Volunteers Needed for Mansfield's Homeless Shelter

Plans are underway to extend Mansfield's Winter Night Shelter which provides rough sleepers with a safe haven during the coldest months of the year.

Mansfield District Council is working with local churches and partner agencies including Framework and Derby City Mission in the hope of providing the night shelter for seven nights a week from 1 December 2018 to the end of February 2019 - a total of 90 nights. This is an increase from the 54 nights it was open last year.

Derby City Mission held a special evening at the Chesterfield Road Methodist Church last week to thank the 20 volunteers and two employed night staff who helped to run the previous night shelter and to appeal to them to get involved again in the coming winter. More than 40 people attended the event many of whom registered their interest in becoming volunteers to help run the shelter in 2018/19.

There was also an appeal for new volunteers to get involved as more will be needed later this year. The council is asking people who are interested in volunteering to register their interest by contacting the council's Engagement and Development Officer on 01623 415962.

The winter shelter was hosted by two churches, the Methodist Church and Baptist Church, both on Chesterfield Road, which between them provided shelter three nights a week from 23 December 2017, increasing to four nights and then finally to seven nights a week for its last two weeks of operation before closing its doors on 13 March 2018.

A total of 66 people (58 men and eight women) accessed the shelter over the 54 nights that it was open, with an average of 11 staying on any one night. Despite seeing 60 different people, only one guest stayed more than half the nights, and only a further ten guests stayed 10 nights or more.

Of the 11 people who accessed the night shelter for more than 10 nights, four gained supported housing within the district while many more received advice and support from the council and other agencies. Since the night shelter closed a further five people are currently working with the council's Homelessness team to access accommodation.

In addition to the winter night shelter, Framework's Street Outreach team is out on the district's streets every week of the year actively looking for and trying to engage with rough sleepers to help them access the many services that are available.

Cllr Barry Answer, Portfolio Holder for Housing at Mansfield District Council, said: "The night shelter is a very important part of the work we do for our street homeless and allows us to work with some of the hardest to reach individuals in the district, giving them access to a safe, clean and warm place to sleep in the coldest months, access to a good meal and more importantly access to services that can help them into housing.

"The difficulty is that not all of those who are homeless are willing to accept the help that is offered – but that is their choice and we will continue to do all we can to support them.

"Working with our partners, in particular Derby City Mission, who will be helping us again this year, we hope to increase provision next winter and would like to encourage other local churches and volunteers to help with this essential service."



GARDENING MONTHLY...



General Tasks and garden maintenance

Water thoroughly once or twice a week rather than little and often - this encourages plants to put down roots in search of water rather than coming up to the surface. Remember, though, that containers and hanging baskets need watering every day and sometimes even twice a day if it is hot and windy.

For recently planted large shrubs or trees, leave a hose trickling around the base for an hour. The same goes for established plants in very dry periods - pay particular attention to camellias, rhododendrons, azaleas and hydrangeas which will abort next season's flowers if they get too dry. Mulch around the roots when moist to help avoid this. Recently planted hedges are best watered with a trickle hose (a length of old hose punctured with little holes) left running for an hour or so.

Ensure trees or shrubs planted in the last couple of years on lawns or in areas of rough grass have a circle of clear earth around them - this must be kept clear or grass will prevent essential moisture getting through. Mulching with bark or compost will help.

Water is a precious commodity - instigate good practices such as using kitchen and bath water (as long as it is neither too dirty, greasy nor full of detergent) for watering, collect rainwater in butts (available from the centre) and investigate ways to recycle water for your irrigation. Avoid using tap water for lime-hating plants such as camellias, rhododendrons and azaleas - they will not thank you for it!

The key to successful planting, whether it be a shrub, tree, perennial or bedding plant is to water in well. Soak the rootball in a bucket until no air bubbles come to the surface, dig the planting hole, fill with water and allow to drain away. Place the plant in the hole, fill with soil, firm gently and water well with a watering can - this will give the plant a huge advantage over one planted with a dry rootball in a dry hole and watered only on the surface.

