Tattoo Parlours Urged to Join Star Rating Scheme

Tattoo parlours and other studios and beauty salons that use needles and blades in Mansfield are being urged to sign up to a county-wide scheme that rates their standards of hygiene and safety.

Local authorities across Nottinghamshire, including Mansfield District Council, which are responsible for licensing businesses that offer tattoos, body piercing and permanent and semi-permanent make-up treatments, are working together on the Nottinghamshire Hygiene Accreditation Scheme.

The aim of the scheme is to improve hygiene and safety standards associated with tattooing and cosmetic piercings, along with any permanent or semi-permanent treatments and procedures that use needles or micro-blades, and is part of a wider strategy by Mansfield District Council to make the district a safer place to live, work and visit and improve the wellbeing of its citizens.

The five star rating system operates in a similar way to the national food hygiene scheme for restaurants and shops selling food products. The first scheme of its kind was launched in Wales in 2014 and has been a huge success.

Businesses that offer the highest rates of hygiene and safety are awarded five stars signifying excellent standards. The lowest rating is zero stars which indicates that urgent improvements are needed.

The rating scheme has been developed using Chartered Institute of Environmental Health guidance on best practice for the industry, and from feedback provided during consultations with local businesses.

The scheme costs £120 to join and for the initial inspection, and £60 for a re-inspection and re-rating. Businesses that achieve two to five stars are reviewed after 12 months but those that achieve zero or one star are inspected again after six months. The kind of areas the accreditation covers include:

- The state and fabric of the premises
- · Cleanliness procedures employed by the business.
- Cleanliness of staff
- The safe use, storage and disposal of needles, inks and equipment.
- Sterilisation and cross-contamination prevention measures
- Consent forms and record keeping of clients.

Cllr Bill Drewett, Portfolio Holder for Safer Communities, said:

"We take public safety very seriously in Mansfield.

"The hygiene of tattoo and body piercing parlours is particularly pertinent in this respect because the damage that can be done to customers at the hands of poor operators can be horrendous - and permanent.

"The aim of this scheme is to provide reassurance to customers that the treatments they receive will be carried out in hygienic premises which follow safe procedures.

"I would urge local studios to sign up because it should help to enhance their business by increasing consumer confidence. The food hygiene star rating scheme has been a huge success in improving standards and we think this scheme will be, too."

GARDENING MONTHLY...



General Tasks and Garden Maintenance

Along with all the flourish and splendour this month, weeds are thriving too, so keep on top of the situation; hoe on warm days and leave them on the surface to wither and die in the sun.

Another constant task around the garden at this time of year is deadheading - remove spent flowers from containers, pots, hanging baskets, beds and borders and feed them all occasionally with liquid feed. Deadheading diverts energy from producing seed into producing new flowers... so is a good thing all round.

Be prepared in case of a late frost - keep vulnerable plants and new shoots protected at night if frost is forecast and don't be tempted to put out your really tender plants until the middle of the month unless the weather changes dramatically.

If it's dry, attack ground elder, lords and ladies and the like with systemic weed killer painted onto the leaves, and trail tips of bindweed into jam jars full of the same. Remember systemic weed killers are indiscriminate and will kill anything they contact.

Watering is essential once the weather is drier and warmer - water thoroughly once or twice a week rather than little and often (containers and hanging baskets need watering every day and sometimes even twice a day if it is hot and windy) - this encourages plants to put down roots in search of water rather than coming up to the surface. For large shrubs or trees, leave a hose trickling around the base for an hourhedges are best watered with a trickle hose (a length of old hose punctured with little holes) left running for an hour or so.

Carry on removing moss and weeds from paths, terraces and drives and keep an eye out for pests around the garden. Try to keep the use of chemical controls to a minimum - they may kill off pests, but they also kill off the beneficial insects that prey on them such as ladybirds and hoverfly larvae.

