still wet - damage to waterlogged lawns is easily inflicted. If, towards the end of the month, the weather turns dry and mild, the lawn is firm and the grass is starting to look a little shaggy, give it a very gentle mow with the blades on the highest setting - don't be tempted if conditions are wet! Also, if you are planning a new lawn, now is probably the earliest you could start preparing the ground for seeding or laying turf. Ask for advice in your local garden centre if you are unsure as to how to begin!

It's another lean month for wildlife and especially birds. Putting out fresh water and food is really important, especially on cold days. You've heard it all before, but please do buy good quality bird food or fat/suet balls and check that water is not frozen. www.thegardencentregroup.co.uk



Warsop's Fight to be FRACK FRE

"Why should I be concerned about fracking?"

When our lives are already busy with the day to day business of earning a living, bringing up children, keeping a roof over our heads and food on the table, it seems like just too much effort to have to get involved in things that don't really seem to affect us directly.

It is so much easier to not be bothered, to let someone else deal with it. If this is how you feel, you are not alone! On average, you are probably one of 48% of the population, according to a government survey that measures people's attitude towards the Shale Gas Industry¹. The last survey in November 2017 found 13% of people supported Shale Gas; 36% of people opposed it; 48% of folk didn't know enough about it to form an opinion! Frack Free Warsop is working hard to change this, trying to raise awareness of what fracking is and how it will affect everyone. We hold exhibitions and presentations, attend shows and events, put lots of information on our Facebook page and, if you drop into the Town Hall, you can sign our petition and have a browse of the information about fracking available there. We also have car stickers for sale!

The results of the government survey shows, more than anything, how little the government has informed the average person about Shale Gas. Although they were happy to announce that they were going "all out for shale", they have effectively kept people in the dark by concentrating on what they see as benefits – jobs; energy security, (both of which are highly debatable). They gleaned over the public health and pollution aspects in the Public Health England report of 2014 by saying that the risks from damaging impacts could be kept low if the industry is controlled by a robust regulatory system. The British Medical Journal judged this report to be "a leap of faith without scientific foundation!

The government is still saying the same thing even though, since the PHE report was written, there have been hundreds of scientific studies carried out showing a variety of negative environmental and public health impacts. In August 2017, a peer-reviewed study by Eliza Czolowski et al. National Institute of Environmental Health Studies in the US, found that people living within 1 mile of producing well sites suffer increased negative health impacts, including higher risk of heart and neurological problems, cancers, increased asthma incidence and severity, and adverse birth

Does this make you concerned?

This industry has been established in the US long enough for health impacts to emerge and be quantifiable. Our government is telling us that these health impacts are "low risk" because of our "gold standard regulatory system". However, quite a few incidents have occurred on the few sites in England involved in fracking so far, where our so-called "gold standard regulations" have fallen short in being able to control the practices of this industry. For example:

- The on-going flooding at the Preston New Road site plus numerous wilful breaches in planning conditions and environmental permits surely highlight shortfalls in environmental assessment prior to construction of the site and in on-going monitoring and management
- The very first fracking operation carried out in 2011 at Preese Hall in Lancashire triggered seismic activity which resulted in well integrity failure – this is what so often leads to polluting gases and chemicals escaping into surrounding rock/aquifer. Frack Free United website features a report by Sir Richard Storey where the Preese Hall incident was looked at in detail and illustrated glaring shortfalls in monitoring and reporting procedures.
- Ineos, the company wanting to carryout fracking in our area, have a poor track record in complying with Health & Safety regulations as a matter of public record

A report by Joanne Hawkins of the University of Bristol published in the Environmental Law Review, entitled "Fracking: Minding the Gaps" carried out an in-depth analysis of the regulatory system, finding it to be "unsatisfactory" and calling for a moratorium on this

An independent review by Stirling University in 2016 concluded that "the evidence base for robust regulation and good industry practice is currently absent". This followed a similar review by Bristol University in 2015 which concluded "current regulation does not fit the technology and processes it is trying to control".



Yet the government seems to think that our regulatory system is adequate to control industry processes that are new to this country; being carried out by companies that are operating on a low-cost basis mainly financed by debt; that want to develop hundreds of new sites, all of which will need to be monitored and regulated by government agencies which are already facing reduced funding and staffing levels as a result of austerity measures.

Are you concerned yet?

