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GARDENING UPDATE



Not sure how to deal with your garden during autumn? Afraid your effort won't pay off? With winter only two months away, we want to share these autumn gardening tips with you. Follow them and you will be well prepared. Beware: green thumbs needed!

Tip 1: Mow, rake, prune, repeat

When summer is over, most people tend to put the lawnmower in storage. Wrong! Until the end of autumn, it is important to keep watering and mowing the grass. This ensures that more sunlight will reach the grass blades, which retain more nutrients in the root. When raking the freshly mowed grass, make sure you also take care of fallen leaves. Leaving it be will suffocate the grass and other plants. And whilst we want to avoid that, we can also use it for good cause. Tip #4 will tell you more about that. Last but not least, it is important to prune your trees. This will benefit their health and appearance.

Tip 2: Plant bulbs

Autumn is actually the perfect time to plant bulbs because they will be given enough time to grow during winter. Make sure you buy various types with a range of flowering periods and put them in a spot with plenty of sunlight. This way, you can enjoy blooms during the whole season. When spring welcomes you with all these lovely coloured flowers, the amount of work will definitely be worth it.

Tip #3: Use mulch

Mulch is great to apply while gardening in autumn and can be used for different matters. For instance, to keep the ground moisturised, to keep down weeds or to cover up bulbs and tender plants to protect from the winter cold.

Tip 4: Make your own compost

Compost is a natural fertiliser and great for every garden. It can be made out of garden waste – autumn leaves for example – and kitchen scraps. Make sure that these are in proportion to achieve the best results. Making compost of your own waste will save you money and since tip #2 already got you started it won't take a lot of time.

Tip 5: Plant autumn pollinator flowers

While most of us enjoy summer because of its rising temperatures and drier climates, bees and other pollinators are not so thankful. They have to deal with summer pollen dearth: a decrease in supplies for the harsh winter that is coming. We can help pollinators by planting autumn pollinator flowers like Goldenrod, Purple Aster, Pineapple Sage or Bugbane.

Tip 6: Winter vegetables

Last of all, early autumn is the best time to work on your (self-sufficient) kitchen garden with winter vegetables. Think about all the hearty winter soups containing onions, broccoli, peas or perhaps broad beans. Other season vegetables are lettuce, radishes and kale.

With the above-mentioned tips, you can be sure that your garden survives winter and comes out beautifully in spring.

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THE FIGHT FOR A FRACK FREE WARSOP

A new climate unfolds

As we sweltered through July's record-breaking warm weather which the Met Office confirmed reached 38.7C, the hottest ever recorded in the UK, we also watched a new political climate unfold. Boris Johnson, our new Prime Minister, who has written articles in the past supporting the roll out of the shale gas industry, appointed several pro-frackers into key roles:

- Theresa Villiers, Environment Secretary, voted against a ban on exploratory fracking and against a review into the impacts of fracking on environment, climate change, economy, health and safety. Ironically though, on Facebook, she states: "Action on climate change is vital."
- Claire Perry, now appointed President of the UN climate talks, COP26, due to be hosted by the UK in November next year, had presided over the department responsible for rolling out fracking upon an unwilling nation, but now has to raise UK's game on climate change or risk embarrassment at next year's talks.
- Andrea Leadsom took over from Perry as business and industry Minister and becomes sole

shareholder of the Oil and Gas Authority, which is under pressure to review the rules on the Traffic Light System regulating fracking-induced earth tremors.

Robert Jenrick, MP for a Newark constituency, is the new Communities Minister in whose hands lies the fate of Woodsetts and Ellesmere Port planning appeals, both called in and awaiting a decision. He will also inherit the long-awaited decision on fast-tracking planning applications after last year's Government consultation.

Many of you may have recently seen David Attenborough give a shocking update on the impact of greenhouse gas (ghg) emissions in his latest programme "Climate Change – The Facts". There is also an in-depth programme on Netflix called "Decoding the Weather Machine". Both give a clear summary of the science behind the dire situation we are facing - the need to reduce emissions could not be clearer - whilst the Environment Agency approves Cuadrilla's plans to frack a second well at its Lancashire site.

What is the carbon footprint of fracking?

The 2008 Climate Change Act and the 2015 Paris Agreement resulted in targets for emission reductions to which the UK is legally committed.

A Labour Party analysis earlier this year pointed out that, if the recoverable shale gas reserves are exploited, over 7 billion tonnes of CO₂ will be released into the atmosphere and that is without taking "fugitive" emissions (leaks, etc.) into account.

In the US, scientists at the University of Colorado reported that their oil and gas industry emissions are 60% higher than estimated by the US Environmental Protection Agency as a result of leaks and malfunctioning equipment, etc. Government reliance on the McKay Stone report on lower methane emissions justifying fracking

was judged to be unlawful because it ignored other evidence. Both undercut the case that gas offers climate advantage.

NASA has also recorded a sharp rise in methane emissions since 2006, two thirds of which they found to be directly attributable to fossil fuels. Methane has a global warming potential 28 times greater than CO₂.

The UK has, so far, met its targeted emissions reductions. In 2017, the Committee on Climate Change (CCC) reported UK emissions were 43% below 1990 levels, largely achieved through reduction in coal use. But, as things stand, CCC warns emissions are not reducing enough to meet targets for 2023 onwards – and that is without taking a new shale gas industry into account.

