# The Future of Warsop Town Hall Residents of Warsop Parish - your views matter.

## Warsop Parish Council are consulting residents on the future of the Town Hall after a building survey reveals over £200k maintenance costs are required within the next few years.

Over previous years the upkeep bill for the Town Hall has been covered within the precept payments made to the Parish Council by its residents, (see page 2 for all Parish council costs and budget breakdowns). The Parish Council are a Local Government Authority that's here for you, fighting for a fair share of services in our parish. Its members believe in transparency, honesty and being financially responsible with public money. To do this, they need your views.

During the last 4 years the Parish council has spent over £67,000, in a bid to maintain the Town Hall to a workable standard. Works carried out have included installation of a new heating system, tiled roof works, new entry doors, cellar works, clock maintenance, re-plastering of clock room and so much more, but unfortunately these works have only scratched the surface and in some cases, they have simply 'papered the cracks'.

Last year in accordance with the council's financial regulations the councillors agreed that a plan was required to get on top of the Town Hall maintenance, and the only way to do this was to instruct a building surveyor to highlight what essential work is required to be done and an indicative time scale. The building survey was completed by an independent company with no

vested interest in the Parish Council or the Town Hall. The report shows a true indication of the condition of the building and an honest guide as to where to start the maintenance schedule. (A copy of the required maintenance stated within the building survey has been included for your reference).

The report shows £214,000 in work is required to simply maintain the building, on top of the outstanding fire risk and remedial works costs - that amount could rise towards a quarter of a million pounds worth of work to be carried out. Last year, Parish Council staff made efforts to seek funding through the Big Lottery Fund and the Heritage Fund but hit a brick wall at the first stage of the enquiry due to the Town Hall not meeting certain criteria's: it is not a listed building, it has little significant heritage importance, the rooms are hired out, it houses council offices and private businesses and that it is not considered a big enough community asset. The staff however, enquired again later last year, to check if the criteria had changed, but unfortunately all funding for both funds have been paused due to the huge impact of Covid.

The council's current financial position is, that, with regret, they simply cannot afford the

maintenance costs without successful funding bids, making increases in rent, and/or, potentially charging the people of the parish more through the Parish Precept. This is your money, and you should have a say - to be clear, the Parish Council does not want to increase your precept unnecessarily. Its members have debated within the council chamber over the past couple of years upon whether or not to increase the precept and the majority has won, for the people - against any increases.

This 4 page pull out (page 1,2,23,24) is designed to give you an unbiased view on what your contribution to the Parish Council element of your council tax is spent on. It will give you everything that you will need to make your informed opinion on how the Parish Council can move forward with the community interest at the forefront of any final decision.

#### A DECISION NOT TO BE MADE LIGHTLY

The future of the Town Hall is a difficult decision; some of our residents have very different views, some have a real passion to keep the building. Others do not, and there will be a few out there who just don't really know! You may be thinking what will happen to the Town Hall and its services

if the people choose to say, 'get rid of it, spend our money on other things' or 'we love it find a way to invest in it'! The outcome is unknown and any suggestions made at this point are purely hypothetical. There are so many questions that you will want to ask: what could the money which we currently spend on the Town Hall be used for? Are there better services to offer? Where will the Parish Council go? What state is the Town Hall actually in? How can I help? and, what are the alternatives?

These are just a few and whilst nobody knows the concrete answer to most of these questions, the information included will help you to know the facts, explore some options and create your own vision of the Parish that you deserve and that you can be proud of. We already have so much to be grateful for in our area, from the Green Flag awarded Carrs Park to the amazing community spirit that we have all demonstrated during lock down - supporting our neighbours and pulling out all the stops to celebrate our armed forces on VE Day under Covid restrictions! Our parish is loved by many and we deserve it to be the best that it can be – together, bit by bit, step by step, decision by decision - we can make it happen & your thoughts really do count. ## **Overview of the Town Hall and its Services**

Since 1933, Warsop Town Hall has stood proud on the corner of Church Street, its prominent location allows the building to be a focal point for, not only, locals and visitors of the town centre, but to passing traffic of the well-utilised A60.

The Town Hall is a civic building which has served many different purposes over the years, it has housed a Library, Council Chambers, welfare clinic and Urban, District & County Council offices, more recently being the home to Warsop Parish Council, the local policing team & neighbourhood wardens, Vibrant Warsop, MDC housing surgery, Royal British legion, Warsop Infotech group, Citizens Advice Bureau & local business - Ferocious dog.

#### **Warsop Parish Council**

Warsop Parish Council to this day is run with up to 12 members; they work to represent the interests of the whole community to ensure that Warsop Parish gets its fair share of services & they will continue to do so while ever the Parish Council exists. Some of the councillors sit on various committees helping to pull the community together. The Council holds 10 meetings per year which the public are invited to.

The Town Hall was purchased in 2011 on a ninetynine year lease from the district council for £1.00, under the stipulations that the Parish Council maintain the building or sell it back to the district for the fee of £1.00. Negotiations are underway for the Parish Council to be the sole owner. Subject to the outcome of these negotiations with MDC - any monies from the sale of the Town Hall could be invested in any viable property/new build in any location within the Parish or the council could borrow against the Town Hall to cover some of the costs for repair works. However, the current valuation is far less than the costs of repairs required. The Parish Council owns the High Street car park located at the side of the library and are proud to offer free car parking in our town centre. It is responsible for the closed church yard at St Peters & St Pauls church also.

