Consultation Breakdown

Here are the results of the consultation undertaken by Warsop Parish Council to determine the future of the Town Hall and the ongoing maintenance/financial issues.



This was done to give the public chance to have their say on how the precept/ public money is spent and to see if the Parish Council could produce a viable business plan as per their financial regulations in regard to the huge repair costs.

The verification and breakdown of the consultation results was completed by Parish Council staff.

- There were 15 responses voided and removed while the consultation was open due to not having the information required on question 8.
- There was a total of 257 responses.
- Anomalies there were 14 anomalies. These were responses that we could not verify on the electoral register. There were also 6 paper copies that were all in the same handwriting with very similar answers and 2 of them could not be verified and are included in the total 14 anomalies. These anomalies have been included in the outcome because we are aware that some of the names on this list do live in the Parish and the issue is with MDC's electoral register.
- Parish Council staff removed 7 responses -4 were duplicates, 2 lived outside of the Parish and 1 was underage.
- Q1 Do you want to keep the Town Hall?

 There were 2 votes more for not keeping the Town Hall. (126 to 124)
- Q2 Would you be happy for the Parish Council to increase the precept (council tax) to pay for repairs and maintenance (including building survey works)?

People of the Parish do not want the precept increasing to pay for the maintenance of the Town Hall.

Q3 If you answered 'yes' to keeping the Town Hall and would like this to be done via a community group, would you be willing to be part of that group and take on full responsibility of the Town Hall?

50 people selected the option to be part of a group to take on the responsibility/ ownership (with a lease/contract) of the

All 50 have been contacted via letter asking if they still wish to be part of the group. The number of members for this group has reduced to 17.

Q4 Is there another way the money can be raised to pay for the maintenance and repairs (including building survey works) of the Town Hall?

There were a few really good and productive answers that the council could use.

Unfortunately, a lot of the answers were aimed at what MDC or NCC should be doing. Please contact the Parish Council who will expand on the roles/duties of MDC and NCC as there seems to be some confusion on which authority provides what services.

Q5 If you answered 'no' to keeping the Town Hall, what would your preference be from the following options.

The majority of people would rather staff work from home if we didn't have the Town Hall. The second option was to rent premises and the third option was to buy.

Q6 What would you like to see the precept spent on? Please prioritise these in order of importance from 1 to 5, 1 being the highest priority and 5 the lowest.

The top 5 priorities that people listed as what they would like to see the Parish Precept spent on was as follows:

- 1) Outreach Programmes
- 2) Support and encourage local businesses
- 3) Maintain areas within the Parish
- 4) Improve the Town Centre
- 5) Continue to support local groups and organisations

This is something that the Parish Council will be reviewing and working towards.

The least favoured options were:

- 1) Providing educational courses
- 2) Investing and co-ordinate community events
- 3) Providing a market.
- Q7 Is there something that isn't mentioned on the list that's a priority to you?

This is very similar to the answer given for Q4.

Q8 Please give your details in the comment box: Surname, postcode, age.

This was for people to add their details for verification purposes.

If the Town Hall Community Group is not a viable option, then Warsop Parish Council will sell the Town Hall and earmark/reserve the monies from the sale.

RESOLVED: This proposal was unanimously agreed by all members in attendance.

GARDENING UPDATE



Top 10 autumn tips. This season is all about picking up and packing down before the arrival of winter. Here are our top ten tips to make the most of your autumn garden.

1. Give greenhouse windows a thorough clean

As the nights draw in, make the most of the available light by scrubbing shade paint from your greenhouse windows. This lets more of the sun's rays through the glass, helping winter temperatures to climb that little bit higher, saving you money on

A bucket of hot water and some elbow grease is all it takes to bring the glass up sparkling clean. Now's a good time to check and replace damaged panes, and clear your greenhouse gutters too.