In 2015, the Medact organisation of Health Professionals carried out an independent review of the public health impacts of Shale Gas Production, "Health and Fracking: The Impacts and Opportunity Costs" updated in 2016 to take account of many more recent scientific studies into the effects of this industry on public health and the environment. Their conclusion includes the following quote: "This report calls on the UK government to abandon its policy to encourage SGP in the UK...proponents of shale gas have tended to under-estimate the health and environmental risks whilst over-estimating its local economic benefits. In fact, there are significant hazards associated with SGP which may produce substantial risks to both human health and the environment."

This industry will affect you directly as it will bring into the heart of

- Industrialisation of large swathes of our surrounding countryside due to the sheer number of drill sites and wells proposed in establishing the gas field, each of which brings thousands of HGV vehicle movements on our roads leading to more congestion and greater risk of accidents
- drill site processes which cause emissions of gases harmful to public health
- a very real risk of water contamination from well integrity failure, especially in an area of old mine workings that already experiences seismic activity and with our area being in a catchment zone for the aquifer that supplies 40% of our drinking water locally
- lack of appropriate infrastructure to deal with the millions of gallons of water required per frack and the radioactive waste flow back water produced, leading to the possibility of:
- o water shortages
- o future abandoned wells being used for radioactive waste storage²
- o inadequately treated waste being released into our rivers or having a future NORM treatment facility sited nearby³

The government is facing an uphill struggle to inflict this industry on our communities as more and more people realize what living in a shale gas field will be like. Please, research the above; find out more for yourself; join the campaign to protect our communities by writing to your councillors and object at every stage of the planning procedure. Your health and the health of our environment

This is one issue on which everyone owes it to themselves and their families to be well-informed - don't be one of the 48%! Frack Free Warsop meets on the third Wednesday of the month, 7 pm in the back room of The Plough.

Statement on Mansfield **District Council's Local Plan**

Statement in response to a recent speech by **Communities Secretary** Sajid Javid.

Hayley Barsby, Interim Chief Executive at Mansfield District Council, said:

"We are disappointed to have been named as one of the 15 local authorities.

"We are confident that while we don't have an up-to-date Local Plan that this hasn't affected development in the district.
"Mansfield District Council is committed to bringing forward house building – this is demonstrated by the council supporting the Berry Hill development (formerly known as the Lindhurst development) which will create 1,700 new houses for the district.

"Of the 9,024 new homes we need to provide by 2033, planning permission already exists for 4,147.

"Over the past 12 months we have worked hard to bring forward the Local Plan and during this time we have been mindful to undertake feasibility and consultation to ensure it reflects not only the needs of the district but also the views of our communities.

"Following an initial consultation in early 2016 on the draft Local Plan, we received 1,477 comments which were then reviewed to ensure the plan is fit for purpose up to 2033.

"The council reviewed its position and prepared a new vision and objectives. These have been used to create alternative options for the delivery of sustainable housing and employment to meet future

"A Preferred Options consultation took place in October and November 2017, which included drop-in sessions across the district.

"Based on this we will be communicating with the Government by the end of January 2018 to assure them that Mansfield District Council is very much on the way to delivering the Local Plan by summer 2018."

We've got a lot of upcoming events planned for Warsop. To start off this year, I've commissioned a survey which is being sent to every house in Warsop, roughly 5000 houses in total. In my survey, I explain how I believe that in order to best help Warsop, I need to know what the residents of Warsop actually think, and what their views are on their area. With this survey, which asks a number of questions over a number of topics in Warsop, I will be able to see what the people who actually live in Warsop think the main issues are, and how they think we could try to tackle them. The survey is also freepost return, meaning that its free to return to me and doesn't need a stamp to be



- 1b. Increase the precept to cover the maintance to keep the Town Hall open.
- 1c. Create a Friends of the Town Hall community group with the aims of securing funding to keep the building maintained and open.
- 2. The council also subsidise Warsop News do you want us to keep producing the paper?
- 3. The council financially support the carnival and Remembrance day service - should we keep doing so?
- 4. The council are hoping to provide a new sports facility and swimming pool - should the precept be raised in order to achieve this?

'Use it or lose it' £100k business rates relief cash

Small businesses in Mansfield could lose out on their share of a remaining £100,000 in Government handouts to alleviate rates rises, Mansfield District Council has warned.

The council is responsible for sharing out a £360,000 pot of business rates relief money over four years and says almost half of the first year's £210,000 fund has yet to be allocated. If it is not shared out by 31 March, it will be clawed back by the Government.