Hoe beds and borders to get rid of annual weeds, like bitter cress and chickweed. If it's dry, attack perennial weeds like ground elder and the like with systemic weed killer painted onto the leaves and trail tips of bindweed into jam jars full of the same. Remember systemic weed killers are indiscriminate and will kill anything they contact. If you don't have time to do this, at least cut the culprits down to prevent them from

Keep your pond topped up with fresh water - a build up of algae in warm weather can be toxic, if not fatal, for animals.

As summer wears on and the ground hardens, it becomes more difficult for birds to forage for food. So do please put out food to supplement their diet and help build reserves for winter

Flowers and containers

Divide old clumps of bearded irises and replant. Chop oriental poppies, lupins, delphiniums and geraniums right down to the ground once they have finished flowering - be brave and be brutal - the new leaves will be an ornament and some may flower again. Support tall delphinium stems with individual canes.

Cheat and fill any gaps in your borders with container-grown perennials. Dahlias will keep colour going until the first frosts so are a great autumn brightener in mixed borders. Pick sweet peas regularly - this is in effect early deadheading and will ensure continued flowering. Remember sweet peas are thirsty plants so keep them well

Lawns

Keep mowing your lawn but raise the height of your blades if the weather remains hot. Feed established lawns if you haven't already done so with a summer lawn feed. If your lawn is mossy or full of weeds, use a feed with mosskiller or weedkiller, although this will also kill any wild flowers. If you have the lot, use combined feed, weed and mosskiller!

Add your grass clippings to the compost heap in shallow layers. A huge dollop will only turn slimy and spoil your compost.

Don't let newly laid lawns dry out in hot weather - water in the evenings and if there is a heat wave, consider leaving the lawn longer than usual just to help it through the

If you are planning to seed a new lawn in the autumn, start preparing the area to allow the earth time to settle.



THE FIGHT FOR A FRACK FREE WARSOP

Warsop Parish Council, at its meeting in May, was asked why articles on the fight for a frack free Warsop do not give the "alternate" viewpoint. Just in case anyone is unaware, Frack Free Warsop is an anti-fracking group which has been given the opportunity to report in our local paper. We wonder if this comment stems from a lack of knowledge about the group, so please read on for more information.

Frack Free Warsop was set up in 2017, after a public presentation by Frack Free Notts and Mansfield which was truly disturbing; a real eye-opener to those of us who had heard of fracking but didn't really know what was involved. We were introduced to the processes used in drilling and fracking for shale gas and shown some of the evidence of its impact on the environment in the shale gas areas of the US and Australia.

We could not believe that our government would be in favour of going ahead with such an environmentally devastating industry and were horrified to learn that, not only were we in a fracking licence area, it was coming our way - the map (shows in red) sites under application or construction near us:

We also learned that there is a huge amount of information in the public domain about the negative impacts of fracking but neither the Government nor the fracking industry readily talks about the risks involved, presumably because they want us to accept it into our communities with as little hassle and cost to them as possible. When you realise that there is a rather large downside, you start to question just how big a price we are going to pay for this fracked gas.

Gas - at what price?


England is the only UK country and the Conservatives the only party in favour of fracking. They justify their decision to support fracking by saying we need it to help secure our gas supplies, that it will bring lots of jobs to local areas and is a bridge to a low carbon energy future. The question you need to ask yourself is, just how high a price are you willing to pay for this gas?

Costing our climate - fracking will tie us into using fossil fuels well into the second half of this century when indications are they are already impacting our climate and immediate action needs to be taken to reduce our dependence.

Costing earlier green energy - the Government report on security of supply shows we have secure gas supplies for at least the next twenty years – the fracking "bridge" is simply prolonging our dependence on gas; shouldn't we be using this time to concentrate on developing renewables and build on the current trend of reducing consumption through better insulation and energy conservation schemes?

Cost to the taxpayer - if we stopped giving tax breaks, soft loans and subsidies to the fossil fuel industry and invested that money in developing new green energy technologies, how much faster would progress be made towards a healthier, more sustainable planet? In 2015, the fossil fuel industry received an estimated \$5.3 trillion in subsidies globally, according to the International Monetary Fund (Carbonbrief.org)



Aims of the Group

We made it the aim of our group to raise public awareness of the aspects of the shale gas industry being glossed over by the mainstream media. They say: more local jobs. We say: low skilled, low in number and temporary (drilling is done by highly skilled teams moving from site to site). They say: security of gas supply. We say: an estimated 6,100 wells (Friends of the Earth report) needed to replace just half of UK's imported gas at the cost of rural environmental



We found that the government is actively facilitating the industry whilst seeming to ignore the peer-reviewed studies coming out of the US and Australia, where the shale gas industry has been established long enough for the detrimental effects to become obvious and recordable.