The Parish Council is non-political and works solely for the good of the community. It pays for a weekly Citizens Advice Bureau drop in at the Town Hall and has negotiated with the Mansfield District Council for them to provide a housing surgery that is held in the Town Hall every other week. Both services are currently closed due to the pandemic, but the hope is to get them up and running again later in the year if Covid restrictions allow.

There is a yearly budget of £8000 to fund local groups & organisations; this fund has contributed annually to Warsop Carnival & in previous years has helped support local initiatives such as, Warsop in Bloom, Hetts Lane Holiday Club, DUWC, Warsop Youth Club plus many more. More recently they have provided some support & funding to - Warsop CAR who have helped those in need during the Covid Pandemic.

Along with the day to day running, financial, legal and administration duties of the Parish Council the Clerk and Assistant Clerk work together with designers and outside organisations to produce the quarterly publication of Warsop Parish News which is delivered to approximately 6000 households and, subsidised by the Parish Council, via the precept.

#### Police and Neighbourhood Wardens

The local police and wardens team hire 2 offices within the Town Hall, the offices are intended to be a base for admin duties and for the policing team to be local when on shift. The Town Hall is not a drop-in police station. When 101 or 999 is not required, contact numbers for our local policing and warden's team are featured within Warsop Parish News and on the Warsop Parish Council website. The Parish Council will work hard to maintain a police presence in the Parish.

#### **Vibrant Warsop**

Hire office space within the Town Hall. Vibrant Warsop CIC are a resident led, not for profit, Community Interest Company dedicated to Warsop Parish, aiming to add value to all the work that is already happening in the parish and 'energise community spirit' to ensure that Warsop is successful, thriving and locally run.

#### RBL

Royal British Legion holds a monthly drop in morning at the Town Hall which is supported by many ex-service men & women, The RBL group leave a donation for using the Town Hall facilities.

#### **Warsop Infotech Group**

Warsop Infotech is a voluntary group who hire a large proportion of the ground floor at the Town hall, they aim to provide support to all who want to develop their computing skills.

The group plays an important role in identifying training needs within the local community and liaising with training providers to bring educational courses to Warsop. Our residents can learn new skills and gain qualifications (charges may apply).

#### Ferocious Dog

Privately run local business, hiring space within the Town Hall.

**Business Rates** – The rateable value was checked in 2017/18 and is now up to date.

Gas – A third party is used to find the best deal possible. (*Please remember the size and age of the building when referencing the figures*).

**Electric** – A third party is used to find the best deal possible. (Please remember the size and age of the building when referencing the figures).

Water Rates – Changed from Severn Trent Water to Water Plus. Mostly follows the rate of inflation.

**Phones/Broadband** – Parish Council staff continually seek to find better contracts/deals as can be seen from 2018.

**Trade Waste** – Mansfield District Council offer the cheapest trade waste prices.

Maintenance/Services – This section includes all required services by law – for example fire safety systems/training, legionella/training, security systems, PAT testing, etc. There is also a budgeted amount for urgent/necessary repairs.

Insurance – This includes insurance for the Town Hall, car park (next to the library), Market Cross, War Memorial and public liability.

Payroll – The Parish Council employs people who live within the Parish. 2016/17 – 4 members of staff, 2017/18 – 4 members of staff, 2018/19 – 5 members of staff, 2019/20 – 5 members of staff, 2020/21 – 5 members of staff & 2021- 2022 currently working with 3 staff members.

**S137** – This is a funding pot available for local groups and organisations and is written into law as something the Parish Council must allow a budget for.

As you can see from the information, the Town Hall provides a great home to our valued services. Without this base the Parish Council cannot guarantee that they will continue locally, however, it is are dedicated in supporting each organisation.

The Town Hall is situated in a conservation area so when doing repairs or replacement works, it must be like for like and following the requirements from conservation.

Before any works are undertaken in the Town Hall asbestos testing must be completed for each area unless the area has already been tested.

Most of the works shown in the table are for repairs however, some the window frames are rotten

and therefore repairs may not be possible and replacement options could mean the cost would be much higher due to conservation rules.

If the results of the consultation are to keep the Town Hall open, then this plan below would be worked on and a realistic time frame will be set out in a 5-year business plan. Further work would also need to be done to identify any potential external funding streams.

The information in the above table provides approximate figures. Some of the works that are required could Incur a lower or higher fee.

**Professional Fees** – This includes legal memberships, internal and external auditors, IT support/systems, website, etc.

**Training** – Council training courses for Parish Council staff and councillors.

**Church Yard** – WPC are responsible for cutting the grass/weeding, pest control and tree inspections and related works within the boundary wall around St Peter's and St Paul's.

**Chair's Allowance** – The council elects a Chair of the council each year and they can use an allowance for charity events, competitions or other things linked to the Parish.

**Admin** – Stationary, toiletries, cleaning products, bank charges, equipment, etc.

Car Park Maintenance – Grounds maintenance works (cutting grass, weeding, etc) are normally carried out yearly.

Car Park Rates – The car park has a rateable value that is paid to MDC.

Car Park Loan – WPC took out a loan for the purchase of the car park (next to the library) and the shop (Mr Maggot Man). The shop was sold, and the loan will be fully paid by 2021/22.

