Business of the Year

Local Warsop Parish business wins 'Mansfield Business of the Year' at the Chad Business Excellence Awards.

Brianne and Jon Pritchard started their family run zero-waste shop, providing refills of household products, food sold by weight and plastic-free alternatives to everyday items in November 2020.

Their business originally started at home, in their living room in summer 2019 with 25 products in their range.

In November 2020, Brianne and Jon made the decision to open a shop on High Street, Warsop while in the middle of a global pandemic.

A few weeks before their one-year anniversary of opening the shop, they were nominated and finalists in 3 categories, New Business of the Year, Small Business of the Year and the award they won, Mansfield Business of the Year.

At present they have around 500 products and will be moving premises at the beginning of April 2022. The good news is they will only be moving further up the street to 28 High Street. They also sell products that are handmade by small business from around the UK.

In such a small space of time, Mansfield Refillery has become a big success and a real benefit to the Parish. This can only continue if the people of Warsop Parish support them and all other businesses by shopping locally.

Tony's Giving Back



Market Warsop Resident, Tony Hubbard, plans to raise funds for the Welcome Centre at Kings Mill Hospital to help give more comfort to patient fighting cancer.

Tony has been instrumental in completing phase 1 of Swallows Green immediately prior to undergoing surgery for bowel cancer and then contracting Covid afterwards with a stay in ITU.

Tony is now receiving chemotherapy and whilst in the Welcome Centre at Kings Mill he became aware of the disrepair of some of the relaxing chairs that people use while receiving their chemo.

Some people can be sat in these chairs all day, some have lost weight, in discomfort, exhausted, so a comfortable chair is not only needed it's essential. Tony is therefore proposing to walk the distance of 3 marathons around the pathway on Swallows Green. He's hoping to do 1 a day, but is aware he won't be as strong after finishing his chemo.

Tony commented:

"I've been on the receiving end of generosity from loads of amazing people recently, and it's taken huge amounts of pressure off me and my family! But now I feel like I need to give something back, and I want to raise some money for the Welcome Treatment Centre (chemo ward) at Kings Mill Hospital. The people there are amazing and do all they can to make patients comfy, but some of the chairs don't work properly, don't recline easily, and are just old. Some new chairs have been ordered and are around £2500 each, and I would just like to help them with those costs, and also with purchasing other equipment that ensures patient comfort."

GARDENING UPDATE

Top tips to help you get the best from your spring garden and prepare for the coming season.

After being cooped up all winter most of us can't wait to get outside and start pottering in the garden. With spring bulbs flowering, days lengthening and lambs in the fields, it's time to get out and prepare for the glorious summer ahead. There are lots of little jobs to keep us busy, even if the weather isn't brilliant, says Angela Slater from Hayes Garden World.



The flower garden:

This is the time woodland gardens come into their own so if you have an area under deciduous trees or shrubs, why not inject ground colour with hellebores, primroses, winter aconites

Mulching herbaceous beds can save a lot of time and water by cutting down on the backbreaking job of weeding and watering. Spread a thick layer of coco bark mulch, home-made compost or well-rotted leaf mould to a thickness of about 3 inches. Don't do this if the ground is still frozen.

If you forgot to plant spring bulbs in autumn, there are plenty of pot grown species available in garden centres to inject some instant colour into borders and containers.

Summer flowering bulbs are also in garden centres so pot them up in good quality, peat-free compost and place in cool, bright, frost-free areas. Sink the pots in the border once the weather gets warmer and you know where you have gaps.

Set dahlia tubers in travs of damp compost to shoot, then cut off when about four inches long and place three round the edge of a six inch pot to grow on.

Small herbaceous perennials become available in garden centres now so buy while they are better value; later in the season they will be larger and more expensive. Either plant in the garden if the soil has warmed up sufficiently or pot on in larger pots.

Lots of bedding plants are available now so brighten up your spring pots and hanging baskets.

Sow sweet pea seed and leave somewhere bright and frost-free; use dedicated sweet pea modules or the cardboard middle out of

If you have gaps in the herbaceous border and are lacking some colour, camellias, azaleas and rhododendrons are all early bloomers. They need an acid soil: if you garden with alkaline soil, grow them in containers using ericaceous compost.