Continue the campaign against slugs and snails. They love the young shoots of delphiniums and the like, so use pet-friendly slug pellets, drench the ground around hostas with liquid slug killer to exterminate slugs below the surface or invest in a biological control (this employs nematodes to deliver a slug-lethal bacterial infection). Keep an eye out for snails and pick them off... what you do with them is up to you. Birds are your friends here - flat stones artfully located are useful accessories for birds to practise their snail catching techniques.

Caterpillar and aphid infestations can be dealt with by hand if caught early enough, but should the situation veer out of control you will have to resort to insecticides or grin and bear it! Don't forget aphids and other sap-sucking insects can transmit viruses so don't give in to the sympathy vote.



Do keep putting out bird food - they quickly become accustomed to regular food supplies and it's a real treat to see wild birds in the garden.


Mow, mow, mow your lawn... little and often is better than a radical attack every now and then. Left too long between cuts and the job becomes much harder, so mow weekly if possible.

Feed established lawns if you haven't already done so with a high nitrogen fertiliser - this will encourage good 'leaf' (i.e. grass blade) development. If your lawn is mossy, use a fertiliser which contains mosskiller and if your weed content is higher than you might wish, use lawn weedkiller - although this will also kill any wild flower

Try to add your grass clippings to the compost heap in shallow layers; a huge dollop will only turn slimy and spoil your compost.

Don't let newly laid lawns dry out in hot weather - water in the evenings and if there is a heat wave, consider leaving the lawn longer than usual just to help it through the hot weather.

THE FIGHT FOR A FRACK FREE WARSOP

The Bentley Effect, a film screened by Frack Free Warsop last month, detailed the campaign by the citizens of the Northern Rivers area of Australia against the fracking industry. It showed just how effective peaceful but determined protest can be against corporate might and government policy.

After seeing the hazards posed by the processes used and the detrimental impacts the industry was having elsewhere in the region, the people of Bentley rose up to defend their town.

Six years of campaigning across the region led to the climax of the protest when 10,000 people assembled to stand against the development, a number too big for the authorities to ignore, resulting in the fracking licence for the Bentley area being revoked.

Motivational and hugely uplifting, the film highlighted the chasm between government policy in pursuing energy/profits at all costs versus the impacts on communities and the health of the environment on which those communities depend. It also highlighted the need for protest by large numbers of those affected by the plans in order to bring about change.

After the film, a question and answer session was led by Brian Davey of Frack Free Notts, who made some interesting points including the access to Clumber Park for seismic surveying purposes and is legally challenging the Scottish Government's ban on fracking, saying that it has adversely affected their business interests, breached their human rights and are seeking damages.

Mary Church, Friends of the Earth Scotland's Head of Campaigns, stated:

"A two-year process looked at mountains of scientific evidence that spoke of the risks of the unconventional oil and gas industry to our environment, climate and people's health."

This culminated in a moratorium on fracking in Scotland. Friends of the Earth Scotland has been given permission to intervene in the judicial review and has submitted evidence on the environmental impacts of fracking, stating:

"Our intervention argues that the Scottish Government is required to ban fracking so as to urgently cut greenhouse gas emissions from fossil fuels, to meet legally binding climate targets."



downturn in profits for the US fracking industry and struggles the UK fracking industry is facing. Mr Davey stressed the need for energy conservation and a reduction in energy demand as a vital aspect of global energy solutions and related climate impacts.

Fracking Industry Updates

The campaign against fracking in the UK has been running for 7 years and has slowed the progression of the shale gas industry. Instead of the large number of exploratory drill wells planned, there are only a handful that have been drilled or under construction, with several being refused planning permission and either going to, or under, appeal. The Harthill planning appeal is underway at the time of writing and the Eckington appeal is due to start in June, all time consuming and costly for an industry that runs on debt. People fight fracking because of health and environment impacts but it may well be that the fracking industry will be defeated by economics.