Warsop Parish News Printing – The reduction of the paper to quarterly reduced costs dramatically in 2019/20 tax year and council staff sought out new printers. The number of pages can change the figures slightly.

**Warsop Parish News Design** – The council use a company within the Parish to design the paper. The number of pages can change the figures slightly.

**Warsop Parish News Delivery** – The paper is delivered by local people.

Warsop Market – The market ended up running at a loss but closed due to health and safety concerns.

CAB – WPC pay for this service to be provided for the residents of Warsop Parish to be based locally rather than people traveling to Mansfield for help and support.

Parish Precept - The Precept is a tax that Parish Council's charge their local electors to meet their budget requirements. Parish Councils do not receive any direct funding from central government and rely on their Precept plus any other income they generate from services or facilities they provide. The Parish Council Precept is part of the Council Tax and is collected from local electors via their Council Tax payments. The amount collected is calculated using the Council Tax Base, 6000 households in the Parish and the Band D equivalent which changes every year. The Parish of Warsop includes Sookholme, Spion Kop, Warsop, Meden Vale, Church Warsop and Warsop Vale.

Room Hire – There are 7 office spaces that can be rented out on a permanent basis or hired out for daily use.

WPNs Adverts – This figure decreased dramatically due to the paper being reduced to quarterly editions. The paper is subsidised by Warsop Parish Council.

Interest – This figure will vary depending on the interest rates. The interest is generated from bank accounts that have an amount reserved for capital projects and a 25 - 30% reserve for emergencies.

**VAT** – The council are able to claim back VAT on most vatable purchases. This figure will always be dependent on the council's expenditure on equipment, maintenance, etc. There is a limit on claiming VAT on building works.

**Photocopying** – This figure will vary depending on the publics need for printing/photocopying services.

Market Stalls – Due to health and safety issues of the location of the market, the decision was taken by the council to close the current market but have spoken about setting up a working group for a new market in the future.

## **GARDENING UPDATE**



## Top tips to help you get the best from your spring garden and prepare for the coming season.

After being cooped up all winter most of us can't wait to get outside and start pottering in the garden. With spring bulbs flowering, days lengthening and lambs in the fields, it's time to get out and prepare for the glorious summer ahead. There are lots of little jobs to keep us busy, even if the weather isn't brilliant, says Angela Slater from Hayes Garden World.

#### The flower garden:

This is the time woodland gardens come into their own so if you have an area under deciduous trees or shrubs, why not inject ground colour with hellebores, primroses, winter aconites or wood anemones?

Mulching herbaceous beds can save a lot of time and water by cutting down on the backbreaking job of weeding and watering. Spread a thick layer of coco bark mulch, home-made compost or well-rotted leaf mould to a thickness of about 3 inches. Don't do this if the ground is still frozen.

If you forgot to plant spring bulbs in autumn, there are plenty of pot grown species available in garden centres to inject some instant colour into borders and containers.

Summer flowering bulbs are also in garden centres so pot them up in good quality, peat-free compost and place in cool, bright, frost-free areas. Sink the pots in the border once the weather gets warmer and you know where you have gaps.

Set dahlia tubers in trays of damp compost to shoot, then cut off when about four inches long and place three round the edge of a six inch pot to grow on.

Small herbaceous perennials become available in garden centres now so buy while they are better value; later in the season they will be larger and more expensive. Either plant in the garden if the soil has warmed up sufficiently or pot on in larger pots.

Lots of bedding plants are available now so brighten up your spring pots and hanging baskets.

Sow sweet pea seed and leave somewhere bright and frost-free; use dedicated sweet pea modules or the cardboard middle out of toilet rolls.

If you have gaps in the herbaceous border and are lacking some colour, camellias, azaleas and rhododendrons are all early bloomers. They need an acid soil: if you garden with alkaline soil, grow them in containers using ericaceous compost.

#### The vegetable garden:

Set potatoes to chit and sow First Earlies about the end of March, weather permitting.

Sow chilli seeds and place in a heated propagator; they need as long a growing season as possible.

Dig over the veg plot ready to start planting as soon as the soil warms; place fleece tunnels over the soil to warm it faster.

#### Lawn care:

Rake out any moss and scatter some seed mixed with seed compost if there are any bald patches. If the grass has started to grow, give it a light trim with the mower set on the highest setting. Give an all-in-one weed, feed and moss killer.

#### Indoors:

Start giving houseplants more water and a weak feed.

Sow salad leaves and micro herbs in trays of seed compost and place on a warm, bright windowsill.

Bring some colour into the home with planted containers of spring bulbs and azaleas. Position them somewhere cool and light and keep just damp: too warm and they will quickly go over.

#### Odd jobs:

If you didn't do so in autumn, scrub out the greenhouse with a solution of Jeyes fluid or bleach, paying particular attention to the glass frames where over-wintering bugs hide. Clean the glass and leave the door open to dry thoroughly.

Scrub greenhouse staging, pots and seed trays.

Peruse the seeds in garden centres and plan your vegetable garden and cut flower plot.

After all that hard work, a visit to some spring gardens open to the public is a great way to get inspiration and indulge in tea and



# Voting Safely at This Year's Elections

Residents in Mansfield will go to the polls on Thursday May 6, 2021 to have their say in elections for Nottinghamshire County Council and for the county's Police and Crime Commissioner.