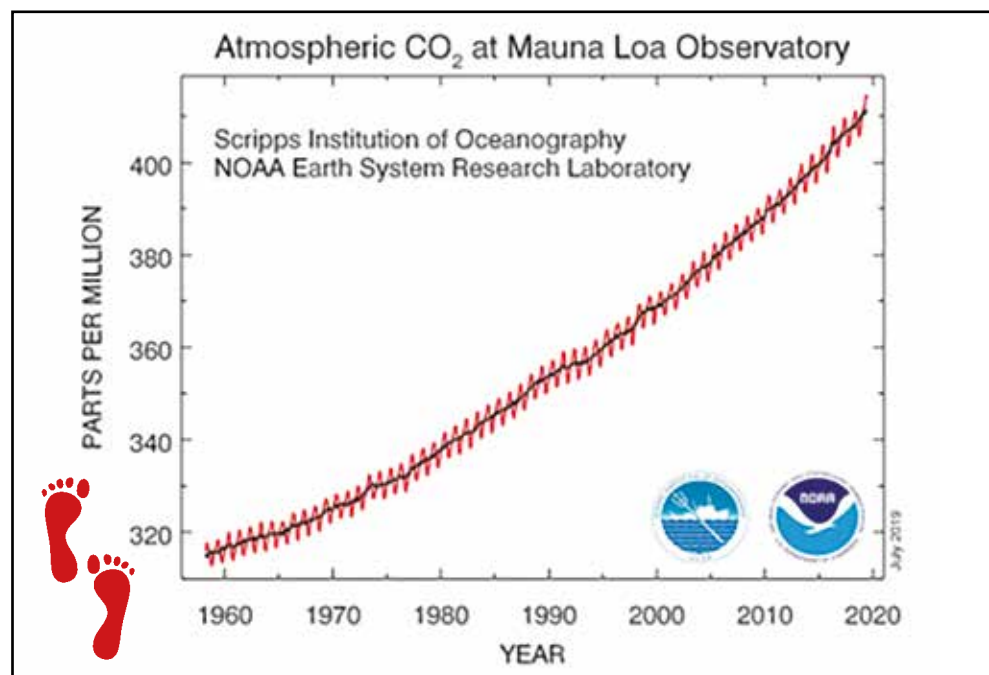
Why does that matter?

The United Nations IPCC has warned that, if the world does not limit warming to 1.5C, climate impacts will be devastating for millions of people and species globally.

They state that, to have a 67% chance of limiting global warming to below 1.5C, we can only emit another 420 billion tonnes of CO₂. That was at 1 January, 2018. Since then, ghg emissions have brought that figure down to 360 billion tonnes, as the world is emitting around 42 billion tonnes

each year. This means we have just over 8 years left to reduce our emissions globally to zero to keep warming below 1.5C. Some scientists think even this figure is too generous.

Global CO₂, measured in parts per million, was stable at 280 ppm before the industrial revolution. When measurements started in 1958 it was 316 ppm. Levels are accelerating and, earlier this year, reached 415 ppm, the highest in about 3 million years, since before the dawn of human civilisation.



So what can we do about it?

In the same year that the UK signed the Paris Agreement, it also passed the Infrastructure Act, which made it law to "maximise the economic recovery of UK petroleum".

So every step towards reducing emissions is dogged by pressure from the oil and gas industries to continue to explore and develop new fossil fuel resources.

In 2018, the UK's CO₂ emissions were 448.5 million

tonnes (mt), with highest emitting sectors being Transport: 121.4 mt and Energy: 98.3 mt. The use of natural gas for Home Heating came in at 65.8mt.

Clearly, we need to see commitment and leadership from the Government by regulating for a move away from its support for shale gas and other fossil fuels and toward green transport and energy solutions.

But what about other countries' higher emissions?

Why should we bother to cut down when other countries have far higher emissions? A study in 2015 "Carbon and Inequality" by Chancel and Piketty for COP24 climate summit helps put the situation into perspective.

The graph below shows the level of emissions by region, showing top emitters in order as China, USA, Asia and EU. (The UK produces less than 2% of total global emissions).