- Misperton has been put on hold pending financial resilience checks. Barclays Bank, who invested heavily in Third Energy, last year promised its shareholders it would divest but appears to be struggling to do so. Barclays is under pressure from shareholders to cut investment in other fossil fuel projects, including pipelines, but seems to be left holding a toxic asset as the trend to divest from
- Nottingham University recently announced its plans to divest from fossil fuel investment, joining over half of UK Universities and following in the footsteps of Norway's Sovereign Fund, the World Bank, ING and AXA. Indeed, our own Government last year announced plans to change pension scheme regulations that currently require "best returns" to be amended to enable ethical investment. According to The Guardian, "a growing body of academic and investment research suggests that reserves of fossil fuels could become 'stranded assets' and virtually worthless as countries battle climate change.

Ineos challenging the Scottish Ban

Ineos, the petrochemical corporation wanting to frack our area, seem to be responding to negative public opinion towards fracking by going on the offensive, giving up any attempts to garner public approval by threatening to sue the National Trust for not allowing

In December 2015, world governments agreed to limit global average temperature rise to well below 2°C, and to strive to limit it to 1.5°C. A report published in 2016 by Oil Change International entitled "The Sky's Limit" stated that using the reserves in currently operating oil and gas fields alone, even with no coal, would take the world beyond 1.5°C, recommending that no new fossil fuel extraction or transportation infrastructure should be built, and governments should grant no new permits for them.



Extract from "The Sky's Limit" - already developed reserves (before any new Shale Gas development) will take us over climate change targets

Our Government's usual response to criticism is "shale gas could play a crucial role in safeguarding our own domestic security of supply' quoting the same two out-dated reports from Public Health England and the Royal Society and Royal Academy of Engineering, which conclude that risks can be managed if industry follows best practice enforced by regulation. The elephant in the room seems to be that the Government wants to pursue a whole new fossil fuel industry with associated infrastructure and devastating environmental impacts when we are already struggling to meet our climate change targets. Surely we cannot have both.

"Global energy uses need to stay within the carrying capacity of the planet", argues Kris De Decker in his paper "How much energy do we need?" Instead of increasing global energy consumption when it is costing the Earth, we should be looking at how we can conserve and reduce our energy usage, alongside the move to renewables.

"Countryside would be "littered with fracking wells" to replace half UK gas imports – new research" (Drill or Drop)

A recent study carried out by Cardiff Business School estimated that, in order to cut gas imports by 50% from 2021 to 2035 and replace this with domestic shale gas production would require about 6,100 wells, based on medium well productivity. The estimated number of wells needed range from the most optimistic of 4,090 wells, to the lowest well productivity requiring 16,500 wells, which equates to drilling and fracking 3 new wells every day during the time frame. .

Daniel Carey-Dawes, senior infrastructure campaigner at the Campaign to Protect Rural England (CPRE) said:

"The many thousands of wells that would be needed, peppered across our precious landscapes, would cause harm to the English countryside on an industrial scale...It must not become an industrial testing ground for a fracking industry that has no environmental, economic or social

"Beware of fracking in UK mining areas, says earthquake expert" (Drill or Drop)

So where would all those drill sites be located? The UK has a vast legacy of old coal mines scattered across the countryside, including our own heavily-mined area, which makes the comments of Professor Peter Styles, former President of the Geological Society of London, a project leader with the ReFine fracking research project and previous Head of Geology at Keele University, particularly interesting. He recently stated that fracking should not be carried out within 850m of a fault in any area. But in mining regions he suggested the risk could be greater:

"We have already changed the stress in these areas by removing the coal and allowing the ground above to subside.

"We have already preconditioned the faults. Even when mining stops it is still possible to have seismicity, as we have seen recently around Ollerton and Thoresby in Nottinghamshire."

Professor Styles said the fracking process could lead to seismic activity by stimulating faults in geology that were already stressed by mining. He said some faults were too small to be identified on geological maps or seismic surveys but were still big enough to cause the 0.5 magnitude earthquakes that under UK regulations would stop fracking. The article went on to report that Coal Board engineers and surveyors had recorded faults as small as a few centimetres. These records had been analysed by Liverpool University researchers and can now be used to overlay proposed and actual shale gas sites.