While the elections are some time away, Mansfield District Council is already making plans to help people stay safe while casting your votes.

There are a number of ways to vote in these elections: at a polling station in person; by appointing someone you trust to vote in person on your behalf at a polling station, which is known as a proxy vote; or by post.

Hayley Barsby, Returning Officer for Mansfield District Council, said:

"The elections are very important, they're an opportunity to make your voice heard and have a say on who represents you on issues that directly affect day-to-day life in this district.

"We're thinking about these elections now, so that however you choose to cast your vote in May, you can do so safely.

"We're putting arrangements in place to help you stay safe at the polling station; you can expect many of the measures you've become used to in shops and banks over recent months, such as hand sanitiser, social distancing signs and face masks. But you also have the option to apply to vote by post or by proxy."

Ailsa Irvine, Director of Electoral Administration and Guidance at the Electoral Commission said:

"The choice on how to vote at this May's elections is yours – you can have your say in person, by post or by proxy.

"If you're thinking about voting by post, you can apply now. This will make sure your application is processed early, and your postal vote can be sent to you more quickly. It's easy to apply and you can find out how by visiting the Electoral Commission website."

Everyone eligible to vote must be registered first. The easiest way to register is online at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote.

Residents can visit the Elections 2021 page on the website at https://www.mansfield.gov.uk/elections/ to find out more about the elections on 6 May 2021. The page will be updated with new information as it becomes available.

## Go with the flow!

Rapid testing for people without symptoms.

Around 1 in 3 people with COVID-19 don't have any symptoms, but can still pass it on.

That's why we are offering regular testing to people in Mansfield district.

## **Community testing**

Rapid COVID-19 testing (lateral flow testing) is now available for people without symptoms who live or work in Mansfield.

1 in 3 people with COVID-19 don't have symptoms, but can still pass it on. That is why it is important you should get a test regulary, ideally twice weekly.

The test is quick, safe and accurate. It takes around 30 minutes to receive your results and you don't need to book a test. It is important that you continue to have weekly tests to help stop the spread of COVID-19 in Mansfield.

This is only a test for people who do not have COVID-19 symptoms and if you have a new continuous cough, a temperature or notice a change in your sense of smell or taste, you must self-isolate and book a test through the NHS 119 service.

At the community test centre you will be given a kit so that you can take swabs from your throat and nose. These will be tested for the presence or absence of coronavirus.

There are two community testing centres in Mansfield as shown below. Please use the one nearest to where you live or work. Please take a smart phone and face covering with you but no unneeded items such as bags. Under 16s must be accompanied by an adult.

As part of our campaign to reduce plastic waste and littering we held a poster competition at the end of last year which aimed to encourage children to learn how plastic pollution is affecting our world.

The competition was open to all schoolchildren in the Warsop District, Edwinstowe and Ollerton areas and the winning posters are pictured right.

### **REDUCING EMISSIONS**

## How well are we doing in Mansfield and Warsop?

Skye's poster hits the nail on the head – we all can make a difference if we take action now. As the UK prepares to host the COP26 Climate Summit in November this year, we thought it would be interesting to see just how much of a difference Mansfield and Warsop local authority area has been making in reducing our carbon emissions – a good starting point to find out how we can all do more to help.

Researchers at the Tyndall Centre, probably the UK's leading centre of climate change expertise, have published a detailed carbon report for every local authority. Friends of the Earth have analysed the details (updated in December 2020), and compared progress so far with what needs to be achieved by 2030 in order to meet our targets to try to stop rising global temperatures. Our area seems to be making some progress but, sadly, still has a long way to go. Have a look:

### **GREENHOUSE GAS**

## (ghg) Emissions in Mansfield and Warsop

Housing 49% Transport 25% Industrial/Commercial 26%

Overall, Mansfield and Warsop needs to reduce its emissions by at least 14% per year to contribute towards reaching national targets.

#### **HOUSING**

In our area, only 38% of homes are well insulated, which indicates "an avoidable waste of energy, high ghg emissions and high energy bills". We need to switch away from gas central heating to "eco-heating" such as heat pumps which run on renewable electricity, to reduce ghg emissions from gas, and to help us do this, grants are available from the government when installing ecoheating systems.

The report points out that the UK needs to fit around 1 million eco heating systems per year and that a fair share for our area would mean fitting 1,913 eco-heating systems every year.

Number of government funded eco-heating systems in Mansfield and Warsop - 129.

#### **TRANSPORT**

Transport is the biggest source of ghg emissions nationally. Research suggests, to deliver the reduced emissions needed, car mileage will need to drop by as much as 60%. The Climate Change Committee (CCC) has recommended total mileage per car driver should fall by at least 17% and that 34% would be achievable. To achieve this, more people need to use other methods of transport, and continue working from home where possible as we have done during the pandemic.

Figures for the best performing similar local authority areas show the number of people choosing to use public transport is 22%, cycle 12% and walk 18%.

In Mansfield and Warsop, people using public transport is 7%, cycle 1% and walk 10%.

#### **ENERGY**

In order for the UK to move away from climate-wrecking oil and gas and provide the energy we need from renewable sources, up to 7 times more renewable electricity may need to be produced, to include for our transport and heating. It is planned that much of the additional renewable energy will come from offshore wind, but there's also a need to significantly increase onshore wind/solar power and explore other renewable energy sources.