Is fracking safe?

It is just about impossible to find a report which will state categorically that fracking is safe; even the government will only say it is safe when adding the proviso "when industry follows best practice enforced by regulation", that "risks cannot be eliminated but can be minimized". The government says that their position draws on "independent reviews by the Royal Society and Royal Academy of Engineering and Public Health England". Both these reports are now out of date, (2012 and 2014), and superseded by over 700 peerreviewed studies globally, the majority showing negative impacts from fracking.

Both reports conclude with strong recommendations to the Government on minimising risks that, to date, have not been fully implemented. The Medact report in 2016/17, a scientific study of fracking from health perspectives, incorporated evidence from more recent studies - it recommends a moratorium on fracking.

Most recently we have seen the research by emeritus Professor Peter Styles presented at the House of Lords which made clear that fracking in former mining areas like ours is particularly dangerous and could trigger seismic activities. Because of that we are asking for the support of the Parish Council, of the County Council and our local MP to obtain former Coal Board maps which show where the fault lines are in order that we can better understand the dangers for

Safety depends on "best practice"

Our communities are going to bear the risks of the shale gas industry; not the Government and not the fracking companies. The Government is putting our health and our environment into the hands of an industry whose bottom line is profit.

We have tried to highlight that "best practice" is not being enforced; anyone following what's happening at drill sites under construction will know that "best practice" so far has included breaches of planning conditions and permits; conditions being bent or broken or simply amended by planning officers at the drop of a hat - the regulatory system on which all of our safety and that of our precious environment depends, is inadequate and failing us all.

The government is now proposing changing the planning laws to further help the industry and, in so doing, take away our democratic right to object to these developments by making drilling exploratory wells "permitted development"; the law that enables you to build a garden shed will enable the fracking companies to build a drilling rig in the field next to your home, no planning application needed!

The Oil and Gas Industry has been responsible for some of the biggest man-made environmental disasters in recent times, their damage to our precious ecosystems globally is on-going. They are used to riding roughshod over a mainly self-regulatory system. In the UK, some of the companies involved in onshore shale gas extraction have poor safety and health records. Ruthless in their determination to frack, Ineos are suing the National Trust and Scotland; IGas is having protestors arrested using Ineos' controversial blanket injunction which takes away the public's right to peacefully protest near their sites. Cuadrilla has a similar injunction. "Best practice" seems to mean what is best for the companies involved.

Our challenge

Our group is made up of ordinary, Warsop citizens who have taken on the challenge of trying to protect our community against an industry which, in our opinion, brings risks that will far outweigh any benefits, risking our heritage sites, tourism sites, agriculture, our water supplies and the very air we breathe. The government and the Oil and Gas Industry are daunting in their power and the depth of their pockets. The only weapon we have is to shine a light on the darker aspects of the shale gas industry and hope that people start to listen, research and respond to our elected representatives. People, in numbers large enough, can change the policies of the

Fracking is not a done deal; the shale gas industry is struggling financially. However, the Government could yet implement this policy through our apathy. Protestors have held back the industry for seven years; if everyone who thinks that this industry is too risky took action, the Government would have to listen.

The alternative view

Over the year, we have reported on new developments by the government and the shale gas industry, giving our thoughts on the implications. We have called into question the methods they are employing in foisting this industry upon our communities. We highlight the way they are chipping away at democracy, free speech and our human right to a life-sustaining environment. We have tried to highlight the industry's methods: permission creep; flaunting of planning conditions; using the police as corporate security guards at our expense. We have pointed out the Government's intentions of reducing our ability to protest or to even have a voice in the planning system. We have tried to show how the small amount of information actually published by Government and the shale gas industry is inadequate, insufficient and fundamentally flawed.

We are the alternative view

Alex Peace-Gadsby, Chief Commissioner of England for the Scouts said:



Masquerade Charity Ball



Notts Gears up for the Return of **Tour of Britain**

Nottinghamshire has been chosen to host the penultimate - and longest - stage of the OVO Energy Tour of Britain cycle race.