Professor Styles advised that fracking not be carried out in areas previously undermined and thought fracking in mining areas near pre-existing faults should be banned. He said he had identified faults close to proposed shale gas sites using detailed underground mining records and called for these records to be taken into account when decisions were made about fracking sites.

The biggest risk from seismic activity is that even small tremors could cause well integrity failure, leading to toxic fluid leaking into surrounding rock. Fracking our "groundwater protection zone" area could lead to hundreds of wells being drilled through the Sherwood Aquifer, each one posing a potential risk of contamination to a groundwater source that supplies water to 8 million people. Frack Free Warsop encourages everyone to research the issues regarding fracking; there is a vast amount of information available online, we suggest drillordrop.com as a good starting point after reading the Medact report on fracking. If you are unhappy with what you find, please contact our elected representatives and MAKE YOUR VOICES HEARD.

No need to book!

MP's Office now open for 'drop-in' sessions 5 days a week.

Mansfield's MP Ben Bradley has added an extra day to his office 'drop in' times, due to high demand from local residents using his office.

Currently, Ben Bradley holds drop-in sessions in his Mansfield office on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday 10-1pm, with an additional drop in session at Warsop town hall every Thursday 10-1pm. Mr Bradley has decided to extend the drop-in sessions to include Friday 10-1pm in Mansfield.

This means Ben's office will now hold drop in sessions 5 days a week. The purpose of an MP holding drop in sessions is to allow constituents to bring their problems to the MP and his/her team directly, and see what the MP can do to help.

Discussing his additional opening hours, Mr Bradley said that

"It's really important than an MP and their office are in their constituency, are open and approachable. Adding this drop-in session on Friday means that, for 5 days a week, my office doors are open for constituents to come in without making an appointment and see

Alongside this, Ben also holds bookable surgery appointments, where members of the public can book an appointment to sit down with Ben face to face to discuss any issues they may be having. These are held fortnightly, alternating between Mansfield and Warsop.

"So far, we've helped with a whole range of constituent's issues, anything from pot holes and road markings to issues with benefit payments or problems with housing. If you have a problem, it really is worth popping down to the office and chatting to us to see if we can help.



'Truly Inspirational' **Housing Manager** Wins Award

A Mansfield housing manager who regularly goes above and beyond to make a positive difference to others has been described as a true inspiration as she was presented with a regional award.

Michelle Turton, Mansfield District Council's Housing Needs Manager, has been awarded the Chartered Institute of Housing (CIH) award for an exceptional contribution by a CIH member in the East Midlands.

She is now through to the national final of the CIH Housing Heroes awards taking place next month (June)

Michelle's responsibilities at the council include, since 1998, leading the team which deals with homelessness and more recently setting up the ASSIST hospital discharge scheme which helps to prevent 'bed blocking' by patients with housing issues. The scheme won an award last year from the National Institute for Health and Care Excellence (NICE).

She has also recently set up a Well-Being Sanctuary, which aims to reduce the number of people in crisis needing NHS help for mental health, drug or alcohol issues, and was also behind a new community fruit and vegetable garden project to tackle social isolation and help local people to improve their health through exercise and diet.

The CIH judges commented:

"Michelle is clearly a practitioner making a real difference in her area and clearly goes above and beyond her role and is a true inspiration to others.

"Her ability to implement new schemes within her organisation while keeping customers at the heart of everything is evident."

For the award, nominators had to demonstrate how the nominee made an outstanding contribution and professional commitment to their organisation and the communities they work in and acted as a role model and inspired others in the housing sector.

Sarah Troman, Director of Communities at Mansfield District Council and who nominated Michelle for the award, said:

"Michelle is always looking for new ideas and initiatives. She has brilliant partnership building skills and has adopted an innovative approach to rough sleepers in Mansfield, which has seen a reduction in the official count of almost 50% over the past 12 months - the opposite of the trend nationally.

"Michelle is always cheerful and friendly, despite being one of the busiest people I have ever worked with. She doesn't like to shout about her achievements, but I think heartily deserves this award for her contribution to housing.

"She genuinely cares about customers and securing the best outcome for them and is a true credit to both the CIH and to Mansfield District Council."