The Tyndall report indicates that best similar local authority areas produce 166,129 MWh of renewable energy per year.

Mansfield and Warsop produce 53,986 MWh.

#### TREES

Trees are very important to us because as well as acting as carbon sinks, taking up carbon dioxide from the atmosphere and storing it, trees also play an important role in public health – they clean up air pollution, reduce flood risk and, of course, they provide a home for nature. Recommended targets are to double tree cover across the UK by 2050, and local authorities should aim to establish much more urban green space including planting more urban trees.

Data provided to Friends of the Earth by aerial survey company Bluesky International Ltd suggests:

Tree cover in Mansfield and Warsop area is only 10 - 20%.

#### WASTI

Every product that is made for us to buy, use and throw away, contributes towards climate breakdown. A huge step towards cutting ghg's is to reduce the amount of "stuff" we acquire and, once we have finished with it, we should, as Skye suggests in her poster, reuse, recycle or compost as much as possible. The best similar local authorities reuse, recycle or compost 69% of household waste. The target is 100% (zero waste) by 2030.

Mansfield and Warsop reuses, recycles and composts just 33% of its household waste.

#### **TAKE ACTION**

So in every sector mentioned above, there are lots of actions we can all start to take, from planting more trees, driving less, using less plastic, walking more, or simply reducing our consumption. Our future articles will include more suggestions on small actions we can take that can make a big difference.

Our local authorities can help, too, by producing their own Climate Action Plans and ensuring climate change mitigation is at the heart of every decision.

As our young poster competition winners have shown us, they know what needs to be done – it is up to all adults to get started and help create a better world for them to inherit.

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



"I hope that this short story competition encourages the participants and those who read their stories to engage more with their creative side and carry on writing."



# Warsop Author Publishing Success


We are excited to announce a debut novel by Warsopian, Steve Pickering which has recently been published by New Generation Publishing.

The book is about a boy who is kidnapped by press-gangs in Victorian England and imprisoned on a Man o' war ship. After years of slaving on the ship, where he witnesses torture and killings, he incites a mutiny. Escaping into the Americas he has to adapt to another brutal way of life.

Notts Lit have short listed it as one of the best books with a Nottinghamshire connection of 2020, saying 'never predictable, this debut novel is a good old fashioned adventure story.'

Steve has always been fascinated by stories of pirates and the wild-west and was influenced from an early age by many famous writers including Sir Arthur Conan Doyle and his creation of Sherlock Holmes and Ian Fleming's James Bond. Steve didn't write as a profession, until he retired.





Steve was born in 1947 and was educated at Birklands Secondary Modern School for Boys. He went onto become an electrician and later a British Telecom engineer. Recently Steve moved to Lincolnshire with his wife to be closer to family, although he does miss Warsop. He continues to write and develop new material usually early in a morning as he is a light sleeper. When asked of his writing routine he said 'Some authors write a number of plots and several descriptions of characters before processing their story. In my case I just started writing. As weeks go by different ideas come to mind and the script accumulates. Over the months time is spent polishing the story and making sure all the time dates are correct.'

Steve's family are extremely proud of his achievement and were very excited when the book was published. His two sons and daughter, and all seven grandchildren along with his four sisters have each received a first edition signed copy of the book and have enjoyed the novel immensely, which he feels shows that Adventure Westerns are not just for men.

Steve would encourage others that are interested in writing to give it a go. He suggests that it is important to write about something that you have some knowledge of or that you are passionate about, but that you should always be prepared to undertake research for your book.

# From Connie's Column to Publishing Poetry

Local writer Connie May Searson always had ambitions to become a writer, from the moment she was gifted a note pad aged eight, which she filled with her writings and named Connie's big book of small stories.

Connie continued to write throughout her teenage years and you may remember reading Connie's Column in The Warsop and District News in the past. Living in a pub has provided Connie with lots of inspiration as she has met many different people, and she credits Warsop and particularly The Carrs as having a huge influence on her writing.



It was, whilst studying towards a BA in Film and Television at Sheffield Hallam University, where a tutor advised Connie that her film scripts were poetic, and as a result she began to read poetry and fell in love with it. Connie went onto further her studies but this time she focused on poetry as she studied towards an MA in Creative Writing. It was through that course that she began to see poetry in everything and she realised that she needed to put her life into her work and that her work was her life.

Connie has since gone on to self publish two poetry books. The first entitled One Year of Me was published in 2018 and it is a set of poems which present a year in the life of the central character but told through the depiction of the four seasons. Connie reflects on this book as being the one which cemented her love of writing but she felt that it wasn't until the second book that she really discovered her style of writing and her true voice.

The second book was published in 2020 and it is something Connie feels very proud of. Named The Stars That Make Us this book contains Connie's own illustrations and designs, and is written in a font specifically designed for her also. It tells the life of a girl who is trying to figure out who she is. It takes the reader through her experiences of discovering herself and coming to terms with who she is, realising that she is at the centre of her own universe. Some of this book was written during the pandemic and some of that year is reflected in the book.

Connie enjoyed having full control over her work from its content to its design, which is why she decided to open her own Etsy shop to distribute and market her books. She also has ambitions to design her own home ware which will feature her poetry on it. The Etsy shop has allowed her to connect with the people who have bought her work and so far she has received some wonderful reviews including inspiring others to write. Connie's books have been sold to customers in Japan, Madagascar, Germany, USA and beyond.