The vegetable garden:

Set potatoes to chit and sow First Earlies about the end of March, weather permitting. Sow chilli seeds and place in a heated propagator; they need as long a growing season as possible.

Dig over the veg plot ready to start planting as soon as the soil warms; place fleece tunnels over the soil to warm it faster.

Rake out any moss and scatter some seed mixed with seed compost if there are any bald patches. If the grass has started to grow, give it a light trim with the mower set on the highest setting. Give an all-in-one weed, feed and moss killer.

Start giving houseplants more water and a weak feed. Sow salad leaves and micro herbs in trays of seed compost and place on a warm, bright windowsill.

Bring some colour into the home with planted containers of spring bulbs and azaleas. Position them somewhere cool and light and keep just damp: too warm and they will quickly go over.

Odd jobs:

If you didn't do so in autumn, scrub out the greenhouse with a solution of Jeyes fluid or bleach, paying particular attention to the glass frames where over-wintering bugs hide. Clean the glass and leave the door open to dry thoroughly. Scrub greenhouse staging, pots and seed trays.

Peruse the seeds in garden centres and plan your vegetable garden and cut flower plot. After all that hard work, a visit to some spring gardens open to the public is a great way to get inspiration and indulge in tea and scones.


Here's hoping for a blooming lovely Spring!

Has anyone spotted any of our spring bulbs peeping through? They should have bloomed under the trees at the top of High Street car park, in the High Street flower bed and scattered around the Swallows Green, providing early food for wildlife and pollinators.

Hopefully, if you picked up one of our free packs of wildflower seeds last year, you may be watching as they start to poke their way into the world – seeds are still available from Allotment Box on Church Street, and Mansfield Refillery on High Street.

Why do we give away native wildflower seeds? Every new native plant helps our declining wildlife with food and habitat plus absorbs a little CO2 out of the atmosphere. Reforesting and replanting, "greening" our environment, is so important, as we watch the effects of rising CO2 levels wreak havoc on our weather systems – 2022 started with unprecedented warm temperatures on New Year's Eve and Day, amidst yet another surge in covid cases. Scientists warned us over 40 years ago and we are now seeing the effects – more frequent weather extremes as air and oceans warm up, putting more water vapour into the atmosphere, and melting polar ice impacting Earth systems.

We are truly living the consequences of our actions! But anyone who has watched "Don't Look Up" on Netflix has a good idea of the reception the scientists have received from our world leaders!



Forty years ago, we could have stopped global warming. Now we are watching it affect both human civilisation and the natural world, and scientists tell us we only have a few years left (some say by 2025) to radically reduce our emissions if we want to stay below 1.5C – as usual, world leaders are slow to take heed, with COP26 resulting in little immediate action by the biggest fossil fuel polluting countries, even though current emissions put us on course for a 3C+ world, not survivable by many species. Many of their targets, 2050 to 2070, are simply too little, too late.

So what can we do about it, here, in our own community?

People often want to do something but don't know where to start, so we've put some info together on how to reduce emissions and help our declining biodiversity - plus we post many green lifestyle suggestions on our Facebook page – why not join us there?

What is our carbon footprint?

Did you know that around 46% of the UK's total carbon footprint is from the consumer goods we buy, usually shipped in from abroad? (WWF study)

But the UK government don't include that when they say our greenhouse gas (ghg) emissions are falling. We are actually the highest net importer (per head) in the G7 (ONS figures) yet these emissions are not included in our Net Zero targets either. Instead, manufacturing countries like China get blamed for having high emissions - producing the goods that WE want!

And don't forget, Net Zero isn't zero. Net Zero means taking into account some ghg-emitting essential processes that can't be reduced easily, like steel making and concrete, which accounts for around 20% of current emissions. These need to be compensated for by reducing emissions everywhere else (not just planting a few trees and carrying on as normal as some firms do), and by developing technology to take CO2 out of the air (negative emissions) – in its infancy and problematic to scale up, yet the only way we might stay below 1.5C.

So, where does that leave us? Basically, we can't get away from needing to cut emissions, urgently and radically. Taking into account all sources, including in the goods we buy, the UK citizen's annual average carbon footprint per person is around

13 tonnes (CO2e)

What should our annual carbon footprint be for a healthy planet?