Michelle said:

"I am privileged to work alongside a brilliant team that is committed and passionate about making a difference to the lives of vulnerable people. This award is for them and in particular Christine Fisher, Housing Operations and Safeguarding Manager, because without their hard work, many of these developments would not have been possible. I am very proud to work for Mansfield District Council, who despite funding cuts and continuous financial challenges have always supported the development of services for vulnerable people.'

Sophie has joined the Nova Centurion Swim Squad in Mansfield as a temporary member for the three-month period.

Sophie said she chose to come to Mansfield so that she could train with some of the best in the sport. Ollie is the Paralympic, World and European champion and World Record holder in the SM8 200m Individual Medley event and is now working hard on the 2020 Paralympics.

The Mayor said: "This is very exciting news for Mansfield and testament to the top-class facilities that we have. It's long been said that there must be something in the water in Mansfield for us to have produced so many world-class Olympic and Paralympic swimmers so we aren't at all surprised that Sophie has chosen to come here above anywhere else.

Get Knitting Again for Poppy Parade Display in Mansfield

To mark the centenary of the end of the First World War on Remembrance Sunday in November, Mansfield District Council will be creating a display of thousands of knitted poppies.

The council is aiming to build on last year's successful appeal, in which the old Town Hall was decorated with more than 8,000 poppies knitted by hundreds of local volunteers, by adding another 10,000 poppies to the display.

People are also being asked to donate plastic tops from milk and fizzy drinks bottles, which will be used to create a bottle-top mosaic of poppies. Green semi-skimmed milk bottle tops and red skimmed milk tops are especially needed but other colours can also be used in

The tops are being collected at the Civic Centre and the council's offices at Clumber House in Clumber Street.

The Royal British Legion is again supporting the call for individuals and groups in the local community to get involved by crocheting or knitting poppies to contribute to the display.

The knitted poppy decorations will adorn part of the route for the Remembrance Day parade, which goes through the town centre via West Gate and into the Market Place on the way to St Peter's Church.

"Last year the display of knitted poppies on the Old Town Hall made a really impressive and unforgettable statement, and with this year being the 100-year anniversary of Armistice Day, we want to go even better.

Kate Allsop, Executive Mayor of Mansfield, said:

"The flood of poppies coming into the council last year was quite remarkable. The community really got behind the project and produced an amazing array of beautifully individual poppies so I hope they will be willing to get the knitting needles clicking again for this year's appeal."

The council decided to organise last year's knitted poppy appeal following the success of the authority's yarn bombing display for the Queen's 90th birthday celebrations in 2016.

Michael Beresford, Mansfield's Poppy Appeal Organiser, for the Royal British Legion, said: "The generosity of the people of Mansfield has been amazing over the years, and long may it continue, to help servicemen and women and their families. Many have given their lives so we can live our lives. Remember them on this 100-year anniversary of the First World War."

The council is again working with local knitting group Yankee Yarns to co-ordinate the display so those interested in taking part can take their knitted or crocheted poppies to the shop at 185 Westfield Lane,

Alternatively, poppies can be taken to the Civic Centre, Mansfield, marked for the attention of the Marketing and Communications

They will be collected until 21 September and various opportunities will be held in the Market Place throughout the coming months in which people can help tie the poppies to the camouflage nets. People can also come along and write messages on a commemoration board at the same time. Full details will be announced in the coming months.

The displays will be installed during the week prior to Remembrance Sunday, which this year falls on Sunday 11 November - exactly 100 years to the day that peace was declared after four years of war against Germany in what was known as the Great War and later as the First World War.

Remembrance Sunday is now a memorial day for all British and Allied servicemen and women who have died in active service in various wars and conflicts since the First World War in 1914.

Discussing the event, Ben said

"It was really good to be able to meet Hauxley again and see how he's getting on with his training. I also got to meet some of the volunteers there as well, and chat to them about the charity and what it involves.