Writing is a therapy for Connie and she would like to encourage others to pick up a pen. Her advice is to write for you and to never stop. Building a reputation as a writer takes time as does developing your craft, but for some people you may not ever want to share your work with others and that is okay too.



## **Council Budget Approved**

## **Mansfield District Council has agreed its annual** budget and medium term financial strategy.



The 2021/22 budget, approved by councillors at Full Council on Wednesday 27 January, is designed to help the council deliver its future ambitions under the priority areas of Aspiration, Growth, Wellbeing and Place.

A total of £830,000 in savings have been made out of a net budget requirement of £10.6m in order to balance the budget at a time of increased demand on services, combined with a significant reduction in income due to the coronavirus pandemic.

Additional one-off government grants have helped to balance the budget, along with savings from a reduction in the number of printed issues of the council magazine My Mansfield, a reduction in Cabinet members and a 2.7% increase in Council Tax.

The increase means those living in Band A properties will pay a total of £129.81 - just 35p a day for all the services provided by Mansfield District Council.

The council's share of the Council Tax bill is about 10% with the remaining 90% that residents pay going to Nottinghamshire County Council and other county services, such as the police and fire service.

Executive Mayor Andy Abrahams said: "It is never an easy decision to raise Council Tax but this 2.7% increase will bring in an extra £167,000 to help maintain vital council services in the district.

"For the vast majority of our residents, who live in Band A properties, it means they will pay an extra £3.33 for the whole year, equivalent to just over 6p each week."

Despite funding constraints, the council is committed to starting work on 99 affordable and council homes in the next year, as part of a five-year aspirational target to build more than 200 new council homes in the district by 2023.

The Mayor said: "As well providing much needed affordable homes, the construction of them will help to stimulate the economy at this very difficult time, supporting local businesses and providing work and training opportunities for local people.

"These homes will be eco-friendly and built to a high quality to future-proof them for new environmental housing standards to be brought in the years ahead."

Among the items approved by the Full Council were some increases

in fees and charges, mostly in line with inflation.

There was also a 1.7% increase in council home rents, in line with Government guidelines. Any income from council rent goes towards improving and building council housing within the district.

Cllr Craig Whitby, Portfolio Holder for Corporate and Finance, said: "We have tried to spread the burden of balancing the budget by making small charges such as some targeted increases in some fees

"There will also be a reduction in the number of printed editions of My Mansfield residents' magazine from three to two a year.

Although Mansfield District Council collects Council Tax, it does so on behalf of Nottinghamshire County Council, Nottinghamshire Police and Crime Commissioner, Notts Fire and Rescue Authority (and Warsop Parish Council if you live in Warsop).

The total Council Tax bill will be confirmed on 9 March once all the elements are known.

Only 10p in every £1 paid by Mansfield residents comes to the district council; 90p goes to the county council and other

The Mansfield District Council share of the bill, provides residents with a wide range of vital services. They include:

- Emptying 10,000 bins daily
- · Recycling and composting 13,200 tonnes of waste each year
- Sweeping 2,500 tonnes of rubbish from 579 miles of streets
- Clearing 1,847 incidents of fly-tipping, at a cost of about £103,000.
- Managing and maintaining 150 parks and open spaces, covering 300 hectares
- Preventing people from becoming homeless and working with partner organisations to provide accommodation and specialist support for those living on the streets.
- · Leisure centres.
- Providing Neighbourhood Wardens and a 24/7 CCTV scheme to keep the district safe.

Thynghowe and the forgotten heritage of Sherwood

# **Covid Cancels Thynghowe 2021 Events**

## Sadly none of our events celebrating the heritage of Birklands forest have taken place during the past twelve months due to Covid19.

However, we managed to take part in one (suitably distanced) work session clearing rhododendron plants from the banks of the Black Pool. After several years of sawing and lopping, the edges of this valuable habitat are clear for the first time in a while. This pool is the only water source in this part of the woodlands and is important for many wildlife species.

During the drought periods in recent years the pool has dried up for the first time that I am aware of. Black Pool is located close to the spot where the Russian Log Cabin was located and may have been part of the ornamental landscape created by the Dukes of Portland. The introduction of invasive rhododendron plants into this area is probably part of the duke's planting plans.

Even though all organised events are suspended you can still enjoy walking through the forest on your own.

Forestry thinning operations have been taking place in the area of woodlands to the north of Hanger Hill. There should be minimal disruption to public paths but please respect any warning signs.

One benefit of this work has been the improvement of the road surface close to Budby Pumping Station. As usual, the Friends of Thynghowe were consulted by Forestry England ahead of these operations to ensure that any archaeologically sensitive area are protected by exclusion zones and restricted access routes.

## Delivery of New Bins is 'Wheelie' Good News!

# Residents across Mansfield district will start receiving their recycling bins for glass from Monday 1 February.

The wheelie bins will be delivered in batches from now until the end of March ahead of the kerbside glass recycling collections starting in April.

This will allow residents to start saving their clean, empty glass jars and bottles for recycling instead of putting them in their green household waste bin.

All colours of glass bottles and jars that have had lids removed, can be put in the bin, which is black with a teal coloured lid. Other types of glass such as pyrex, mirrors, light bulbs and drinking glasses can't go in the bin.