2. Leave no place for pests to hide

Before overwintering tender plants, empty your greenhouse, sweep out plant debris, and disinfect all paths and staging, including the inside of the glass. A hot solution of garde disinfectant or Jeyes Fluid will help to prevent pests and fungal infection. Ventilate your greenhouse for couple of days and clean pots and seed trays

3. Tidy up borders

To ensure a vibrant display next spring, dig up annuals and plant your beds with pansies, bellis daisies and wallflowers. Cut back faded perennials to 5 cm above ground level, but don't be too tidy – attractive seed heads are great for insects, look wonderful covered in autumn dew, and provide handsome winter silhouettes. Once your borders are clean and tidy, spread a layer of compost.

4. Lawn enforcement

Remove thatch and moss using a spring-tined rake and add it to the compost heap. If you have large amounts of moss, you may want to use a moss killer on your lawn first. Brush in a sandy top dressing afterwards, followed by an application of autumn lawn feed to prepare your lawn for the cold winter months.

Improve drainage and aeration around paths and play areas by making deep holes with the prongs of a garden fork at 10 cm intervals. Autumn is a great time to lay new turf too.

5. Make leaf mould

Homemade leaf mould is easy to make. Leaf mould adds structure and organic matter to your soil and is a great way to recycle fallen leaves. Choose a sheltered spot that won't spoil the view of your garden and using wire mesh and wooden stakes, make a large bin. Fill with leaves, sprinkle with water and leave.

Once the leaves reach a crumbly texture, spread as a mulch throughout your borders. Oak, alder, beech, and hornbeam rot fairly guickly. Shredding the leaves will help to speed things up.

6. Clear out compost bins

The autumn clear up of borders and vegetable plots always generates a lot of plant material for your compost heap. Now is the ideal time to clear out last year's compost and use it around the garden, making room for this year's waste.

7. Plant evergreens

Evergreens provide structure and interest during the drab months of winter. Fill gaps in your borders with evergreens like sarcococca and daphne which provide glossy, green leaves and beautifully fragrant flowers even in the depths of winter.

Do lift tender species like begonias, dahlias, and cannas before the first frosts threaten. Cut back the stems and gently lift the tubers/ rhizomes from the ground. Clean the soil from them and store in trays of dry compost or sand, with just the top of crown visible.

Put the trays in a cool, frost free place over the winter ready for replanting when spring arrives and all risk of frost has passed.

Decomposing leaves turn your pond water foul and block filters on pumps. Save time and effort later, by catching falling leaves before they hit your pond.

Spread a fine meshed net across the pond and pin it down with bricks. Remove any leaves that fall onto it and add them to your leaf mould bin or compost heap.

10. Maintain garden equipment

Sharp, rust free tools make gardening tasks quicker and easier

Shears and secateurs need sharpening, while spades, forks, and other tools benefit from a good wash. Dry everything thoroughly and oil metal parts to prevent rust. Wooden handles can be cleaned and protected with linseed oil – but do dispose of rags carefully as linseed can combust as it dries.

Now your autumn garden is clean, tidy and ready for winter and you'll have a head start when spring arrives.

Let's have a look at what they have been up to, along with our campaign updates, because yes, we face huge problems with climate change, but they are human-made problems, so humans can help put things right. You could help, too!

PLASTIC POLLUTION CAMPAIGN

We Warsopians do love our takeaways - or is that the other way round? But every time we order a takeaway in plastic containers, or buy a kebab in a Styrofoam box, or pick up a coffee in a single-use, plastic-lined cup, we are keeping up demand for fossil fuels, adding to emissions and the plastic waste mountain.

Don't forget, 99% of plastic is made from fossil fuels and only 9% ever produced has been recycled - the rest is still in the environment and will be for centuries to come! Whilst glass and metal can be recycled endlessly, plastic can only be recycled 2-3 times before it is of no use - recycling is an idea that the plasticindustry themselves came up with to greenwash an environmentally devastating product - we really need to turn off the single-use-plastic tap!

You can help -

next time you order takeaway, ask for non-plastic packaging. If we all speak up, the message will get through.