"It's a really positive charity, it does a lot of good locally for us here in Mansfield, but also on a wider scale, so I'm really pleased to be able to support them. It also means I get to spend some time with puppies so I'm more than happy!

"It's also really good to see the Hive being used by community groups and charities"

The two dogs Mr Bradley met will one day become assistance dogs specially trained to help physically disabled people in the UK with day to day tasks. Canine partners are trained to open and close doors, retrieve dropped items, help with dressing and undressing, can load and unload the washing machine and even get help in an emergency.



Footpath & **Countryside Group**

One of my highlights for this month is discovering Bee Orchids in Warsop's countryside.



They can appear in several places to the west and north of the parish but you cannot reliably predict where they will be seen. Before it was restored, the edge of the exposed limestone and coal waste of Warsop Vale pit site was a good spot for them but they gradually disappeared. However, in recent years, they have appeared near the viewpoint on the top of the pit tip. I hesitate to give exact locations of orchids after somebody decided to dig some up a few years ago, probably to transplant them into their garden without realising that they rely on mycorrhizae in the surrounding soil that are essential for their survival. And it is illegal!

June is a good month for viewing butterflies. I could list at least ten species that you may see around here but you don't need to know their names to enjoy watching

The Footpaths Group are now well into the grass mowing season. Last year we mowed over 12 miles of footpaths. Fortunately we don't need to cut along all 57 of Warsop's public rights of way, concentrating on the most overgrown and the most walked routes. Our usual routine is to mow the path into the forest from Gleadthorpe, then the paths starting from the railway bridge at Meden Vale including the route to Assarts Farm before mowing between Egmanton Road and the top of Cuckney Hill. After that we move to Church Warsop, cutting between Birch Street and Wood Lane and from the Welfare down to Stone Bridge. We also mow the path from Stone Bridge up to Rock House and then Spring Lane and Bully Lane between Sookholme and Warsop Vale. By the time we have cut Sandy Lane and Upper Cross Lane in Market Warsop and then the path into the forest from the sewage works it is usually time to start again at the beginning!

In June we will be contributing to the Clean Up Mansfield day once again when we will clear litter from Sandy Lane. We often litter pick along the paths when we are working in an area and we gave Sandy Lane a spring clean earlier this year whilst we were managing the brambles so hopefully it won't be too bad this time.

We have been experiencing some hosting issues with our old website but much of the information about the local countryside and walks is also available on our warsopcountryside.wordpress.com site. There are also links to online versions of our booklets about the Hills & Holes, Warsop's hedgerows, the 1816 Perambulation of the Manor of Warsop and walks routes around the parish.

Our next Footpaths Group walk will be on Saturday 17th June. The destination has yet to be decided but we are planning to meet at Warsop Library at 10am. Contact us if you would like to join us or would like more details

The Friends of Thynghowe Thynghowe and the forgotten herita

The summer months are our quietest time as activities in the forest are suspended until autumn when the birds breeding season has ended and the undergrowth starts to die back.

We can look back on an enjoyable perambulation to Thynghowe in April with several welcome new faces joining the regular walkers. This year, our celebrations of the heritage were enhanced by sampling traditional mead on the hill as the Viking settlers may have done over a thousand years ago whilst attending Thing assemblies. The mead was generously provided by Alison and Chad from Apothecary Mead, a new enterprise based on the Welbeck Estate. Their brews can be purchased from the Welbeck Farm Shop and other local retailers, they are certainly recommended by this group!

June 2018 marks the 1100th anniversary of the death of Æthelflæd, the Lady of the Mercians. She was the daughter of King Alfred of Wessex and she married Æthelred, the Lord of Mercia, playing a key role in ruling the kingdom until her husband's death in 911. She then ruled alone leading the reclaiming of Viking held territory in eastern Mercia. Her army recaptured Derby in early 918 but she died in early June shortly before Nottingham was regained. Her role in English history has been largely ignored, maybe because men wrote the historical accounts!

Our investigations over the past few months have focussed on the old routes through Sherwood Forest, particularly the roads between Budby and Mansfield. One of these routes passed to the north-west of Hanger Hill, following Blakeley Lane for part of the way. It is fascinating to trace these old tracks, searching for evidence on the ground and speculating on the reasons for their falling from use.