The Discretionary Business Rates Relief scheme aims to support small enterprises most affected by this year's business rates revaluation. Relief of up to a maximum of £1,600 can be allocated to businesses on a discretionary basis by the council in Year One of the

Among the types of enterprises to benefit so far are filling stations, restaurants, shops, factories and warehouses.

Cllr Roger Sutcliffe, Mansfield District Council's Portfolio Holder for Finance said: "This is a gift from the Government to small businesses and there is still more than £100,000 left in this pot for this financial year to award so I would urge business owners to check if they're eligible and make an application. It is a case of use it or lose it.

Reminder letters with application forms have been sent to businesses who may qualify for this relief and this has resulted in some more applications but the council is keen that more eligible businesses do not lose out.

The main criteria are:

- The business premises' rateable value for 2017/18 must be less than £200,000.
- Their 2017/18 business rates must have increased since the previous financial year only as a result of revaluation.
- The business must occupied the premises prior to 1 April 2017 and be liable for business rates on 31 March 2017.

Mansfield Rough Sleeper Count Takes Places

Mansfield District Council has seen a fall in the number of rough sleepers in the town centre, compared to last year. In a survey of rough sleepers, 15 people were counted, compared with 27 people a year ago.

The count was carried out by Framework's Street Outreach Team, who conducted a count of the number of individuals found sleeping rough. They visited 120 locations across the town and recorded 15 rough sleepers.

Cllr Barry Answer, Mansfield District Council's Portfolio Holder for Housing said: "Framework carried out a survey of rough sleepers in Mansfield on our behalf and counted 15 people. This is a significant reduction against 27 this time last year, but even one person sleeping rough is one person too many.

"The causes of homelessness and rough sleeping are complex, but there are a range of national strategies that have a major impact on the provision of local services. As far as possible, we engage with rough sleepers positively, including taking part in walkabouts around the town with the Chief Executive, talking to people and offering them support. "In Mansfield we are continuing to ring-fence funding to tackle homelessness, which isn't happening widely across all councils. We are using this funding to provide a winter night shelter, dedicated hostel $provision, a \ homelessness \ prevention \ grant \ and \ other \ early \ intervention$ activity."

Over the past year, Mansfield District Council has worked with Framework to help accommodate 14 rough sleepers. Partners have also been working closely with people at risk of homelessness to identify and address any circumstances which could lead to the person losing their home, for example rent arrears or a reduction in their benefits.

Partners - including Mansfield Homeless Network, Framework, local charities and voluntary agencies, the police and the council's community safety team - work together to provide practical help through outreach services, healthcare and mental health services, access to a CAB advice hub which provides free independent advice and additional support to help settle people who have moved into a new home.

Cllr Answer added: "We are committed to providing support to help vulnerable homeless people get back on their feet. As the causes of homelessness and rough sleeping are not simple, the support offered needs to be designed to properly meet the intricate needs we encounter. It's much more than just giving someone a key.

"We would like to encourage people to contact Framework's homeless reporting line on 0800 066 5356, option 2, if they know or see anyone who is homeless and in need of support."

The first Christmas Fair at The Shed was held in 2016, supported by a £1,000 grant from Big Warsop, which helped to kick start the event. Creative activities in the heart of Warsop



From War Veteran to Classroom Hero

Since 2003 the bank accounts of parents all over the country have been taking a hit thanks to the phenomenon that is the Call of Duty video game franchise.

The shooter game has spawned a whole new language in many households: it is now commonplace for parents to hear their children use online military terminology such as 'kill-to-death ratios', 'highest killstreak' or even asking when they are 'next due a prestige'.

To most young people, the 'Call of Duty' is just a fantasy game – but, in November, six Meden School pupils participating in the Youth in Action project learned about the reality of combat when they met one of Warsop's real life veterans, Bill Power.

The sessions were set up and supported by Caroline Hughes from Creative Warsop, who arranged for Bill to visit the school to talk to the young people about his five tours and twenty years of military service. The pupils were enthralled as Bill took them through a 300 year historical tour of the conflicts and history of the Light Infantry. He explained some of the battles and skirmishes that had played a key part in English and Irish heritage and had forever shaped our country's future.

One young person said:

"We didn't know much about wars, other than World War One and Two. Thanks to Bill, I now know much more about other places close to home that have been affected by war."