We have recently leafleted a number of Warsop businesses, asking for their help in tackling single use plastic. It was great to find that some are already making inroads into changing their packaging choices or trying to help the environment: -

- · The Fashion Shop are looking into changing their online sales packaging from plastic mail bags to cardboard
- No 19 Bistro have opened up a lovely outdoor patio, with lots of pollinator-friendly plants
- Allotment Box supply lots of non-plastic-packaged fresh fruit and veg; run a local-grown "allotment swap" and help us reduce our car use with their box delivery scheme
- Mansfield Refillery are working hard to increase reuse of containers and sell many non-plastic alternatives to everyday items

Other local businesses may be trying hard to cut the plastic - please let us know, so we can highlight their efforts! And please, everyone, support our local businesses doing their best to serve both Warsop and

You can help -

Please keep a reusable shopping bag with you.

A few local shops mentioned how much demand there still is for single use plastic carrier bags, so let's cut emissions by remembering our totes! Reduce, Reuse, Recycle Campaign Great Warsop Reuse/Recycle Initiatives

• Tetrapak cartons that used to go in the green bin can now be recycled at Warsop Recycling Centre on Oakfield Lane – brilliant!

- High Street Co-op now have a soft plastic recycling bin – bread, pasta, biscuit wrappers, etc., that can't be recycled in the blue bin can now be recycled
- Mansfield Refillery on High Street have two TerraCycle collection bins outside their shop when they are open:



- o one for bras, which raises funds for breast cancer charity
- o one for soft plastic cheese wrappers
- Allotment Box on Church Street collects clean empty crisp packets for the "Crisp Packet Project Shirebrook" turning crisp packets into sleeping bags for the homeless! Kate also accepts return of clean glass food jars with lids.

If other Warsop shops would like to take part in recycling initiatives, or schools and community groups want to raise funds via recycling, have a look at TerraCycle UK website for details. We would love to see zero waste; but everything being recycled at local, accessible drop-off points is the next best thing. Mansfield District Council Climate Action Plan Campaign

MDC promised us, back in March 2019, a climate action plan to back up their declaration of a climate emergency. Sadly, we are still waiting, even though 72% of other authorities now have action plans in

MDC inform us of several projects – a new glass recycling scheme; an extension to Green Homes Grant Scheme (but only for low income residents in Ladybrook); a £1 million award that will enable the town centre greening project to start this Autumn (no sites in Warsop mentioned, though). Planning procedure already calls for new developments to comply with Local Plan and green infrastructure policies and they will be preparing Low Carbon Planning guidance later this year. But MDC says: "There is currently no set timetable for the Climate Change Strategy at present"

Why are we disappointed in this response?

Declaring climate emergency needs to be backed up with an "emergency" level of action across every department, because the crisis is NOW: "State of the Global Climate 2020" report published in April: "2021 must be the year for climate action – the make it or break it year."

- CO2 is at 419 parts per million NOW and rising, with a global average temperature of 1.2C above pre industrial levels. This has already accelerated and worsened climate impacts -polar ice loss; record breaking temperatures; coral reef die back; wildfires; floods: drought.
- Emission levels lead some climate scientists NOW to predict 1.5C before 2025 and 2C during 2030's.
- Rapidly rising temperatures are devastating our natural support systems NOW, threatening civilized society.
- United Nations climate scientists warn of pointof-no-return climate thresholds - tipping points and cascading impacts which could trigger irreversible and potentially catastrophic changes – scientists NOW think some may have already been triggered.

So, scientists tell us we need to act NOW, to reduce emissions and halt the biodiversity crisis, but our own local authority has no climate strategy even planned.

You can help - Please, tell your MDC Councillors, this is nowhere near the level of action we need to see.



Annual Canvass Gets Underway in Mansfield

Residents in Mansfield district are being urged to look out for their voter registration details which they will receive by post, email or text.

The voter registration details are being sent by Mansfield District Council as part of the annual canvass, which it is required to do by law. This ensures that the council can keep the electoral register up to date, identifying any residents who are not registered so that they can be encouraged to do so.