The biggest free-to-attend sporting event returns to Nottinghamshire this year on Saturday 8 September starting in West Bridgford and ending in Mansfield.

The announcement comes on the back of last year's successful event which attracted 210,000 supporters on the day - one of the biggest turn-outs across the eight stage race across the UK. The race boosted the Nottinghamshire economy by more than

With a global TV audience of millions, once again the eyes of the world will be on Nottinghamshire when 120 of the world's top cyclists race the longest stage which is approximately 223 km long (139 miles).

The route will take in key Nottinghamshire landmarks such as the new Sherwood Forest Visitor centre, Newstead Abbey, Clumber Park and Trent Bridge Cricket Ground. The race will travel through many towns and villages in the south of the county as well as taking riders over the iconic Trent Bridge for the first time.

Councillor Kay Cutts, Leader of Nottinghamshire County Council said,

"We are absolutely delighted that the race will be returning to our great county on Saturday 8 September - and will take in every district, including the City area.

"Last year's event really was a fantastic day and shows that Nottinghamshire has what it takes to host a sporting event of this

"We hope even more residents and visitors will turn out in force to experience this fantastic event this year - and let's hope the county reaps even bigger economic benefits"

Mick Bennett, Tour of Britain Race Director added;

"The turn-out for the Nottinghamshire stage last year really was incredible. The viewing figures for ITV4 show that Stage Four was popular with the audience at home too, with half a million people tuning in to watch the highlights– attracting the highest ratings of any of the other seven highlight shows.

"So we are delighted to be returning to Nottinghamshire as this year's route makes it seem like a completely different county! We are taking in a lot of new areas, approaching a significant part of 2017's route from the opposite direction as well as having hillier

The route will take in dozens of towns and villages including Ruddington, Cotgrave, Radcliffe-on-Trent, Southwell, Retford, Worksop and Hucknall.

Commenting on West Bridgford being chosen to host the start of the race, Councillor Simon Robinson, Leader of the Rushcliffe Borough Council said:

"We are absolutely delighted to welcome such a unique, prestigious event to the borough for the first time.

"We are proud of our heritage in sport and it's fantastic we have been chosen as a host county and that so much of the stage will ride through Rushcliffe."

Kate Allsop, Executive Mayor of Mansfield, said:

"We are very pleased and proud that Mansfield has been chosen as a host for the second year in a row - this time for the exciting finish. As it is on a Saturday, we hope this will enable even more people than last year to line the streets and provide a huge welcome for the cyclists as they make their way to the

"There will be plenty of ways you can get involved - from decorating your home or business, entering competitions, to enjoying the cycling-themed entertainment at our summer - so keep an eye out for more information nearer the

"We hope you will join us to show the world the very best that Mansfield has to offer."

The economic impact report commissioned by national Tour of Britain organisers showed that spend on food and drink was by far the biggest contributor to the local economy last time (almost £1.13m) followed by accommodation costs (£611k)

More than 39 per cent of those who turned out to watch the race had travelled from outside the county - therefore attracting around 81,000 visitors to Nottinghamshire.

Other figures shown in the report include:

- Average daily spend for day visitor was more than £27
- Overnight visitors spend more than £101 on average
- Almost two-thirds of spectators said the race had inspired them to cycle more
- · Half of those attending came with their families.

Warsop Youth Club took ownership in 2014 and the rest, as they say, is history. At first, progress seemed incredibly slow but since the newly named Adam Eastwood Building opened its doors to public use in February 2016, progress has been phenomenal. From the humble beginnings of just one night of youth activities per week, the building is now in use every weekday evening and most weekends, for activities ranging from the Youth Club to judo, Sport4kidz, dog training, karate, Go-Extreme activities and children's parties. With the help of Vibrant Warsop CiC, daytime activities are increasing with a regular Pilates session and the Fit Together Club for adults

For the Trustees of Warsop Youth Club, this has been a bit of a roller-coaster ride, taking a leap of faith in once again employing its own workers to provide a youth club, as well as taking on the responsibility of owning, developing and managing the building.