The Battle of Hatfield Investigation Society has embarked on their new Heritage Lottery funded project based around Cuckney. Check their website www.battleofhatfieldsociety. co.uk for details of activities involving local prisoner of war camps, landscape investigations involving the use of LiDAR, fieldwalking, excavation and interpretation of the castle site.

Body Cams to Help Tackle Fly Tippi



Neighbourhood Wardens in Mansfield have started using body worn video cameras to help tackle the rising problem of fly-tipping across the district.

As part of the Mansfield District Council's wider strategy to make the district a clean, safe and greener place to live in work and visit, Mansfield District Council is hoping that the Body Worn Video (BWV) will be useful in a variety of situations that wardens have to deal with, including, for instance, anti-social behaviour

In the way the wardens tackle fly-tipping, it is expected that the cameras will help to obtain and secure evidence at fly-tipping incidents, which could aid future prosecutions.

Cllr Bill Drewett, Portfolio Holder for Safer Communities, said:

"Ultimately it is hoped BWV will help to improve the service by making it more effective and efficient.

"Fly-tipping is a really costly issue for the council and it is a problem that is getting worse so we have to find more innovative ways to deal with it.

"Disposing of waste in this way is basically anti-social behaviour which the council will simply not tolerate. There is just no excuse for it when there are a variety of free or low-cost ways to dispose of rubbish responsibly.

"We will prosecute or issue Fixed Penalty Notices where necessary or possible. BWV may help to capture evidence needed to secure a The cost of dealing with fly-tipping in 2017/18 in the Mansfield district was £68,948 for 1,612 fly-tipping reports to the council. Of those reports, 70 per cent of the waste fly-tipped was general household waste, including waste that could have been recycled. The number of the reports in the past year is up from 1,516 reports in 2016/17.

In its use of BWV the council will follow a strict code of conduct for recordings which will be kept for no longer than 30 days for non-evidential reasons. For the purpose of official evidence for prosecution, recordings will be kept for 365 days or until needed for a court case

Wardens will have a duty to make it clear when they are filming and take precise details of the time, date, location and who is present.

The cameras will only be used for specific incidents and will not run continuously and should be used proportionately and only in legitimate or necessary circumstances.

It is hoped that when people who wardens engage with realise they are being filmed it will help to reduce conflict and resolve any issues more swiftly as well as reducing complaints.

Changes to Pest Control Services

A decision has been made by Mansfield District Council to no longer offer a chargeable pest control treatment service to residents.

The decision was taken by Cllr Bill Drewett, Portfolio Holder for Safer Communities, on Thursday 19 April following a public

The review of the pest control service is part of an ongoing council-wide review that aims to improve performance, increase customer satisfaction and identify efficiencies - either savings or income generation.

Council tenants will not be affected by the decision as the council's Housing Service will remain responsible for dealing with any pest control matters affecting these properties.

The council's Environment and Public Protection team will also continue to investigate and enforce problems where pests are caused by issues such as drains, accumulation of rubbish, food waste and any other conditions that may attract or harbour

Customers requesting pest control services will be signposted to other local councils such as Ashfield District Council, who offer a

wide range of services at comparable prices, and to private pest

The council has previously provided a chargeable pest control treatment service to residents covering a wide variety of pests including rats, mice, wasps, ants, bedbugs as well as other insects. The council has also offered a service to commercial businesses both on a contract basis and to deal with one-off pest issues.

Like all local authorities, the council is facing significant financial challenges and is continually exploring ways to make savings. Pest control is a non-statutory service, which means that it is not a service that the council is required to provide, and the service had been operating at a loss for a number of years.

Cllr Bill Drewett said:

"The council is facing significant financial pressures and is looking at various ways of making savings and generating income to plug the

"As council tenants will continue to receive the same service that they always have, and other options are available for residents and businesses at a comparable price, we are satisfied that there will be no adverse impact on the district.