The council's Electoral Services team will be sending 18,470 emails and texts to residents from Monday 19 July and 32,248 letters are due to land on doormats across the district later in the week. Residents are asked to check the information they receive and follow the instructions provided.

This provides an important opportunity for residents to make sure they can take part in future elections and not lose their voice on decisions that affect them by making sure their electoral registration details are up to date.

The next scheduled elections due to take place in Mansfield are the Mayoral and the Mansfield District Council elections in May 2023. Hayley Barsby, Chief Executive and Electoral Registration Officer at Mansfield District Council, said:

"It's important that residents keep an eye out for messages from Mansfield District Council, so we can make sure we have the right details on the electoral register for every address in the Mansfield district area. To make sure you are able to have your say at future elections simply follow the instructions provided.

"If you're not currently registered, your name will not appear in the messages we send. If you want to register, the easiest way is online at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote, or we'll send you information explaining how to do this in the post."

People who have moved home recently are particularly encouraged to look out for the voter registration messages and check the details.

Research by the Electoral Commission indicates that recent home movers are far less likely to be registered than those who have lived at the same address for a long time. Across Great Britain, 92% of people who have been at their property for more than 16 years will be registered, compared to 36% of people who have lived at an address for less than one year.

Melanie Davidson, Head of Support and Improvement at the Electoral Commission, said:

"It's really important that everyone who is entitled to vote is able to do so. Checking the messages that you will get from your local authority is the easiest way to see if you're registered to vote. If you're not, make sure you provide the necessary information to your local authority when it is needed and register to vote online at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote."

Appointment Letters Available Online for Sherwood Hospital Patients

Patients at Sherwood Hospital NHS Foundation Trust can now securely access their outpatient letters and appointments electronically via the NHS App.

The new service, which is completely free, will link hospital information in the NHS App, allowing patients to view their hospital outpatient appointment letters. It will also allow patients to add information to their record, for example measurements, symptoms, or data from devices such as fitness watches.

It's all thanks to some extra technology that has been added to the app for patients in Nottinghamshire through Connected Nottinghamshire, which supports the development of digital NHS services for patients across the county.

The NHS App already allows patients to see their vaccinations status, order repeat prescriptions, book and manage GP appointments, get health information and advice, and view their NHS Number and GP health record securely.

The Trust will be writing to outpatients giving them the opportunity to sign up for the new service as they receive appointments, but anyone can sign up at any time. They just need to download the NHS App, click on 'messages' and sign up the service, which is run by NHS partners Patients Know Best.

David Selwyn, Medical Director at Sherwood Forest Hospitals Trust and the lead for this project explains:

"We want to put as much information as we can into the hands of our patients. Letters are great for those who want them, but most of us now interact with the world much more digitally, so to have access to your hospital information on your phone, tablet or computer is much more convenient and timely.

"Because the access is through the national NHS App patients can be confident that their information is safe and secure and we hope that people will take up this opportunity. This is just the start and whilst we will never replace existing analogue services, we hope to offer the option for more information to be shared digitally as time goes on.

"This is good for patients, good for the environment as we reduce paper use and also good for NHS budgets as we cut down on the cost of postage, printing and paper and can use that for patient care."

Leah visited school recently to see the final results. She told us: "I have had a very busy few days, thank you so much for my eco dress it's incredible!".


When asked of details of the competition she said,

The teenager made an immediate impact on the club racing scene in 2019 by winning all four races in one Brands Hatch weekend – and has since gone from strength to strength. Lewis has been riding bikes since the age of 12 and originally got involved in the sport through his dad Bryn, who is a fan of the sport.

Many weekends were spent attending the meets, getting to know the riders and the teams - until one day someone said to him:

"When are you going to start riding?

"That's where it all began and once in the hot seat, it became clear that Lewis was a natural rider and he is now fifth in the country in his age group.

"Stamina is so important and much of my time is dedicated to the training," he said. "I do regular spinning and weights but, most important, is working on your core muscles. "People don't realise how much dedication it takes to train for racing and it is something you have to take seriously."