Warsop Youth Club began life in 1961 with wooden premises on Carr Lane, employing its own workers. In 1964 it was registered as a charity, with Notts County Council providing the youth workers from 1970 onwards. The old premises were destroyed by fire in 1996. After several years of not operating, the youth club re-opened in 2000 at Unit 2000 on Church Street. Unit 2000 was closed as a youth club in 2011 as a result of County Council funding cuts, but the trustees kept the charity going in the hope that the club would one day re-open. This was the situation we were in when the Trustees were approached to take on the former Eastwood depot in 2013.

Warsop Youth Club was re-born in October 2016. With a great band of youth workers and volunteers, the Club in partnership with Sport-4Kidz, is now achieving amazing results, with an average attendance of over 80 young people per week. The Youth Club has also undertaken to take youth activities to other villages in the parish with the Youth Club Roadshow being held on parks over the summer months.

WYC could not have achieved any of the above were it not for the fabulous support we have received. Our thanks are due to the Sir John Eastwood Foundation, Big Warsop Local Trust, Warsop Parish Council, Notts County Council, The Rotary Club of Warsop and Shirebrook, Bowrings Transport, Dukeries Lions Club, Warson United Charities and the Co-op Community Fund to name but a few. If you are a Co-op member, please choose us as your local good cause!

We are also very proud of our connection with the Eastwood Foundation, which has been a key supporter of the club since its inception. We recently set up our Eastwood memorabilia wall in the clubroom and are proud to keep the Eastwood name alive in Warsop.

The next chapter is just beginning. We are working with Vibrant CiC to devise the next phase of refurbishment of the main hall. Warsop Youth Club is also changing its governance, applying to the Charity Commission to re-register its status as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation.

We feel that the time is now right to seek new members of the Board to take this venture forward. Please come and see us at the carnival and have a chat if you would like to join us in developing youth provision in Warsop and in making the Adam Eastwood Building a community asset that Warsop can be proud of.



Help Help for Families Hurt by Loved Ones' Substance Misuse

A CHARITY that provides emotional and practical support to family members affected by loved ones' substance or alcohol misuse is encouraging them to attend peer support groups and educational workshops in Mansfield and Ashfield.

Hetty's, based on Woodhouse Road, Mansfield, said it gave people a non-judgemental, safe, and caring environment to share their experiences.

The charity aims to help families effectively improve their situation.

A spokesman said: "Hetty's support enables clients to put boundaries in place, reduce risk, and gain the confidence they need to face their issues — and return to being a functioning and productive family.

"Hetty's has long understood the relationship between a substance user and their family can be extremely difficult, but our feedback has shown positive results when including the substance user in family recovery support. "The whole-family approach is now embraced through all the support offered at Hetty's."

Family members and substance users are encouraged to come together for the peer support and educational focus groups in monthly sessions in each district of Nottinghamshire.

The spokesman added: "The sessions have proved to be a huge success, with family members reporting a significant impact on their loved one's behaviour."

The peer support sessions and educational workshops have specific themes and structured priorities to be covered, but all are open to substance users and their family members - and to support the known benefits to recovery by using the whole-family approach.

Everyone is welcome at the groups

The aims of the groups are:

- Plan to prevent potential lapses.
- Plan for personal safety.
- Increase education surrounding addiction and effects on local services.
- Think about options and resources.
- Encourage, support and signpost to access help and support.
- Break down myths and increase understanding of addiction and its cycle.
- Identify unhelpful beliefs and explore roles and responsibilities within the family.
- Allow uninterrupted time and permission to speak and be heard.
- Understand each other's view points and how they are affected by addiction, and the knock-on effect on the whole family unit.
- Explore alternative coping strategies.
- Support each other and gain a new network of friendship and support.

As a service, Hetty's provides free and confidential emotional support to affected Nottinghamshire families, using proven psychosocial interventions to help them recover from the effects of their loved one's alcohol/substance use. Whether a person accesses the service using the 365 day a year support line, through

face to face sessions with their qualified and experienced family recovery worker, or by attending peer group sessions or focus workshops, Hetty's aim is to provide the skills and tools needed for family members to put boundaries in place, understand and manage their emotions, and start regaining control of their lives and actually living again. Addiction really is a family disease and can affect anyone, it doesn't care who you are, how much you earn, where you live or what you do for a living.