Ben Melling from Warsop Youth Group said:

"It was great to see the young people sit and listen and refreshing to see how much pride they had in their own heritage. The session really challenged their perceptions about conflict and wars. Caroline from Creative Warsop and I were astonished when one person asked about the heritage of the poppy and challenged some of the things they had heard about the white poppy."

One of the young people who attended summed up the session perfectly when he said:

"We need more people like Bill. Bill is so much better than books. He brings all the stories and films to life."

The talk by Bill was part of a larger programme of activities being delivered by Creative Warsop, a project that aims to explore Warsop's creativity and give people opportunities to share their valuable skills and knowledge and learn from each other.

Caroline from Creative Warsop said:

"We planned the sessions at Meden School to teach craft skills that focus on recycling and also on Remembrance Day themes. Bill came along to share his experiences and there was also a session led by members of the Stitch and Sew Group who are lifelong sewing bees. Everyone worked well together and the group showed lively enthusiasm and understandina.

 $\hbox{\it "Creations in wire work using scrap, poppies made from plastic bottles}$ and tin cans, and mosaic work were produced during the sessions. The group explored 'Wave', the poppy installation from the Tower of London that is now touring the country. The group considered a new take on the old idea by using a sea of poppies made of camouflage material. The young people looked at World War One tank designs and war paintings by Paul Nash and used these as inspiration to come up with a poignant idea for a group mosaic.

"The mosaic idea the group came up with featured soldiers from both sides in a conflict of attrition, sitting back to back against a burned out tree wrapped in barbed wire.

"This illustrated a point Bill had made that since the supposed 'War to end all Wars' of 1914-18, there have only been three days when a British soldier has not fought in a conflict somewhere in the world."

The art of war

The Creative Warsop project has also been working with the Stitch and Sew group, which is a fantastic social hub for stitchers, knitters, and sewing bee members. In November, Creative Warsop ran a session with the group on The Art of World War One.

Caroline from Creative Warsop said: "We explored the context of the twentieth century art world and the war itself. When we examined the Imperial War Museum collections there were some really enlightened responses to the art of the period."

The Stitch and Sew group considered styles of Vorticism, Cubism and Fauvism and then focused on war artists and brothers Paul and John Nash, whose direct images portrayed their experience as army officers on the front line. They also looked at Stanley Spencer's religious and often poignant paintings depicting his timé as a hospital orderly and later as a soldier on the front.

The group discussed themes such as the stark reality of war scapes; man as pawn or machine; the light shining through a war-torn landscape; and eternal concepts of redemption. They considered how they would form a tapestry in the style of Bayeaux, or each person creating a panel in needle-felt inspired by the shapes and content of the paintings they had studied.

Warsop Inner Wheel Magnificent Market, Warsop

DID YOU KNOW: Christmas Markets originated in Germany, and the tradition goes back to the late Middle Ages. One of the first known records of such Christmas markets was recorded in 1384. A Christmas market, also known as Christkindlmarkt, Marché de Noël, Christkindlesmarkt, Christkindlmarket, Christkindlimarkt, and Weihnachtsmarkt are usually street markets associated with celebrating Christmas during the four weeks of advent.

The night before the market we were able to get in to the venue and set up some of the more complex stalls with many items on them such as the Bric-a-Brac, Sue's Boutique and Christine's arrangements. A few of the committee members came to lend a hand, oh and try on a few items from the boutique.

The day dawned and was full of surprises and people setting up before the doors opened. There were so many stall holders this year that we almost ran out of tables. We had a few new faces to welcome from East Midlands Labrador Rescue and The D Boutique. Once everyone was settled, President Helen opened the 2017 Christmas Market at 10 o'clock.


A mince pie and a hot drink were available with the ticket price of £3 and a steady flow of Inner Wheel members from District 22 started to come through the doors.

The Friends of Thynghowe's focus for the first part of 2018 will be on the tracks and roads through the part of Sherwood Forest that lies within the parishes of Warsop, Budby and Edwinstowe.

Old maps indicate coach roads through the forest and we are attempting to find traces of their lines on the ground before we hold a map workshop on 10th March when we will collate the information we have collected. All interested folk are welcome to join us for these activities.