Lewis is very appreciative for all the sponsorship he receives from companies large and small as it enables him to race, but dad Bryn points out there is a lack of general funding for young riders. He said:

"There is so much more funding available for sports such as football, tennis and golf for example. When it comes to motorbike racing though, you are heavily reliant on sponsorship. The cost of everything is expensive and you don't get paid to race."

But they don't do it for the money; they do it for the love of the sport, with Lewis saying that "going in to the corners at over 100mph is a real thrill". We are very proud of Lewis's achievements so far. He has great potential and a promising career ahead of him



I caught up with Nikki Bordacs down at her weekly FitCamp session on The Carrs, to check-in and see how her own personal training is going, ahead of her Bikini Trained (PCA – Physical Culture Association) finals on October 17th 2021

PCA is a bodybuilding federation in the UK, with "an association for bodybuilding and fitness". One that puts the athletes first, it has been formed with the primary goal: the evolution of physical culture.

Nikki and her team are down on The Carrs every Tuesday from 17.15 – 18.00 throughout the year doing FitCamp, so either get in touch or pop on down if you are interested in joining in and getting fit.

The NDFitness team pushed through the heat and did not shy away from the camera, keeping hydrated and focused with their work-out as I snapped a few pictures of the session before sitting down and speaking with Nikki about her work, the fitness process, and her upcoming final.

"No matter how slim or big you are, everyone is fighting a battle." – Nikki

PC: What does an average training day look like for you at the moment?

NB: Currently, because I've just had an operation, not much. I'm going crazy but normally it would be up in the morning... I'd probably do a hit class in the morning, 20 minutes of cardio and I then do my training normally between 12 and 4 in the afternoon and I block that out for myself... A good training day takes 3 and a half hours. I train for twelve days straight and then I take two days off normally.

PC: How did you do in your previous PCA competition, as a contestant in 'Bikini'?

NB: I got third place and I have been invited back to the British finals which are in October.

PC: There is a lot of talk about the physical process of fitness and training, but what is the mental process like for you?

NB: My partner got me into it. He was all into standing in the mirror at the gym and looking at himself and I used to think you're so egotistical, it was not my scene at all. I was more into running, I did a couple of marathons. I did Iron Man a couple of years ago, that was my thing... I was a cardio girl. Did a bit of weights, but nothing too extreme. And then I saw my partner have this discipline about what he ate and this discipline came behind closed doors, so nobody could see, apart from me - I just thought, I would love to have that discipline. Plus, I had an eating disorder for a long time in my life... Bulimia, and I just thought maybe this might help me. Initially, for the first six months of training with my food, I had two episodes where I was bulimic and then this year I've had none. So, it seems like this new way of eating has helped me to get around it.

PC: You're outspoken on social media about body-shaming, particularly as a muscular woman... What advice would you give to other women who are interested in bulking up but are worried about society's judgments?

NB: So, the muscular aesthetic look... That is just for the stage. You do not look that scary, like I've met girls that I've seen pictures of, all tanned up and ripped... And I've met them, and I think



there's three ladies in particularly, who do this professionally... And I've met them and they've been tiny humans. Really petite. You can see definition, but nothing like what you see on the stage. That is what the photos are there for. Think in your head, would you rather feel saggy or would you like to feel nice and tight in your skin? I know when you feel tight, when you've lost a bit of water weight and fit better in your clothes, you feel nicer and feel great naked. If every woman could have a photoshoot and look at photos and love themselves, you don't even have to be ripped to feel like that... But lifting weights has so many benefits to it. You will not be the hulk the next day, it takes months of building muscle. Empowering women to lift weights, to know what they're doing when they walk into a gym is so important.

PC: Is that why the Ladies Only space came in, at NDFitness?