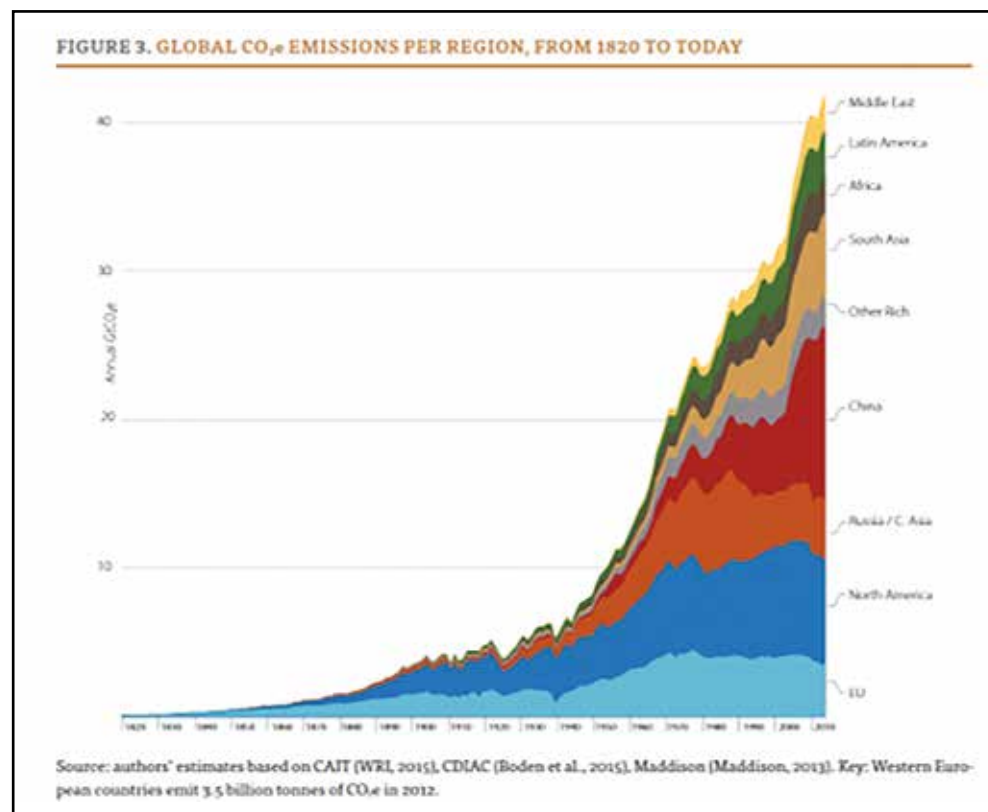
What this doesn't accurately show is the level of impact lifestyle choice has. Our carbon footprint cannot only be measured by what is produced in each country, we also need to look at "embedded emissions" in the goods and services that we use and buy. This is where "western lifestyle" consumers are responsible for the most emissions. China and Asia are emitting high levels

of CO₂ because they are making most of the products that are bought around the world. The responsibility for that carbon footprint lies with the consumer.

The same report shows that looking at lifestyle consumption emissions per person for the average citizen presents a different picture:

Americans	20 tonnes
Western Europeans	9 tonnes
Chinese	8 tonnes

The richest 10% of global citizens, defined by Credit Suisse as those with assets above USD 93,170 (£76,500 approx), are responsible for nearly 50% of lifestyle consumption emissions. The poorest 100 countries produce only 3-5% of global emissions, yet are the most susceptible to climate change (Oxfam 2014).



How can I reduce my carbon footprint?

Use the online WWF Carbon Footprint Calculator to get an estimate of your carbon footprint. It gives the UK average footprint per person of 13.56 tonnes CO₂e, with a world average of 5.28. WWF calculate that, by 2050, if everyone on the planet was allocated a "fair share", each should have 1.05 tonnes. That is a drastic reduction for most UK citizens - an indicator of the level of action required.

- The lifecycle carbon impact of clothing can be reduced by buying vintage; eco-friendly; natural organic or buy quality clothing that will last, but buy less.
- The IPCC recommends that we insulate homes, take trains and buses instead of planes, and use video conferencing instead of business travel.

Cutting meat and dairy products from your diet could reduce an individual's carbon footprint from food by two-thirds, according to an Oxford study.

Reduce plastics - A recent report from ciel.org, "Plastics and Climate", finds that, between extraction, refining, and waste management, the global production and incineration of plastics will add more than 850 million tonnes of greenhouse gases to the atmosphere this year alone — an amount equal to the emissions from 189 500-megawatt coal power plants. Ineos want to frack our area to produce plastics!

And, of course, campaign against a new fossil fuel shale gas industry!

What's my carbon footprint?

Most of us have no idea about the carbon footprint of our consumer choices. Here are some common activities that can really clock up the CO₂:

Car travel: 12,000 km per year	2.33 tonnes
1 return flight to Alicante for a family of 4	2.6 tonnes
Gas heating per household/year (CCC)	2 tonnes
Beef, 3-5 times per week/year	1.6 tonnes
Outfit of Jeans, T-shirt, trainers, jacket	76kg

Wild Flower Walk

We would like to thank Warsop & District News for their help by featuring our event in the previous issue.

This was entirely responsible for a bumper group of 24 people joining the wild flower walk with Lynda Milner and Stuart Rose. It included some people who have lived in the area for many years yet never set foot on an open field.

The day began with blue skies and warm sun, which was exactly what was ordered. Stuart Rose and his faithful border collie, Floss, arrived to lead 22 enthusiasts across the unspoilt acres of Laxton. A different route from previous years took us along the lanes to the cultivated West Field and the sykes, where untouched, unimproved grassland is rich in botanical interest. It is here that masses of yellow rattle grows, a huge variety of grasses, including sweet vernal grass which gives hay its characteristic smell, innumerable yellow and white daisy species, common spotted orchids and so much more.

Stuart pointed out the ancient strips on the fields and explained how the medieval farming system is upheld. At the highest point we looked East across the Trent Valley with Lincoln Cathedral clear and commanding on the horizon. To the West the sun began to sink and the fields of barley rippled and shone.

After the walk most people repaired to the Dovecote and, over a well-earned drink, recounted the sheer exhilaration of a bright June evening in this unspoilt corner of Nottinghamshire.

My Sight Appeal - Can you Help?

We are desperately searching for volunteers to support isolated visually impaired people living in our rural areas.