Another project involves the ancient trackway that ran northwards from Hanger Hill along the boundary between Warsop and Budby. This track was lined with a hedge but the few remaining hawthorns have become very overgrown with a risk of becoming uprooted whenever there are high winds. The local Forestry Commission guys have kindly supported our plans to preserve this hedgerow by laying a couple of these old trees and topping others to encourage regrowth from the base. They are also providing hawthorn whips to plant in the gaps between the old hawthorns. We hope to start this task on 9th February and you are welcome to come along and help.

We are also helping with the control of rhododendrons in the forest. Although many people find these plants attractive when in flower they can rapidly spread and form an impenetrable barrier that overwhelms native plants. These rhododendron plants would have been introduced by the Dukes of Portland as ornamental planting, particularly in the area around the Russian Log Cabin. If left unmanaged they would devalue the wildlife and heritage sites in the forest.

Advance notice of a couple of our main events. The annual perambulation walk to Thynghowe will take place on Saturday 21st April. On this walk, we will visit heritage sites in the forest and continue the tradition of assembling on the hill.

Over the weekend of 12th and 13th May the re-enactors of Regia Anglorum will return to Sherwood Pines for the Viking Spring Thing.

Last November the first half of a documentary about Nottinghamshire's Vikings was filmed around Thynghowe by NottsTV. You can view this programme on their website nottstv. com/programmes/rediscovering-notts/

Mansfield sporting heroes recognised at awards ceremony

Mansfield celebrated another great year for sport at the 2017 Sports Recognition Awards on Monday night on 11th December 2018.

The annual ceremony, organised by Mansfield District Council in association with The Armchair Club and the Chad, recognised the district's sporting greats, including the best teams, coaches, volunteers, sportsmen and sportswomen. Staged at the Civic Quarter, Civic Centre, Chesterfield Road South, the awards attracted 41 nominations across ten categories.

There were also two additional awards; the Mayor's Special Achievement Award, which recognises the work of an individual in promoting sport within the district and the lan Bagshaw Memorial Award in memory of Water Meadows manager lan Bagshaw, who lost his life to leukaemia in May 2014, aged 57.

This year, the council recognised 25 years of the Nova Centurion Swim Club of which Glenn Smith, Mansfield District Council's Swim Coach and Development Officer, has coached for the past 22 years. Within that time the squad has seen four Paralympic Gold medals over three Paralympic games and 10 Paralympic medals in all, placed athletes on every Great Britain Paralympic Games team since 2004 including Callum Lawson in Athens 2004, Sam Hynd and Charlotte Henshaw in Bejing 2008, Ollie Hynd MBE and Charlotte Henshaw in London 2012, and Ollie Hynd MBE and Charlotte Henshaw in Rio 2016.

The squad has also seen athletes placed on World class AB and Paralympic programmes, European Youth Olympic and European Junior Championships. They have also won countless national and regional medals as well as being finalists in many national and regional events.



Local Sidecar Racing Champions Celebrate At Civic Event

Executive Mayor of Mansfield Kate Allsop invited local brothers, Tom and Ben Birchall, to a civic event on Thursday 30 November to celebrate their world-class achievements in Sidecar Racing.

The Mansfield brothers retained the World Sidecar Racing title again this year for the third time and won both of the Isle of Mann TT races too, making them the only sidecar team in history of the sport to win both prestigious titles in the same year.

The pair were also the Southern hundred race winners and 2017 British championship runners up, making 2017 their most successful year to date. After already being awarded Freedom of the district in 2009, the highest honour the town can give to its citizens, when they won their first World Championship title, the Mayor wanted the council to provide the brothers with a celebratory evening to congratulate them on their outstanding achievements.

At the celebration evening there was a civic procession led by Cllr David Smith, Chairman of the Charter of the Trustees, who carried the golden mace, followed by a Q and A interview, a three course meal and disco.

Kate Allsop, Executive Mayor of Mansfield, said: "The boys have done Mansfield proud yet again and I wanted to give them an evening to remember so that we could celebrate their achievements together. We are immensely proud of Ben and Tom and would like to thank them for all of their commitment and hard work. Congratulations to the Birchalls!"

Ben Birchall said: "We are so grateful to have had this Civic Reception in recognition of our success on the track and can't thank our supporters, friends and family enough for being behind us all the way. We're just local lads who have a passion for our sport and hope many other youngsters can follow in our footsteps."

Paralympic Swimmer Goes For Gold

Mansfield's Paralympic swimming superstar Ollie Hynd MBE has been selected for Team England in the forthcoming Commonwealth Games to be held on Australia's Gold Coast from 4 to 15 April 2018.