A lot of research has been done to find how much we need to cut personal emissions to keep below 1.5C of warming, and be fair to every human across the planet. From our present 13 tonne average, one recent international report suggests living at Net Zero means we need to aim for:

2.5 tonnes by 2030 1.4 tonnes by 2040 0.7 tonnes by 2050

So no room for billionaire lifestyles!

To get anywhere near these targets by 2030, governments and businesses need to take urgent action to put in place low carbon infrastructure, products and services to enable us to live a net zero lifestyle, and for the public to look closely at how we can trim our emissions.

How can we reduce emissions effectively?

One expert suggests trying to reduce emissions by 10% each year until we reach a sustainable level for the planet

Nutrition, housing and mobility account for around 75% of lifestyle emissions, with hotspots being meat and dairy consumption, fossil fuel energy, car use and cite to the consumption.

Here are the actions we have found would make a big difference to our carbon footprint:

Reduce meat and dairy and eat more veggies.
 Plant-based diets are healthier for person and
 planet, would free up lots of land for rewilding/
 reforestation (helping take CO2 out of the air) plus
 reduce pollution and decline of biodiversity. UN
 calculates a global plant-based diet could cut 8
 billion tonnes CO2 per year by 2050.

- Reduce our demand for consumables. Wherever goods are made, they pollute globally, so only buy essentials, and buy low carbon, long lasting, highly energy efficient and recyclable, or opt for second hand/refurbished or repair existing product.
- Buy local, seasonal vegetables. Cut down global transport and support local farms and shops strong community increases resilience to climate change. Buy organic where possible to protect wildlife.

- Reduce food waste. WWF found a third of all food produced globally is wasted! Food production emits ghg's; food in landfill emits methane.
- Reduce plastic use. Plastic causes emissions at every stage, including recycling; is sourced from fossil fuels and only 9% of all plastic ever made has been recycled. Toxic plastics are polluting ecosystems around the globe yet production is rising! Please reject single use plastics, find plasticfree alternatives, use refilleries, recycle, or dispose responsibly.

Reduce car journeys. Transport is our highest emitting sector in the UK –could we live closer to work places, car share, use public transport, walk or cycle whenever possible? Bear in mind electric vehicles run emissions free only if charged with 100% renewable energy, create emission in making

them and getting the raw materials to replace all vehicles could be planet destructive in itself!



- Reduce flying. Global aviation can have a big impact on personal carbon footprints – one long haul flight from London to New York emits 1 tonne of CO2 per person!
- Switch to green energy providers and install renewables. Gas heating and cooking is the biggest source of residential emissions, so could we switch to green energy providers to drive investment in renewables, improve home insulation levels to reduce usage, consider switching to electric heat pumps, or install solar/wind generators? All make a big difference.
- Plant more trees and help protect existing mature woodlands. The level of reforestation needed for effective CO2 reduction is huge and problematic; every native tree planted in the right place helps! But protecting existing mature forests from the developer's axe is imperative they already store huge amounts of CO2 in their trunks, roots and surrounding soil systems and continue to remove CO2, plus provide habitat for hundreds of species. So please help protect existing trees; plant more native trees and pollinator-friendly flowers; campaign to reduce deforestation, and cut chemical use it kills friendly wildlife too!

Global temperatures are now 1.2C higher than pre industrial, and rising. Please help us build a safer, greener, blooming future!



It is fantastic that The Friends of Warsop Vale was able to put on limited events last year. Together we have had several benches installed on the open spaces around the village and we are now planning for this year's events. The Friends of The Carrs have continued delivering projects to improve our much loved park, the commitment they always show is truly inspiring. I look forward to continuing to work with both of these groups. Although we face some huge challenges just to get any kind of engagement with Meadfleet, it has been great to


Operation Reacher comes to Sherwood



A massive thank you to The Lee Bonsall Memorial Fund, as new defibrillators are now accessible across Warsop Parish.

Lee's parents, Karen and Ken Bonsall have supported several charities alleviating mental health struggles, poverty and homelessness amongst veterans and service personnel over the last decade.