Hetty's shops (Warsop and Huthwaite) sell a lovely selection of pre-loved items, brand new gifts, essential oils, incense, homewares, and jewellery, and are always very grateful for any donations of good quality clothing, bric-a-brac, toys, electricals, bedding etc. New reliable and enthusiastic volunteers from any walk of life are always very welcome, and we're currently running 12 week voluntary retail internship programmes, giving people the chance to learn all of the skills necessary for the day-to-day running of a small retail outlet, with a structured plan, certificate of achievement, and a new referee for successful candidates to put on their CV.

Footpath & Countryside Group

At a time when leisure facilities for Warsop residents are being lost we can be reassured that some forms of exercise are not currently under threat.



Marbled White

We cannot offer a safe alternative to the swimming pool but Warsop's countryside has excellent facilities for walking, running and cycling. Public footpaths provide everything from a short walk alongside the river to a longer expedition through Sherwood Forest. Many paths have good surfaces that allow runners and joggers a safe route. The network of cycle tracks link us to Clumber, Thoresby and Sherwood Pines without having to use roads.

Maybe we should not take these facilities for granted. I wonder whether 200 years ago local folk realized that the enclosure of the countryside would mean that some of the paths their ancestors walked for centuries would be closed so that new landowners could manage the land to make most profit. Could this happen again?

Another threat could be reduction in maintenance of public footpaths and bridleways. Warsop is fortunate that we have a relationship with Via East Midlands (who manage the public paths for the county council) that funds our volunteers who give the paths much more attention than would be provided otherwise. However, we are all getting older and without some new volunteers we may not be able to continue in the longer term. Get in touch if you think you may be able to help. A couple of hours of conservation habitat management is excellent exercise (and it's free, unlike

As it is now summer we are involved in Himalayan balsam control, particularly along Warsop's waterways. Early indications suggest that there are fewer of these invasive plants that in previous years, suggesting that past management may be having an impact. One stretch of the river where over 3000 plants were pulled by the end of May 2017 had only seven plants this year. If you are lucky enough to have a garden bordering on the river or a stream please check for Himalayan balsam, just one exploding seed pod can cause major problems downstream. You only need to look at some stretches of the River Maun where the banks are smothered with six foot high plants to see what may happen is this non-native species is not controlled. The real problems come in winter when they die back leaving exposed banks which erode away with the silt creating flood problems (and filling up any mill ponds!).

If you take a walk on a sunny day this month you may see several butterflies that only appear later in the year. A favourite of mine is the Marbled White that may be spotted near the footpath between Stonebridge and Warsop Vale.

Our next Footpaths Group walk will be on Saturday 21st July. The destination has yet to be decided but we are planning to meet at Warsop Library at 10am. Contact us if you would like to join us or would like more details.

The Friends of Thynghowe Thynghowe and the forgotten heritage of Sherwood

As well as investigating the intriguing archaeology on Hanger Hill, this group is researching the landscape surrounding the hill.

One fascinating area is tracing the old lanes between Warsop, Budby and Edwinstowe. Many of these routes ceased to be used around the time of the Enclosure Acts when new landowners blocked paths that had be used for centuries. Warsop's act was implemented in 1825. Another factor was the restrictions put in place by the owners of the estates of the Dukeries as they protected their commercial forestry, agricultural land and shooting rights on land that had previously been part of the Crown's Sherwood Forest.

A route connecting Budby with Warsop's Blakeley Lane can be traced for much of its length although various 18th century maps suggest variations in its line over the years. An earlier map from 1609 shows "Greene Gate" running westwards from north of Blakeley Hill heading for Market Warsop. It could have joined up with Sandy Lane.

A 1791 map shows "Upper Warsop Gate" between Edwinstowe and Market Warsop passing close to the Black Pool. It appears to be heading towards the same part of Warsop as Greene Gate but this map only shows the Crown lands in Birklands. Two other paths from Edwinstowe that used the Norse derived name of "gate" are Nether Warsop Gate that connects with Broomhill Lane near the sewage works and Gleadthorpe Gate that ended at Gleadthorpe Grange.

By using old maps, LiDAR images, cropmark photographs and by searching for linear depression in the forest we have traced much of the length of these routes. No doubt we will be back in the woodlands next winter searching for more evidence of the past uses of the forest. Come and join us, it's a great way to discover more about our local countryside.