This will be Ollie's second appearance at the Commonwealth Games after winning the Gold medal in the SM8 200m Individual Medley in Glasgow 2014.

Ollie will be competing in the same event in Australia, which is scheduled for Sunday 8 April 2018.

Ollie is the Paralympic, World and European champion and World Record holder in this event, and hopes are high that he can repeat his 2014 Gold medal winning performance and add to his already hugely impressive list of titles, medals and records.

Mansfield District Council's Swimming Development Officer, Glenn Smith who is Ollie's coach at Nova Centurion Swimming Club, said: "This is another incredible honour for Ollie, and is testament to his incredible work ethic, drive and ambition, and we wish him every success in Australia. It's also a great honour for Mansfield District Council, Nova Centurion Swimming Club and Nottinghamshire Amateur Swimming Association, to have Ollie selected for a second time and I'm sure everyone will pass on their best wishes in the coming days and weeks. He's really looking forward to it and is ready to show the world what he's capable of once again."

Cllr Andrew Tristram, Portfolio Holder for Environment and Wellbeing at Mansfield District Council, added: "We are very proud of all of Ollie's achievements so far and on behalf of everyone at the council and across the district, I would like to wish him the very best of luck at GC2108. We'll be supporting him all the way."

Ollie had a fantastic British Summer Championships in July 2017, smashing his own S8 category world record in the 400m freestyle in a time two seconds faster than he swam in the Rio 2016 Paralympic final. This earned him the gold medal in the multi class event and he also posted the number one ranked time in the world this year in the SM8 200m Ind medley, which also earned him the gold medal in the event.

Council Tenant at 100 Still Living Independently

Meet the amazing Marie Rowley, who has marked her 100th birthday, making her one of Mansfield District Council's oldest tenants who is still living independently.

The oldest resident at Poppy Fields Extra Care sheltered housing complex, Marie celebrated reaching her centenary with a surprise party on 17 January attended by family, friends, councillors and neighbours at the Poppy Fields Community Hub, close to her two-bedroom bungalow.

Still able to do much of her own personal care and cook light meals, she gets about with the help of a wheeled frame and is a regular at Poppy Fields Luncheon Club.

Apart from receiving support from carers and wearing an alarm call pendant, which enables her to speak to a central control room at any time of the day or night if she has any concerns, Marie lives an independent life and is in fairly good health, having already survived a brain haemorrhage, cerebral encephalitis and breast cancer.

She spends her days reading, watching TV and has had a life-long interest in poetry which she continues to write in a meticulously neat capital script and recites with a fluent gusto.

Sharon Mays, a Mansfield District Council Assist Response Officer, who supports the pensioner at Poppy Fields, said:

"Marie is an amazing lady – it is really unusual for someone to be living independently at such an age but she manages very well and is quite a character here at Poppy Fields.

"Older people prefer to be in their own homes and places like Poppy Fields enable this to happen."

Cllr Barry Answer, Portfolio Holder for Housing, who attended Marie's party, said:

"What a lady! And isn't it fantastic that with the right support in place that she is able to stay living in her own home. This is exactly what this kind of sheltered housing aims to achieve."

Marie grew up in Clipstone and Forest Town and has also lived in Annesley Woodhouse and Kirkby-in-Ashfield.

She worked as a ledger clerk for ten years with the National Coal Board in Bestwood. Before that she was a shop assistant at the Co-op and a bus conductor with Trent buses in Hucknall.

She was married three times - "I am a glutton for punishment!" - and has two sons, one grandchild and a great grandchild.

During her third marriage, which lasted several decades, she and her husband, George Rowley, developed an interest in dog showing.

A few years after George's sudden death at 67, love continued to blossom for Marie, explained her son, Tony Thompson, 71, of Croxton Kerrial, near Grantham.

"A few years before the start of the Second World War, my mother was seeing a young lad called Eddie Iball. They were in love and planned to marry. However it was not to be and Eddie joined the RAF, went off to war and they lost touch.

"In her 70s, my mother had a chance meeting with her long lost love, Eddie, and they started seeing each other and going out again. They moved in together and had quite a few good years together until sadly Eddie died of a heart condition.

"My mother has soldiered on through life and has outlived the majority of her friends and relatives, reaching that magical 100 years. I am sure she will continue for several more."

So what is Marie's secret to a long life?