My Sight Notts (formerly the Nottinghamshire Royal Society for the Blind or NRSB) is the county's oldest charity and we've been supporting blind and partially sighted people for over 175 years.

We run 'My Sight Newark', a hub and social group in the local area and we're struggling to recruit My Guide sighted guide volunteers to support blind and partially sighted people to get out and about in the community.

Full training and on-going support is provided for our volunteers and all reasonable expenses will be met.

Chernobyl Children's Lifeline Appeal

The Chernobyl nuclear disaster happened 33 years ago but is still fresh in the memory. Families there face many more years living with the resulting problems.

We have been a registered charity for over 25 years and have helped thousands of children from that area. Our link in Newark & Sherwood works with the school in a village in Belarus to bring children aged 9-11 from the poorest families here for a holiday accompanied by a teacher/interpreter. We organise a full program of events, including swimming, rock climbing, a seaside rip, sailing, soccer school and archery to give the children a range of experiences and a lot of fun!

We need host families, able to set aside 2-3 weeks at the start of the school summer holidays and who can take the events with the Belarusian children they host. Hosts may have their own children (who are very welcome to join in at no cost) or may have grown up children and empty bedrooms!

Language is not an issue as the children learn some English at school and translation apps on our phones work well.

The children would never have this, the adventure of their childhood, without the hospitality of our hosts. They go home with memories, new confidence and ambition.

If you would like to help but can't host, we also need clothing, 135 - 150cm (4'6" - 5') height and footwear, sizes 33-39 (1-6). We need shoes, trainers, walking and football boots, summer and winter clothing, coats and sleeping bags to use at camp plus old suitcases (with wheels) to send the children home with clothing to last them the next couple of years.

Our charity shop in Clowne is our main source of funds. I take items we cannot use directly and any other donations to raise funds for

the children's holiday next year! If you have anything to donate, please let me know.

The Story of the Flypast

Around a thousand people congregated on The Carrs at 8.30am to witness planes flying to Sheffield for the flypast.

The flypast was honouring the 75th anniversary of the crash of the B-17 Flying Fortress, nicknamed Mi Amigo, in Endcliffe Park, Sheffield on 22nd February 1944 resulting in the death of 10 American airmen.

Tony Foulds, 82, witnessed the plane crash when he was 8. The Mi Amigo had only had one working engine after being hit by enemy fire during a daylight raid on the Luftwaffe military base in Aalborg, Denmark. The crew saw a large expanse of grass as a possible landing place but crashed after coming round for a third time, just missing the tops of nearby houses.

The pilot, Lieutenant John Kriehauser, who was later posthumously awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, circled when he saw Tony and his friends. All 10 crew aboard the Flying Fortress were killed in the crash.



Tony Foulds, 82, who had been in the park and witnessed the crash in 1944, has been spending six days a week tending to a memorial to the airmen since 1969, had met BBC Breakfast presenter, Dan Walker, walking his dog in the park and had specially wanted a flypast on the 75th anniversary of the crash.

Without Tony's knowledge, Dan Walker campaigned for a flypast on Twitter. After talking to the Sheffield Star, Dan contacted the US Embassy and RAF Lakenheath in Suffolk. Dan's tweet went viral. Less than a fortnight later, Dan learned that the flypast had been confirmed.

The BBC contacted Tony and asked if he would come on BBC Breakfast to meet the US Ambassador to the UK, Woody Johnson on 22nd January. The news of the flypast was a complete surprise to Tony.

The flypast involved aircraft from the US Airforce, as well as the RAF, flown in from bases in Lakenheath, Coningsby and Mildenhall. These included a Dakota, CV-22 Osprey, KC-135 Stratotanker, MC-130J Commando II and four F15 Strike Eagle Fighter Jets, as well as two RAF Typhoons.

The only B-17 Flying Fortress that is operational in Europe is the Sally B, used in the film "Memphis Belle" made in 1990. About a quarter of a million planes flew in the Second World War and about 200,000 air-crew lost their lives.

6th June was the 75th Anniversary of D-Day, the largest ever seaborne invasion in history. Many of the aircraft used on D-Day, including the Spitfire, Hurricane and Lancaster, were powered by Merlin engines, developed at Hucknall Rolls Royce. Nottinghamshire was one of the major locations for training volunteers to become bomber air crew, and also a base for the US Army. A new hospital was built for troops next to the site of the current King's Mill Hospital in 1942.

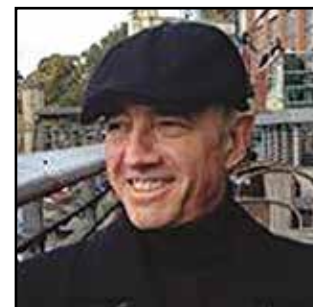
Breast Cancer is a charity chosen as President Elaine sadly lost two Sister-in-Laws to this dreadful disease.

A consultation is now open for people to have their say on potentially suitable sites in Mansfield District for gypsies, travellers and travelling showpeople.

Following an initial consultation last year and a detailed assessment, a total of 15 locations in Mansfield district have been identified as potentially suitable.

Visit www.mansfield.gov.uk/planningconsultation for further information, a link to all the relevant documents and the consultation, which is open until 13 September.