The Memorial Fund, set up in July of 2012, serves to honour the life and memory of Pte. Lee Bonsall. Lee was a young local soldier who tragically died back in 2012 after battling PTSD, in the aftermath of his service out in Afghanistan.

Three new defibrillators are now out in the local community ready for use.

The defibrillators are in the following locations:

- The Oaklands Centre (NG20 0JE)
- Warsop Parish Centre (NG20 0SN)
- Woodlands Care Home, Spion Kop (NG20 0FN)

If you ring 999 during an emergency and a defibrillator is required, you will be provided with your nearest location and a code to remove the equipment from the box.

As the archaeology comes to a close we investigate the finds, celebrate our past and look to the future.

At the start of the project, we knew that Warsop Old Hall was a unique building as it is one of the best-preserved examples of a building of its type in Nottinghamshire, so far – the findings affirm its uniqueness.



We have successfully carried out on-site excavations and been able to support local residents and visitors to the area to gain a greater understanding of archaeology and how it helps us piece together our local history and landscape.

For example, the building survey has highlighted some of the changes to the Old Hall during its time. The report unearthed the raising of the roof on several occasions, extensions to the Tudor Barn, and the re-use of the medieval window and door frames as interior decoration. The geophysics survey and excavations highlighted various walls on different alignments, potentially predating the Old Hall. These could be the foundation of the Dovecote.

The finds from the excavations were all carefully washed enabling us to identify several pieces of pottery including post-medieval, medieval, and a couple of pieces of Saxon pottery.

We are celebrating this amazing project in the form of a Live Museum which takes place on Saturday 19th March from 10am to 3pm.

Much merriment with have a go archery, food tasting, a falconry display, face painting and tours of the old hall. Meet characters from history with the Ferrers Household recreating a 15th Century living and the Sherwood Outlaws bringing to life Forest Law and holding a spectacular battle re-enactment at 1pm.

Finds from the excavation work will be on display and you can chat to the archaeologists and project team to learn more about Warsop Old Hall discoveries.


The event is free to all and complimentary refreshments will be available.

Council Buys Beales for New Civic Hub

Mansfield's former Beales department store building has been purchased to provide a new multi-agency civic hub as part of the Mansfield District Council's ambitious, long term town centre regeneration plans.

The scheme – "Mansfield Connect" - will be the new headquarters for the council and is expected to house a variety of other public, educational, enterprise and health and wellbeing services, alongside spaces for private sector occupiers such as food and drink outlets.

Mansfield District Council has taken the initiative and purchased the premises to enhance the bid to the Government's Levelling Up Fund (LUF) to help re-invigorate the town centre.

Mansfield Connect will form a central part of the bid and would see the council relocating from the Civic Centre, with that site being made available for redevelopment.

To date, the Department for Work and Pensions, Nottinghamshire County Council, Vision West Nottinghamshire College, Nottingham Trent University, NHS health partners, and volunteering co-ordinator the CVS have all expressed interest in being involved in the new hub.

As well as improving the delivery of public services by providing a range of agencies accessible under one roof, it is envisaged that the new hub would generate extra footfall in the town centre which would benefit existing retailers and help drive regeneration, with the hub being a catalyst to stimulate private sector investment in both the day and night time economy in the town centre.

The scheme forms part of the council's wider ambitions for the town, demonstrated by the emerging Town Centre Masterplan and broader Mansfield District Council strategies promoting Growth, Aspiration, Wellbeing and Place.

Executive Mayor Andy Abrahams said:

"We believe repurposing this redundant retail space in Mansfield town centre fulfils all the ambitions of the Government's Levelling Up Fund and by purchasing the building now, we believe this will strengthen the council's bid.

"Consolidating public services in one town centre space makes so much sense, for both the delivery of those services to our community, and the wider economic benefits for the town centre. We are doing everything within our power to satisfy the

requirements of the LUF bid criteria so we can move forward at pace when we are, hopefully, successful.

"Mansfield really needs this kind of ambitious re-imagining of its shopping streets to a mixed-use town centre if it is to build a bright future and encourage inward investment. This is a once-ina-generation opportunity to transform our town's fortunes and prospects for the better.'

The council can submit one MP-backed bid to the LUF either for an individual project or a package of measures, focusing on capital investment in local infrastructure and building on existing Local Growth Fund and Towns Fund supported programmes.