"Not overdoing things, take things slowly – don't rush things, you are not missing anything. I have not done anything really very exciting in my life. I just live day to day and take what comes. I put up with what I don't like and enjoy what I do like."

Stockwell Gate North Development Plans Move a Step Closer

The development plans for Stockwell Gate North moved a step closer as Mansfield District Council's Portfolio Holder for Finance, Cllr Roger Sutcliffe, upheld the original decision to dispose of the site, following a call-in of the original decision.

The site has been declared surplus to the council's requirements and will now be sold to the ARBA Group, a local Mansfield firm, for re-development

ARBA Group intends to build an 80-bed hotel with roof terrace, restaurant, café, bar and gym. The proposed scheme also includes a piazza and open space along with other landscaping. The ARBA Group now will continue negotiations with Mansfield District Council and national hotel, food and drinks operators to bring the plans to fruition over the next two years.

Executive Mayor of Mansfield Kate Allsop said:

"We are very pleased that our long term vision to regenerate the town centre, coupled with the desire to establish a much-needed hotel in Mansfield, have taken a step closer. Redeveloping this key gateway site will make the town centre an inviting and enjoyable place to visit and stay, and this will in turn help to create a thriving

Speaking on behalf of the ARBA Group, managing director Richard Burns said:

"This is a fantastic site in Mansfield and will act as a gateway development for the town centre. It's the ideal location for a hotel and associated leisure facilities, and will help drive footfall into other town centre shops and businesses."

Richard added: "Being local, we know that Mansfield is a perfect location for exactly this type of development. It is surrounded by a number of hugely popular tourist destinations and we need to be making sure that when people come to this area, their hotel stay is in Mansfield."

The council has continually looked for opportunities to redevelop the site in order to address the regeneration aspirations for the town since 2013, when the old bus station was relocated.

Mansfield Museum Earns Top Education Award

Mansfield Museum has earned another prestigious award to add to its growing collection of accolades.

It recently qualified for the Sandford Award, which independently assesses heritage sites, museums, archives and collections across the British Isles on the quality of their education programmes, acting as a kind of 'kite mark' for education provision.

The town's museum will be joining an illustrious list of almost 500 sites which have received an award since the scheme began in 1978, including the Palace of Holyroodhouse in Edinburgh, the official residence of the Queen in Scotland; Worcester Cathedral and London Transport Museum.

The Award, managed by the Heritage Education Trust in partnership with Bishop Grosseteste University, in Lincoln, focuses on curriculum-linked education opportunities offered to schools by heritage sites, as well as informal learning, such as family programmes.

Museum manager and curator Liz Weston MBE, who will receive the award with Museum Education Officer Geoff Liptrot at a ceremony in Bath on 21 November, said:

"It is a prestigious award and shows that our education service is of a high standard and it is also fantastic recognition for Geoff. It is the first time we have entered it and we are delighted!"

In the report by Lead Judge Jean MacIntyre, the museum was highly rated for the overall quality of experience.

Geoff Liptrot was singled out for particular praise for providing "an engaging and inspirational educational programme".

"The Museum Education Officer is charismatic and inspirational and brings the museum to life," said the report.

"He was very skilled at engaging and informing the pupils. He told captivating anecdotes about the artefacts he presented, providing social and historical contexts for the form and function of each one to ensure the pupils would remember them."

The judges assessed a school visit to the museum by a group of Year 3 pupils and noted that the youngsters were made to feel welcome in an effectively structured, well thought-out, well paced tour. The pupils also undertook practical activities.

The report, which commended the museum's Made in Mansfield exhibition and the way the museum collaborated with teachers to develop its educational programme, said:

Nail salon fined £2,700 for health and safety offence

A Mansfield nail bar salon has been ordered to pay a total of more than £6,000 for a health and safety offence after a customer was left with a nail infection.

Thi Thu Huyen Le, who runs Lily's Nails, in Leeming Street, was fined £2,700 by Mansfield Magistrates after admitting one Health and Safety at Work offence in a case prosecuted by Mansfield District

She was also ordered to pay costs of £3,193.50, compensation of £100 and a £170 victim surcharge.

The court was told that Lily's Nails first came to the attention of Mansfield District Council in 2013 when an Environmental Health Officer visited the premises and offered advice on good practices and health and safety of employees and customers, including guidance on sanitising reusable products and equipment and not using an electric file on a natural nail.

In January 2017, the council received a complaint from a Lily's Nails customer, Georgina Kimberley, after she had visited the salon in December 2016 to have false nails applied.