The council is holding workshops to give members of the public the opportunity to ask questions in relation to the consultation documents. People can drop in any time between 1pm and 7pm on the following dates:

- Monday 02 September 2019, Turner Hall, 13 Welbeck Road, Mansfield Woodhouse, NG19 9JY
- Thursday 05 September 2019, Warsop Ex-Servicemen's Club, Carr Lane, Warsop, Mansfield, NG20 0BN

Hard copies of the documents are available at libraries, Warsop Town Hall and Mansfield Civic Centre.

The Housing Act 2004 requires all local authorities to assess the accommodation needs of gypsies, travellers and travelling showpeople, and have a strategy for how those housing needs will be met. A total of four sites are required in Mansfield district - a permanent one with three pitches, a transit/emergency stopping site to accommodate up to 15 caravans and associated vehicles, and two sites for travelling showpeople.

Following initial consultation last summer, 122 sites were considered and scored against specific criteria including viability and sustainability. When assessing sites lots of factors had to be considered such as impact on the environment, proximity to public transport, health services, education and provision of utilities.

Of these, 15 sites are considered potentially suitable and will be consulted on. As part of the consultation, members of the public can suggest additional sites in the district that might be suitable.

No decisions have been made about which of the 15 sites are preferred but they are ranked according to their viability and further work will be required to determine whether sites are actually feasible. Work is continuing to contact all landowners.

The council's Planning and Housing teams will consider how the sites could be managed. The sites are:

- Derelict brownfield land between Spencer Street and Holden St at Ladybrook, Mansfield
- Derelict brownfield land at Victoria Street/Clarence Street/Tenter Lane, Mansfield
- Surplus playing pitches at former Sherwood Hall School, off Stuart Avenue, Forest Town
- Derelict brownfield land at former railway station off Mansfield Road, Warsop
- Vacant brownfield land off Baums Lane, Mansfield (opposite Central Avenue)
- Greenfield land to the south of New Mill Lane and the north of the Tall Trees Mobile Homes Park off Old Mill Lane, Forest Town
- Greenfield land at 40a Mansfield Road, Warsop (opposite Woodlands Nursing Home, Spion Kop)
- Greenfield land off Ley Lane, Mansfield Woodhouse (opposite Castleton Close)
- Greenfield Land at Pheasant Hill and Highfield Close, Mansfield (near Mansfield Lawn Tennis Club)
- Greenfield agricultural land off Chesterfield Road, Pleasley Hill (off Woburn Road)
- Derelict brownfield land at former Meden Vale Village Hall, Elkesley Road, Meden Vale
- Partially cleared allotments at Priory Road, Mansfield Woodhouse (next to Yeoman Hill Park and the Labour Hall)
- Greenfield land next to the allotments on Common Lane, Mansfield Woodhouse
- Greenfield land off off Northfield Lane, Mansfield Woodhouse
- Disused electricity substation at land off B6407 Longster Lane, Sookholme

Evidence has shown a total of four sites are required in Mansfield district - a permanent one with three pitches, a transit/emergency stopping site to accommodate up to 15 caravans and associated vehicles, and two sites for travelling showpeople.

One large site would not meet the requirements of all those who need the sites. For example, travelling showpeople have equipment to store and guidelines state that transit and settled communities should be located on different sites.

Cllr Stuart Richardson, Portfolio Holder for Regeneration and Growth, said:

"No decisions have been made and the consultation gives everyone the opportunity to have their say on the potential sites. It is a legal requirement for all local authorities to go through this process."

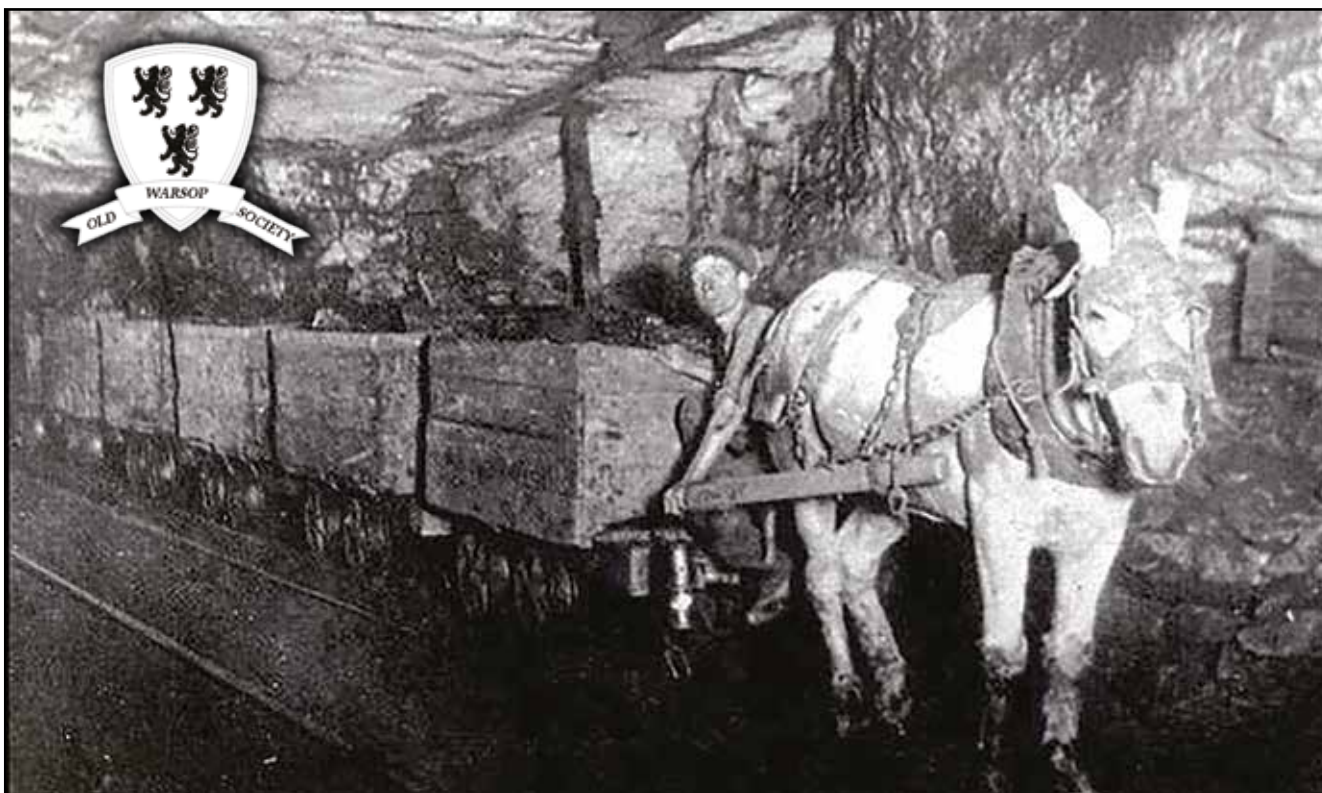
The cadets did brilliantly and have yet again done their squadron proud. These results are from competing against 32 other squadrons. The results were:

The weather was kind to them and with the help of some of their Rotary colleagues much fun and friendship was enjoyed by the team along the way.

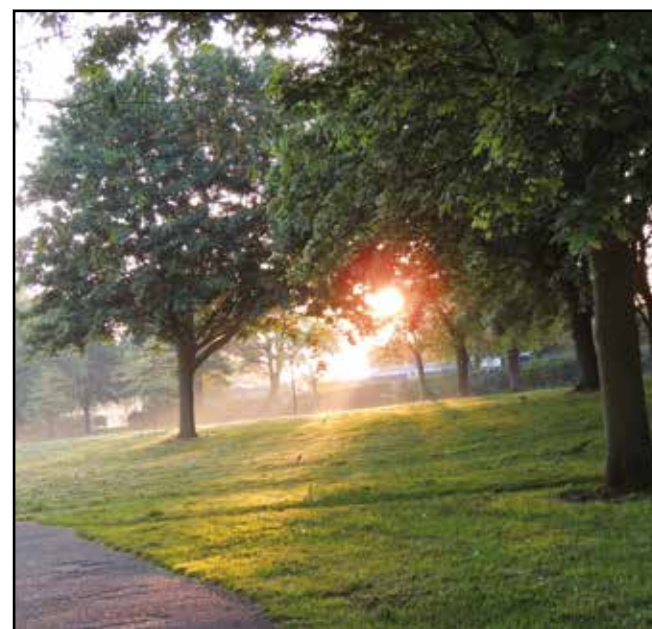

Restaurant Owner Risked Life and Death of Customers, Says Judge

A Mansfield Woodhouse restaurant owner has been given a suspended jail sentence and been banned indefinitely from managing any food business after breaching safety and hygiene regulations.

Sentencing him at Nottingham Crown Court on 22 May, Her Honour Judge Sally Hancox said Gia Kamali, 44, of Byron Street, Mansfield, had showed a flagrant disregard for the law and that his attitude towards food safety provisions presented a very high risk of harm and potential illness and could have made the difference between life and death for customers.

The Judge said she was minded to send him to prison after reading the case notes and seeing that this was the third time he had been before the court for safety offences at his premises, Mirch Massala, on Station Street.

However, he narrowly avoided a custodial sentence when she reduced the jail term to a suspended sentence in view of the fact that the business was now closed and no longer presented a risk to the public, and that his wife and children needed him at home.

Kamali was given a 10-month jail term, suspended for 18 months, for each of the three convictions of failing to comply with food safety regulations and one offence of failing to comply with an improvement notice. The sentences run concurrently.

The Judge ordered Kamali to carry out 100 hours of unpaid work and made a Hygiene Prohibition Order preventing him from becoming involved in the management of any food business. The order lasts for a minimum of six months and after then indefinitely unless a court agrees to lift it.

Kamali must also pay £2,500 towards Mansfield District Council's prosecution costs and the statutory victim surcharge. The Judge heard that Kamali had failed to change his food hygiene practices despite being advised to do so by council Environmental Health officers "time and time again".

The restaurant owner was convicted at Mansfield Magistrates' Court on 24 April after admitting the offences but District Judge Jonathan Taaffe referred it to the crown court for sentencing due to the seriousness of the case.

The food hygiene breaches were uncovered when council Environmental Health Officers visited Mirch Massala in March 2018 and found there was no running hot water at the premises due to a boiler fire. Inadequate handwashing facilities has been provided for staff and the arrangements for cleaning equipment were unsatisfactory.