Under the first round of the LUF, local authorities could seek up to £20m of funding, with the support of the local MP, seeing funding targeted towards places with the most significant needs in terms of economic recovery, regeneration and growth and improved transport and connectivity.

Mansfield has been ranked at level one out of three by the Government, putting it amongst those areas with the greatest need.

The council has qualified for £125,000 in funding to help draw up its LUF bid and improve its chances of success in the anticipated next round of bids, an announcement about which is expected in the spring from the Department for Levelling Up Housing and Communities.

A Mansfield Connect Steering Group is guiding the project and the council has engaged project management specialists ARC Partnership to support its initial development, feasibility, costings and design options.

Additional support in building a business case for the scheme and for the LUF bid has been secured from Partnering Regeneration Development Ltd.

The work will see a close collaboration with consultants Allies & Morrison who are working with the council on the emerging Town Centre Masterplan and Severn Trent's Green Recovery Flood Resilience Project.

Stonebridge/ **Sookholme Fields Development Update**

It is with a heavy heart that I must inform you that reserved matters for the Stonebridge/ Sookholme fields development for up to 400 houses was passed on Monday 14th Feb.

In my opinion we had sound arguments put forward by Warsop residents Mrs Maureen Briggs, and Mr Roy Butler who is a Parish Councillor and lives on the Hawthorns, and from myself and Councillor Andy Burgin.

It was argued that the entrance off Sookholme lane directly opposite 6 bungalows had been directly consulted on in September and December 2021, unfortunately I've been unable to find anyone who received the consultation.

Regardless we were told MDC didn't need to consult as this point was made allowable for Officer and developer changes at the outline planning stage. No consultation with the public legitimately had to be made. This was a disappointing response when this application is the largest Warsop Parish has seen in decades.

The question about flooding onto Stonebridge Road and the dwellings was dismissed as we were told the application won't permit 1 house to be occupied until the attenuation ponds have been passed as satisfactorily draining and storing water before discharge into the River Meden. No further argument about the danger to voungsters was allowed so a buoyancy aid for 2 3 m ponds along Stonebridge Lane will exist. If the ponds fail, we'll be left with a building site.

As District Councillors as well as Parish Councillors, myself and Andy Burgin will maintain surveillance of the conditions during the build to ensure all conditions are met to the full, especially the preservation of the Hills and

WARSOP Footpath & **Countryside Group**

The appearance of the white flowers of blackthorn along our hedges is a sign of approaching spring.



These blooms appear before the leaves, unlike the hawthorn that will come into flower in several weeks after the leaf buds have burst open. This is also the month when catkins on willows are at their best.

On a warm day at this time of year you may spot one of the butterflies that has hibernated as an adult. The Peacock butterfly is one of those, spending winter in outbuildings, attics or hollow trees. The pale yellow Brimstone is another butterfly that may be seen along with the Small Tortoiseshell and the Comma.

These butterflies will rely on early blooming flowers. Dog's Mercury, Lesser Célandine, Dog Violets and Wood Anemone should be brightening our woodlands and hedgerows. The first grassland species should also be flowering, look out for Speedwell and also both Red and White Dead-Nettles that should have been blooming for a while by now. Another early source of nectar is the Dandelion so if you have any growing in your garden it may be a good idea to let them flower (but not seed!) until other flowers are blooming.

Bumblebees and ladybirds should be starting to emerge and will be seen on warmer days. Frogs will be mating around now, if you have a pond you may hear them before you see them.

The Footpaths Group volunteers have been working through our usual schedule of winter tasks. These include managing trees, hedges and wildflowers areas on The Carrs local nature reserve, trimming hedges alongside footpaths, picking up litter, and clearing brambles growing alongside paths. Timing when to do any hedge work is becoming increasingly tricky as the period between hedgerow fruits like hips, haws and sloes being eaten by birds and the start of the nest building season is becoming shorter as the climate changes.

It won't be long before we will need to start mowing grass along our footpaths. Mowing the grass along paths helps keep them accessible for the many people who enjoy walking along Warsop's excellent network of sixty public rights-of-way. These walkers help us by wearing down the grass so that it needs cutting less frequently. So get out there, explore our countryside ... and make our job easier!