NB: Yeah, but nobody uses it... Everyone feels absolutely comfortable with everyone. It is always open, it's a private room. Put your own music on, shut the door and put the blinds down. As soon as people know what they're doing, they are more than happy to go around to the main gym on their own. No matter how slim or big you are, everyone is fighting a battle... Everybody who walks through the door. The gym is such a different place than what it was three or four years ago... And mental health is a lot more spoken about too, which is good.

PC: Going back to the finals, what would it mean to you if you won?

NB: I am being realistic here. It would mean recognition for ND Fitness. A small-town gym that nobody has heard about... So many people who join say they didn't even realise that we were a gym. I am representing my gym. My personal growth is overcoming eating disorders, but it feels good to put the gym out there for the community. So yes, it is proving to myself that I can do this and prove to everybody else in the community that it doesn't matter where you come from... Whether it be a small village or a gym that doesn't look flashy or anything, but it shows you can still get the workout you need for the results you want. Anything is possible.

I recently met with local mum and photographer, Natalie Retallic on The Carrs to talk about all things Warsop Parish and her wonderful photography.

Natalie currently has an Instagram account with 500 followers which keeps on growing. PC: Hello Natalie, lovely to meet you.
Thank you for coming for a chat. You mentioned that you have lived here in Warsop for 5 years...
What attracted you to move to Warsop?

NR: My mother-in-law, she ran the Hare and Hounds five or six years ago... We went to visit her and they were building new houses, so we went to see the show home and have a look, and we bought a house that day and that was it. We knew a lot of people in the pub and they were always really lovely and then we moved... I don't want to leave. Everyone is so nice here, I have literally spoken to every single person that I've walked by today. You don't get that anywhere else.

PC: When did you first take up photography?

NR: It started on and off about five years ago, but lockdown really kicked it off. Just before lockdown, my little girl was going to 'Shaping Futures' and obviously I'd take Harry (dog) for a walk every day, and I didn't really notice it at first as you can be so blinkered, but I think lockdown really pushed me to appreciate what is around... And I just started taking photos. There's just so much to get... PC: What inspires you most about Warsop Parish?



The Start of Our Town:

Could Warsop Old Hall have some answers?

The project is now underway with some of the surveying having already taken place, which has unearthed rather exciting results.

The highlight of the project so far has been the discovery of multiple pieces of early medieval pottery, suggesting that the Old Hall is on the same spot as the original hall or manor house which started the settlement, one that we now know as Warsop Parish.

As well as pottery, dendrochronology (or tree ring dating) has dated some of the beams from the older parts of the house to be from 1355.

As part of the project, new features have also been recorded including a medieval window and an early medieval cross repurposed inside the hall. These features have not previously been recorded, but thanks to the work of Mercian Archaeological Services, they are being noticed and adding valuable insight into Warsop's past.

A Geophysics survey has also been done in the churchyard, around the hall, and in Mr. Robert Bowring's surrounding fields. The findings of the survey have not yet been verified.

Local volunteers, including the 2nd Warsop Scouts, took part in our graveyard survey in May, which involved painstakingly recording names, inscriptions, and locations of the stones. This handwritten information has now been transferred to an Excel spreadsheet by two members of the WPCC, Mary and Peter Birchenall. So far, they have entered 245 names from the first batch of surveying. They are now locating the church burial records for the Warsop Church

so that the data can begin to be validated. We still have more records to capture, so if you have some free time on your hands, you are more than welcome to join our project and help us preserve the past, for future Warsopians.

Our live museum, which should have taken place on Saturday 7th August, has had to be postponed until early 2022 due to a delay in lockdown restrictions easing. However, we will be running a history day that will take you on a journey through time in Warsop Parish. This is a great opportunity for people to come along and see what we have discovered to date. A tour of the building will also be provided.

We are completing the excavation of some test pits. These will be one metre by one metre squares which will be excavated in various locations around the Old Hall.

 If kneeling and bending to excavate a test pit does not sound like an ideal day, we also have our finds processing happening on these dates.

Coaching Olympians


Jamie Johnson, our local Judoka, (a person who practises judo or is considered a judo expert) is retired from competing professionally but now coaches young people for the British Judo Association.