Executive Mayor Andy Abrahams said:

"The arrival of the bins is a really exciting step towards our free kerbside glass recycling collections starting in spring.

"The scheme will be better for the environment, increase the amount we recycle, and reduce the amount of glass going to landfill or for incineration. We also hope it will reduce the contamination of recyclable materials in existing blue bins.

"It is a key part of the council's agenda to be a cleaner, greener and more welcoming district and this is a major step towards achieving this goal. Thank you to Cllr Andy Burgin, Portfolio Holder for Environment, for his involvement in bringing the project to fruition after many years of discussions."

A personalised calendar showing when glass bins will be emptied will arrive at homes with Council Tax letters in mid-March. You can also check all your bin days online and sign up for free bin day email reminders at www.mansfield.gov.uk/bins.

Some homes such as flats and complexes will receive communal bins rather than individual bins. Where bins cannot be provided due to a lack of space, residents can continue using privately-owned bottle banks across the district. In addition, the council is working to provide its own bottle banks in suitable locations to make it as easy as possible for the affected households to recycle glass.

People who live in these properties will receive separate information with their Council Tax letters.

Residents are advised to take their bins in off the footpath as soon as possible after they are delivered and put their house number on the bin.

Residents who haven't already opted out of receiving a bin but no longer want one, are asked to wait until their bin arrives before contacting the council by emailing: mdc@mansfield.gov.uk.

The council aims to collect the unwanted bins within 10 working days.

# WARSOP Footpath & Countryside Group

A positive aspect of the periods of Covid restrictions and lockdowns has been the increased number of people enjoying winter walks around Warsop's countryside.

Once away from the more popular paths close to the villages it is easy to remain distanced from other walkers Avoiding mud after wet weather is not always as easy but several routes tend to be drier. One of these is the path from Stonebridge Lane to Warsop Vale and then on to Shirebrook Station via the restored pit site and the former colliery railway line. You may then walk around the woodlands of Shirebrook Wood on the former Shirebrook pit tip. Another good winter route follows the Upper Cross Lane from the top of Cherry Grove. This allows a longer walk by following the path past the sewage works towards Budby and into the forest





By now there should be many of signs of spring in the countryside. In open areas in woodlands look out for yellow flowers of Lesser Celandine, the blue of Violets and the white of Wood Anemone. Hawthorn leaf buds will soon be bursting. In late April the first Bluebells and Early Purple Orchids should be flowering. Birds will be nesting and once the weather warms up Peacock, Brimstone and Small Tortoiseshell butterflies should be around.

If you have a garden pond, frogs may have already mated and produced spawn. Last autumn I dug up a small patch of the grass in my garden and sowed a wildflower and grass mix. I am now looking forward to seeing which flowers have germinated and whether insects are attracted by them once they bloom. Early spring is also a good time for sowing a wildflower meadow provided you water it in dry weather.

Despite lockdowns and Coronavirus restrictions we have managed to hold a few work sessions over the winter months. We cut the grass on the Rhein o'Thorns SSSI, we completed hedge and path work on the Church Warsop Doorstep Green, and we cleared vegetation from the sides of paths on the Warsop Vale pit site. Some other tasks have been completed by individual members of the group as part of their daily exercise regime.

The Footpaths Group's organised walks are not currently taking place due to Covid restrictions. However, if you are looking for ideas for some different walks within our local area, take a look at the Walking and Publications sections of our warsopcountryside. wordpress.com website. We are very fortunate to have so many excellent walks in our local area and there must be folk living elsewhere that are very envious of us during lockdown.



## **FURTHER COSTS**

## The Council currently have a capital fund of £15,000 in reserves for building alterations.

Town Hall - £214,000 required to fulfil the works stated within the building survey.

Service and Maintenance budgets are currently used for the Town Hall.

Buy - We are unable to estimate what the costs for maintenance and building alterations due to not having a property selected to base these calculations on.

Building alterations would be required to create a workable space to house the council and any other organisations.

We would need to concider legal fees involved in buying a property, but this can't be done until a property has been selected.

Rent - We are unable to estimate what the costs for maintenance and building alterations would be due to not having a property selected to base these calculations on.

Building alterations would be required to create a workable space to house the council and any other organisations, and an amount to convert it back once property is no longer required.

Cost to hire space for council meetings.

Home Working - There would be no costs for maintenance or building alterations.

Cost to hire space for council meetings.

#### **Budget information**

All costs are estimated using the rateable value square footage on each property, the costs are purely projections and cannot be guaranteed.

Town Hall - Rateable value 21'500 / Payroll based on 2 office staff and 1 cleaner (receptionist may be required moving forward).

**Buy** - Based on recent market value of town centre shop /Rateable value 6'660 / Payroll based on 2 office staff and 1 cleaner (receptionist may be required moving forward) / Loan repayment based on £100k over 10 years at 2.224% interest.

Rent - Based on town centre shop / Rateable value 3350 / Payroll based on 2 office staff (a smaller space will be kept clean by staff).

Home Working - Reduction will arise in the insurance budget as there will be no building to insure.

## **Comparing Financial Information for Alternative Working**

#### **OPTION 1**

#### Keep the Town Hall

(figures are based on 2021-2022 budget) 2020-2021 would not give a true representation because of the effects of Covid.)