The officers observed how the staff were preparing food and were concerned that without adequate handwashing facilities there were risks that ready-to-eat food, such as salads, could be contaminated by raw meat. Environmental Health Officers served a Hygiene Emergency Prohibition Notice to immediately stop the premises from serving ready to eat food which would not be cooked or food which could be contaminated after cooking. Mansfield Magistrates' Court subsequently issued a Hygiene Emergency Prohibition Order.

This visit came after previous visits which had found various failings and which Kamali had been instructed to rectify. The court heard he failed to provide hot running water so staff could wash their hands, adequate facilities to clean utensils, or to put permanent hygiene procedures in place.

After the case, David Evans, the council's Head of Health and Communities, said:

"The council takes its responsibilities for checking food hygiene in local restaurants very seriously and we are pleased that the courts do also - as this case clearly demonstrates."

"No one wants to go for a meal and risk ending up with food poisoning. It is vital that businesses employ the correct procedures and take seriously the advice they may be given by council officers. It's both in their interests and the interests of their customers to do so."



Warsop Fly-tip Offence

A Sutton-in-Ashfield man has been ordered to pay a total of £712 after waste was found fly-tipped in Warsop.

At Mansfield Magistrates' Court on 10 May, Kola Adelokun, 47, of Upper Mill Street, Sutton, pleaded guilty to one charge of failing to comply with his business duty of care in respect of waste, an offence under the Environmental Protection Act 1990.

He was fined £375 and ordered to pay £300 in costs and a £37 surcharge. Mansfield District Council brought the prosecution after a large deposit of fly-tipped waste was found in a field off Blakeney Lane, Warsop, on 12 June 2018.

The court was told that the waste included bags of grass cuttings, cardboard, polystyrene, a large mirror and two empty paint buckets full of pipe and waste fittings. Within the waste council officers found a delivery note relating to an address in Forest Town.

Further enquiries revealed that Kola Adelokun had responded to an advert on Facebook and had arranged to collect the waste for a fee of £50.

Magistrates heard that after collecting the waste in his van, he lent the van loaded with waste to a friend and failed to take any steps to prevent the waste being fly-tipped.

David Evans, Head of Health and Communities at the council, said:

"Anyone who carries waste as a business has a duty to ensure that waste is disposed of legally and responsibly."

"The council is committed to making this district a greener and cleaner place to encourage more people to visit, work and live here and fly-tipping is an expensive blight on our district. For this reason, we will always prosecute cases of this kind, where appropriate."

Extra Police Officers for Mansfield

Four extra police officers will soon be on the beat in Mansfield district – one of which will be paid for by Mansfield District Council. Two of the officers will be dedicated to Mansfield town centre.

Nottinghamshire Police had already planned to provide three new officers for the district in the current financial year. The council has asked for these officers to be patrolling the streets by the end of September.

Mansfield District Council has agreed to pay for a fourth police officer, on the basis that two of the four officers will be dedicated to the town centre. It is expected that this officer will start imminently.

Executive Mayor of Mansfield Andy Abrahams reinforced his request for additional police officers following the tragic incident on Gladstone Street last week, which resulted in an arrest, plus a disturbance in Mansfield Market Place, which led to seven arrests. There have also been numerous reports of antisocial behaviour.

The Mayor said:

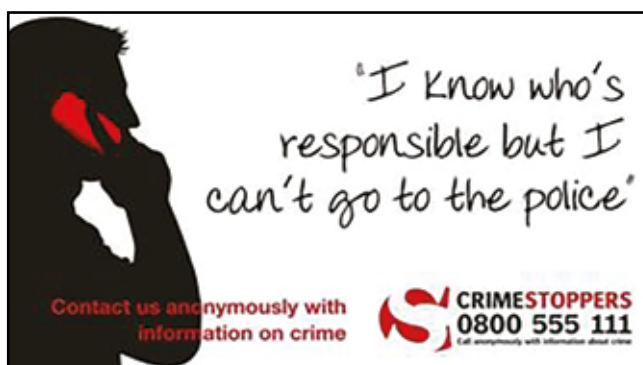
"I am extremely pleased that Nottinghamshire Police has agreed to provide extra officers for Mansfield. We hope to see an increased visible presence as soon as possible before the end of September."

"I hope this will help to reassure our residents, businesses and visitors of our commitment to keep the town centre and the surrounding district a safe and welcoming place. Mansfield is very much open for both business and leisure activities."

The news of extra officers was confirmed at a meeting this week between the Mayor; Chief Constable of Nottinghamshire Police Craig Guildford, and Police and Crime Commissioner Paddy Tipping. This followed a constructive meeting with Mansfield Inspector Nick Butler and Chief Inspector for Mansfield and Ashfield Kathryn Craner last week.

The Mayor also confirmed the town centre policing team would have a presence in the newly-refurbished Old Town Hall when it is re-opened, which will contribute towards their physical presence around the town. The council's Community Safety team is also working with Nottinghamshire Police to look at the officers' shift patterns to optimise their presence in the town centre.

The council is examining how it can give its Neighbourhood Wardens additional powers and equipment to combat antisocial behaviour and is looking at ways to further improve the way information captured by the council's high-quality CCTV system is actioned.