Jamie has done an amazing job in supporting one of his coachees, Chelsie Giles to secure a bronze medal for Team GB in Judo at the Tokyo Olympics in July 2021. This waswas the first medal of the year for Team GB! What a fantastic achievement for both Chelsie and Jamie.

Jamie has had a successful Judo career of his own which involved a win in the Czech Cup Prague U60kg in 1998 and he has secured a range of exceptional results in tournaments and championships around the world throughout his professional career, including bronze in the European Youth Olympic Festival in 1987 for the U49 category.

Jamie kindly agreed to have a chat with us about all things Warsop, Judo, and the Tokyo Olympics. Here are 5 Questions with Judo's Jamie Johnson.

- It is evident that you have had a very successful career in Judo, so how was it to go from competing yourself, to coaching others?
- JJ: Well I started doing a little bit of coaching before I actually retired from competing. I was at Nottingham, I came to about 28 – it was another cycle, so I was like do I continue with another cycle? So I had already done a little bit of coaching, thinking about it and then I got a phone call from one of the lads, a performance director and they said we've got a few jobs going at Bisham Abbey near London at a National Academy they were setting up, so I thought right I do need to get into coaching anyway, that is what I've wanted to do... I was quite a voung coach then. I went for the interview and got the job straight away, so from being 28ish, that was 2001 - I've been coaching ever since... I kind of just fell into it really, I stopped competing and went straight into coaching... It was a good transfer to be fair.
- 2) It was great to see your celebration as Chelsie won her Bronze medal, take us back to that moment – what were you feeling?
- JJ: She qualified in the top 8 in the world...
 She was number 7 in the world ranking.
 When you're seeded it is a little bit better,
 you keep away from the top seats until the
 quarter-finals... We didn't know it was the
 first medal for Great Britain until about two,
 three minutes after she won... Everything
 had come together and it was quite
 emotional. It still is, even talking about it.
- 3) The moment of celebration was shared in Warsop Community Groups on Facebook, which is what initially made me and many others aware of the exciting win. How does it feel to have so much local support, whether it was for you as a competitor and even now as a coach?
- JJ: Well, I'm Warsop through and through... I started Judo when I was six or seven. Then I started to get a little decent at it. When I got to 14, Meden School knew I was doing well, I used to have to get up in assemblies and



I love to put Warsop on the map... You know, I can go down the street for a loaf of bread or pint of milk and it takes me an hour sometimes because I'm chatting to people. That's just Warsop for you. It's a close community. It's brilliant, and it's just carried on from being a Judo player to a Coach. And I still know everybody, whether it was 20-30 years ago, or whether it's now. It's still exactly the same... I mean, I was sports mad more than writing down and the computer side. A bit of a loveable rogue. The support I've had locally has been fantastic.

- 4) Can you tell us a bit about how your Judo career started here in Warsop?
- JJ: I've got two older brothers and my Dad used to do Judo at a lower level and he had to pack it in because he didn't want to get injured because he had three kids and a wife. And he took us all to Judo and there was only me who continued with it. Then I used to love football and I was more into that than Judo...

My Dad said no you need to continue with Judo, you're better at Judo... I got to a decent level when I was about 14 and won the British Championships... I also got picked for Youth Olympic Games in 1987. I got bronze there! It just progressed from there.

- 5) How did Judo take you from Warsop to traveling the world?
- JJ: I went to different championships and I progressed into seniors... I was beating a lot of the seniors when I was a junior... I got into coaching straight after so it has been a smooth transition all the way through, and I'm still doing it now... It's been 40 odd years after, it has been a hell of a journey...

I progressed up. It's like Brian Clough, the old Forest manager said... Start at the bottom and work your way up. That is exactly what I've done. In the first Olympics I coached at, I was a support coach in Rio, and I helped out in London, but this is the first time I've actually coached in the Olympics and to come back with a medal is just amazing.

Jamie was chatty and friendly, full of great things to say about Warsop and the surrounding areas. Jamie also shared that wherever he ends up in the world, Warsop will always be home.