The court heard that during the procedure, the nail salon assistant hurt Georgina Kimberley and left her finger bleeding after damaging the skin, and used an electric file on natural nails.

The court was told that Georgina Kimberley's daughter, Gemma Kimberley, who was with her mother in the salon, also noticed that tools used on her mother were then used on another customer without being cleaned.

Two days after the procedure, Georgina Kimberley was in pain and noticed that her nails were weeping and oozing. A GP diagnosed a nail infection and prescribed her anti-biotics and a fungal cream.

As a result of her complaint to the council, Environmental Health Officers visited the salon on 10 January and investigated.

After the case, Cllr Bill Drewett, Portfolio Holder for Safer Communities, said:

"There was a high level of culpability in this case by Lily's Nails, whose owner showed a disregard for health and safety at work law, which is there to protect employees and customers alike.

"Nail bars have become increasingly popular in recent years but it is important that the services they offer are safe and it is the council's responsibility to ensure they operate at the required standards.

"Our advice is that if you ever come across a salon using an electric file on a natural nail, get them to stop immediately - or walk away - because the damage caused can be significant.

"I hope this case sends a message to other operators that we take hygiene and public safety very seriously."

Mansfield man ordered to pay £634 for littering

A Mansfield man has been ordered to pay a total of £634 for littering. The case, prosecuted by Mansfield District Council, was heard by **Southern Derbyshire Magistrates' Court on 6 December.**

David Webster (31) of Victoria Street, Mansfield, indicated no plea to the court and the case was proved in his absence. He was fined £440, and ordered to pay costs of £150 and a victim surcharge of £44. The court was told that on 12 May this year a Neighbourhood Warden saw Webster throw a screwed up piece of paper onto the road from a car which was parked on Rosemary Street in Mansfield and issued with a Fixed Penalty Notice (FPN) for £75.

The FPN was never paid so the council prosecuted Webster

Cllr Bill Drewett, Portfolio Holder for Safer Communities at Mansfield District Council, said after the case:

"People need to be very clear about littering: if you drop litter in this district, you could be facing a Fixed Penalty Notice. If you ignore that £75 FPN, we will take you to court and that could be much more expensive as you would face a fine and costs but also because you could end up with a criminal record, as well.

"Our advice is don't drop litter. There are plenty of bins provided and if there isn't one around, take your litter home. We always take littering





Footpath & **Countryside Group**

Spring may seem a long way off but there should be a some colourful signs appearing as a few wildflowers start flowering. If you walk alongside a hedgerow or the edge of a wood you may see the whites of Snowdrops, the greenish flowers of Dog's Mercury, yellow Lesser Celandines, the small blue blooms of Speedwell and the red variety of Dead-nettles.



The annual RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch takes place over the last weekend of January. The 2017 results revealed that top three species recorded were House Sparrow, Starling and Blackbird. Although they were doing better than in recent years, starlings numbers have declined by 79% since the first Birdwatch in 1979. Other birds in decline are the greenfinch and chaffinch, possibly partly due to the Trichomonosis disease that is usually spread through contaminated food or water. The risk of this can be reduced by regularly cleaning and disinfecting bird feeders and bird baths. Rotating the positions of feeders in the garden can prevent the build up of contamination in any one area of ground below the feeders.

The tasks that this group completes each year follows the seasons. Mowing the grass along our public footpaths usually starts in May and continues until September and managing Himalayan balsam along Warsop's waterways is carried out over a similar period. During autumn, we complete management work on wildlife sites and then most of our hedge and tree work takes place during winter. Other jobs that we fit in are installing footpaths signs, surveying for water voles and maintaining our machines. We have had to cancel some recent work sessions due to shortage of available volunteers so if you would like to join us for around three hours on a Thursday morning please get in touch.

The problems associated with waste plastic have been receiving a lot of publicity recently, particularly where it accumulates in the oceans. Much of this plastic originates from our rivers. Even in Warsop, there is evidence of this. There are several spots along the banks of the River Meden where plastic accumulates. In one site downstream from Burns Bridge I came across a large pile of plastic bottles and cans. My first thought was that some folk had been enjoying a party before I realised that the rubbish had been washed downstream after heavy rainfall! Despite the number of people who pick up discarded plastic bottles from our countryside, it is becoming almost impossible to take a walk without coming across somebody's discarded rubbish.