**EXPENDITURE:** £124.168 £124,835 INCOME: DISPOSABLE INCOME: Plus £667 IMPLICATIONS:

As per the council's financial regulations a business plan would need to be presented and keeping the town hall would need to be proven to be a viable

The Parish Council would remain based locally and offer face to face interaction with the Clerk and assistant Clerk. Monthly meeting will continue to be held within the council chambers and all organisations currently based within the town hall will remain as long as they choose to continue hiring their space and as long as the parish council are the lease holders of the building.

However, if the running costs continue 'as is' the council will continue to have limited disposable income. Some things to consider...

- Does the town hall require a receptionist?
- Will all rental income remain? in the past year, the council have lost the hire of one room and have reduced the cost of the police room hire.
- Will funding opportunities arise? When Covid settles, lottery and heritage funding would reopen eventually. If the Town Hall met any new criteria the Town Hall staff could work with local bid writers to try and secure funding.

#### **OPTION 2**

IMPLICATIONS:

#### **Buying a property**

(Calculations based on recent sale cost and rateable space - town centre shop.)

**EXPENDITURE:** £111.885 INCOME: £115,435 DISPOSABLE INCOME: Plus £3,550

The Parish council would hand the Town hall back to the district council, not knowing what they will do with it. Buying a new property will see Parish Council continue to be readily available within the centre of the parish & offer a walk in service to ensure communication with the Parish Clerk and Assistant Clerk – the space could also offer office space for 2 organisations from the town hall and the space to continue to run Housing surgeries with agreement

The council's monthly meetings could be held in community halls located around the parish to give more opportunity for residents from individual areas to attend and ask questions directly to the council/councillors. The people of the parish will be encouraged to say what they would like to see moving forward & any money saved would be used to benefit the community. Some things to consider...

(based on recent rent costs and rateable space – town centre shop)

**EXPENDITURE:** £95,129 INCOME: £113,335 DISPOSABLE INCOME: Plus £18,206 IMPLICATIONS:

Parish Council can continue to be readily available within the centre of the parish & offer a walk in service to ensure communication with the Parish Clerk and Assistant Clerk – the space could also offer 1 more office to continue to run housing surgeries with agreement from MDC and a CAB drop in.

The council's monthly meetings could be held in community halls located around the Parish to give more opportunity for residents from the individual areas to attend and ask questions directly to the council/councillors.

The people of the parish will be encouraged to say what they would like to see moving forward & any money saved would be used to benefit the community. Some things to consider...

- Will a suitable property be available within the town centre & how much will it cost to adapt it to work for the Parish Council?
- Will any other organisation want to move with the Parish Council & if so, which organisations will have priority?
- Will services continue after Covid the parish council will continue to secure funds to provide C.A.B but will the district council continue the housing surgery?
- Are there suitable community halls or rentable spaces around the parish - to host monthly council meetings?
- Do our residents prefer Town centre shops to be saved for retail?

#### **OPTION 4**

#### Working from home

**EXPENDITURE:** £73,969 INCOME: £111.235 DISPOSABLE INCOME: Plus £37,266 **IMPLICATIONS:** 

The Parish council staff can work from home offering a weekly/ monthly outreach pop up session within community halls/areas around the parish - where residents will be invited to meet with staff/councillors, ask questions & be directed to relevant district/ county council departments where necessary.

These sessions can be used to reach all areas of the Parish and the staff can utilise this time to connect with the people directly on what they want to see moving forward and on what improvements are a priority to them, the outcomes will be re-laid to council.

The extra disposable income will allow the council to discuss the people's views and priorities spending effectively. The council can continue funding the CAB drop in and locate space to offer this and the district council will be encouraged to offer the housing surgery at an alternative location also. The council will work hard to maintain a police presence in the Parish. This could mean subsiding/negotiating an office space to enable a police base. This would need further exploration and would reduce our disposable income. The council's monthly meetings could be held in community halls located around the Parish to give more opportunity for residents from the individual areas to attend and ask questions directly to the council/councillors. Some things to consider.

- Limited face to face interaction with the PC staff, so residents will rely heavily on email and telephone communication.
- Are there suitable places to host meetings and outreach sessions around the parish?
- What will happen to the Town hall organisations if they cannot relocate?
- Is the same amount of staff hours required?
- Could the council reduce the precept or use the extra money on other things?

#### **OPTION 5**

#### Friends of the Town Hall community group

**EXPENDITURE:** Budgets will be subject to the group's vision. **IMPLICATIONS:** 

Funding options for Parish councils are limited, however, community groups do see more funding opportunities – a community group could come forward to take over the town hall (subject to the District Council allowing an exchange of lease). This will be a huge project for a community group and we must stress that the building survey specifies works are required within 5 years. A fully costed plan would be needed from the group to demonstrate viability.

The group could seek funding for the works and the current organisations could stay within the building subject to them wanting to, and, to them agreeing a new room hire contract with the community group.
The parish council could then become a tenant in the Town hall (subject to the cost of room hire).

Both the Parish council and the residents of the parish would be released of the financial commitments of the town hall. The community group will be eligible to apply for a share of the budgeted £8000 section 137 fund - providing they meet the Parish council's funding criteria and provide community value. Some things to consider...

- Is this a great way to keep the Town hall and all the organisations within?
- Will anybody want to take on the responsibility?
- Can a viable business plan be made given the current funding restrictions?
- Could the council reduce the precept or use the extra money on other things?