I guess there's just no place like Warsop.







Resident's Letter

Dear Editor

I am sure that I am not alone on this matter but I need to express my concerns about the escalating amount of anti-social behaviour from a number of local teenagers.

These young people take delight in gathering on street corners, outside shops and on local parks in Warsop hurling abuse and name calling at innocent passers by who are just minding their own business, in the process of shopping or just getting out and about for a walk.

This band of anything between 20 to 30 youngsters who are mainly boys, with a few girls also cajoled into taking part, seem to be devoid of any kind of respect or understanding of day to day life in the town and surrounding villages.

They can hurl insults, name call and generally antagonise the public yet try and respond verbally or gesture back and ridicule seems to be their line of defence.

On several occasions I have rung the police as I have just about been at the end of my tether but by the time there has been any sort of response from the boys in blue you won't see the culprits for dust.

I appeal to our local Councillors to come and witness it in the streets for themselves and for the local authorities to improve the CCTV system in and around the town so there is a permanent record of bad behaviour.

The teenagers probably do what they do knowing that if anyone takes the law into their own hands they will go running shouting and screaming about GBH or assault. That seems to be their defence.

I don't know when these youngsters will grow up and if they will ever understand that what they are doing.

I have travelled to many parts of the world and witnessed exemplary behaviour and kindness from youths of their age. But return to Warsop and it's not long before the anti-social behaviour is apparent once again.

I'd like my name being withheld as the author of this letter for fear of reprisal – that's how concerned and afraid I am.

As a final example of the behaviour, if you get shouted at and ignore them or don't respond you get stones or other objects thrown at you and then scoffed at with even more repulsive and grotesque language.

WARSOP Footpath & Countryside Group

2021 could be a record year for nettles, brambles, bracken and cleavers!

The mixture of wet and warm conditions has made these plants reach record heights. Grass has also been growing rapidly as we strive to keep up with mowing our public footpaths.

Maybe we will have to become accustomed to overgrown countryside paths as climate change impacts on the jet stream and our weather patterns. In the meantime we are doing our best to keep paths clear!

Spring and early summer has not be a good time for our butterflies. Numbers were much lower than usual and I have not seen some of our regular species. Warmer weather in July has resulted in more butterflies (pictured below) appearing but I fear that it will not be a good year for many species. However, I am pleased to have spotted Marbled Whites on the Hills & Holes for the first time in two years and Ringlet numbers appear to be recovering after a recent decline.



Warsop has a new public bridleway, bringing our total number of public paths to 60. The new route, Warsop Bridleway 60, approximately follows the line of the ancient Packmans Road through Peafield Plantation.

Packmans Road ran between Warsop and Forest Town, passing Westfield Farm and crossing the River Maun near Spa Ponds. Many folk have walked this route for many centuries but the entire route is now a public path.

In June we completed our tenth annual water vole survey along a kilometre stretch of the River Meden between the Mill Dam and Stone Bridge in Warsop. There is less evidence of water vole activity than in recent years and activity appears to be restricted to two ranges in the eastern part. This may be partly due to the survey taking place several weeks later than usual due to high river levels. The dense riverbank vegetation may have obscured evidence of lawns, runs and burrows that previously would have been observed. Some better news is that we may have found a new water vole territory elsewhere in Warsop.

Initial checks for Himalayan balsam along Warsop waterways upstream from the Mill Dam are very promising with only a handful of these invasive plants removed from the riverbanks. However, downstream from Burns Bridge the situation is bad with dense areas of balsam growing to over 2 metres high and dominating the native vegetation. Once their seeds enter the river they will spread downstream and take over new areas. If you have a garden bordering on a waterway please check for the pink flowers of Himalayan balsam and make sure that you do not allow them to seed.

We hope to restart the Footpaths Group's organised walks in the coming months. We will post details on our Facebook page as soon as we fix a date. However, if you are looking for ideas for some walks around our local area, take a look at the Walking and Publications sections of our