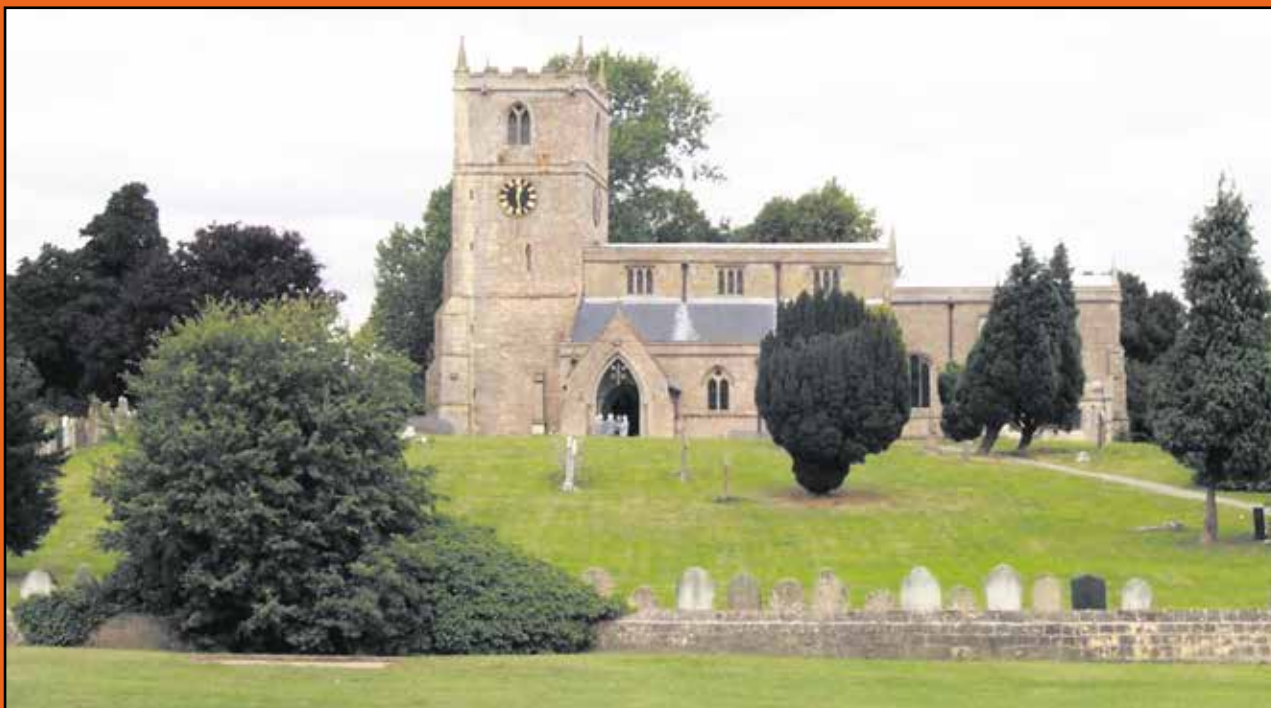

We can anticipate the return of the beautiful white Little Egrets along the river and there are early signs of an excellent crop of sloes on blackthorn, good news for birds (and sloe gin makers!).

I was pleased to note that the three species I mentioned in my June notes all appeared on schedule. The Marbled White butterfly reappeared on the Hills & Holes and at Shirebrook Wood, kingfishers were viewed on The Carrs and it has been an excellent year for many types of orchid, particularly the Bee Orchid.

Many people automatically think of the gym as the obvious place to work out but exercising outdoors can bring even more benefits. Being in or near the natural world has been proven to increase wellbeing, whether you're exercising or not. Scientific studies have shown that outdoor exercise can improve your mood, as well as reducing anxiety and depression. Simply having views of trees and plants from a hospital window can decrease recovery time. Combining nature and exercise is a great way to improving health and wellbeing. It is also cheaper than going to the gym! If you feel the need to exercise outdoors you could take a local walk, a run or a bike ride, or maybe join in our work sessions. Take a look at our website warsopcountryside.wordpress.com where there are walk guides and leaflets you can download.

This month we should be finishing giving Warsop's footpaths their final cut of the year. Then we will move onto some grassland management. Once trees and hedges have shed their leaves and birds have eaten the hedgerow fruits we will start managing the hedges alongside some of our footpaths. We continue our weekly work sessions throughout the winter months so get in touch if you would like to come along and help. It's good fun, good exercise and it helps to keep Warsop's countryside such a special place.

By September any Himalayan balsam plants that have not been removed by this group (we've culled over 8000 so far this year) will be firing their seeds a distance of up to 20 feet to ensure a good crop next year. As this invasive non-native plant causes damage to our riverbanks it is important that anybody who is lucky enough to have a garden that borders on a waterway checks whether they have any Himalayan balsam growing in their garden and, if they find any, remove all the flower heads before they seed. Just one seed escaping into a river or stream can cause major problems downstream. In fact, it is an offence to cause Himalayan Balsam to spread into the wild under the Wildlife and Countryside Act, Section 9, Schedule 14! The best thing to do is to pull the plants up as soon as they appear in spring.

The Footpaths Group's walks take place on the third Saturday of most months. We usually meet at 10am outside Warsop Library and we either walk around Warsop or travel to a starting point a few miles away by car. If you fancy a longer walk October is the month when we revive the old tradition by walking the paths closest to Warsop's parish boundary. On our other walks we place more emphasis on enjoying the countryside than clocking up the miles!
