Women and Girls Offered Phone App to Keep Them Safe in Warsop

Women and girls in the Warsop area are being offered a mobile phone app which can help safeguard them by acting as a discreet panic button and body cam.

The initiative is part of a major Safer Streets scheme that has already seen new CCTV cameras installed in Warsop and focuses on helping women and girls feel safer.

Now, funding has been allocated to allow 200 residents in the Warsop area a year's free access to Hollie Guard Extra, an enhanced paid-for version of the free-to-download Hollie Guard phone app.

It gives users 24/7 access to a professional police-approved monitoring team who can send help if required.

Of the 200 funded subscriptions, 26 have already been distributed to residents, and 40 have been transferred to domestic abuse charity Women's Aid.

The remaining free subscriptions of the Extra app will be available for one year on a first-come, first-served basis to residents in the Warsop area. Anyone interested should email safestreeets@mansfield.gov.uk.

Portfolio Holder for Wellbeing, Health, and Safer Communities, Councillor Angie Jackson, said:

"This technology is available at your fingertips. I would encourage anyone who feels they need help to stay safe to download this app. For those who feel more vulnerable and need additional support, the Extra version will give them peace of mind that there is somebody available in times of need."

"I hope that this app, along with the other Safer Streets measures in place, will lead to a greater sense of safety and wellbeing among the residents of Warsop, particularly women and girls."

Anyone can download the basic Hollie Guard app free from the App Store or Google Play.

The app acts as a discreet panic button that can be activated in stealth mode by shaking it or tapping it without indicating to those around that a user is on their phone.

It tracks the users' precise location in real-time so that if they activate an alert, the app pinpoints a location and sends details to a user's chosen emergency contacts.

It also activates the phone's camera and microphone to capture evidence. A user's emergency contacts can access these recordings in real time.

The recordings are not stored on the user's phone but on cloud-based secure servers for future use as evidence.

The app also has a timer function that enables users facing a potentially dangerous meeting or situation to set a specific countdown. If a user marks themselves as safe, the countdown is deactivated. If it is not de-activated, an alert will automatically be sent once the countdown reaches its limit.

Another feature of the app is being able to log a journey. Users set a start and end point. The app then monitors a user's journey and alerts their nominated contacts, and once they mark they have safely arrived, it triggers an alert.

The Extra paid-for version of the app also sends any panic button alerts to a control centre staffed 24/7 by a professional police-approved monitoring team, who will respond if app users are in danger or if a user's emergency contacts are unable to respond.

All app users can choose when to share their location and have control over their data.

The Hollie Gazzard Trust developed the app to protect women and men from possible danger. The Trust was set up by the parents and sister of Hollie Gazzard, who was murdered by an ex-partner in 2014 at her place of work in Gloucester.

The app aims to complement other elements of a £300,000 Safer Streets scheme in the Warsop area.

It is part of a wider £3m campaign funded by the government via the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner for Nottinghamshire for projects across the city and county.

Nottinghamshire Police & Crime Commissioner Caroline Henry said:



"Preventing violence against women and girls is one of my top priorities in the Make Notts Safe Police and Crime Plan because females are so disproportionately affected by violence."

"Safer Streets funding gives us a unique opportunity to put in place a range of measures to tackle this problem and help women and girls feel safer when they are out in public."

"The free offer of the Hollie Guard app is just another example of thinking outside the box and ensuring we've got all angles covered when it comes to being safe - and feeling safe. It gives users the peace of mind that they have help at hand if they need it."

In the Mansfield District, these initiatives are being delivered in partnership with Mansfield District Council, the police and other support agencies.

The crime-busting measures in Warsop include 11 new state-of-the-art CCTV cameras which can rotate to give a 360-degree street view.

Some use the latest technology to act as a safe point. These safe points are monitored 24 hours a day and will allow people in distress to press a button on the camera column which gives them direct access to the council's CCTV control room to ask for help

New automatic number plate recognition cameras have also been added, and street lighting has been improved in parts of the neighbourhood.

The scheme also supports families and youth work to help prevent anti-social behaviour by encouraging young people to make alternative life choices and offering them diversionary activities.

GARDENING UPDATE

Top tips to help you get the best from your summer garden and prepare for the coming season.

General Tasks and garden maintenance

Water thoroughly once or twice a week rather than little and often - this encourages plants to put down roots in search of water rather than coming up to the surface. Remember, though, that containers and hanging baskets need watering every day and sometimes even twice a day if it is hot and windy.

For recently planted large shrubs or trees, leave a hose trickling around the base for an hour. The same goes for established plants in very dry periods - pay particular attention to camellias, rhododendrons, azaleas and hydrangeas which will abort next season's flowers if they get too dry. Mulch around the roots when moist to help avoid this. Recently planted hedges are best watered with a trickle hose (a length of old hose punctured with little holes) left running for an hour or so.

Ensure trees or shrubs planted in the last couple of years on lawns or in areas of rough grass have a circle of clear earth around them - this must be kept clear or grass will prevent essential moisture getting through. Mulching with bark or compost will help.

Water is a precious commodity - instigate good practices such as using kitchen and bath water (as long as it is neither too dirty, greasy nor full of detergent) for watering, collect rainwater in butts. Avoid using tap water for lime-hating plants such as camellias, rhododendrons and azaleas - they will not thank you for it!

The key to successful planting, whether it be a shrub, tree, perennial or bedding plant is to water in well. Soak the rootball in a bucket until no air bubbles come to the surface, dig the planting hole, fill with water and allow to drain away. Place the plant in the hole, fill with soil, firm gently and water well with a watering can - this will give the plant a huge advantage over one planted with a dry rootball in a dry hole and watered only on the surface.

Hoe beds and borders to get rid of annual weeds, like bitter cress and chickweed. If it's dry, attack perennial weeds like ground elder and the like with systemic weed killer painted onto the leaves and trail tips of bindweed into jam jars full of the same. Remember systemic weed killers are indiscriminate and will kill anything they contact. If you don't have time to do this, at least cut the culprits down to prevent them from setting seed.

Keep your pond topped up with fresh water - a build up of algae in warm weather can be toxic, if not fatal, for animals.

Birds

As summer wears on and the ground hardens, it becomes more difficult for birds to forage for food. So do please put out food to supplement their diet and help build reserves for winter.

Flowers and containers

Divide old clumps of bearded irises and replant. Chop oriental poppies, lupins, delphiniums and geraniums right down to the ground once they have finished flowering - be brave and be brutal - the new leaves will be an ornament and some may flower again. Support tall delphinium stems with individual canes.

Cheat and fill any gaps in your borders with container-grown perennials. Dahlias will keep colour going until the first frosts so are a great autumn brightener in mixed borders. Pick sweet peas regularly - this is in effect early deadheading and will ensure continued flowering. Remember sweet peas are thirsty plants so keep them well watered.



Lawns

Keep mowing your lawn but raise the height of your blades if the weather remains hot. Feed established lawns if you haven't already done so with a summer lawn feed. If your lawn is mossy or full of weeds, use a feed with mosskiller or weedkiller, although this will also kill any wild flowers. If you have the lot, use combined feed, weed and mosskiller!

Add your grass clippings to the compost heap in shallow layers. A huge dollop will only turn slimy and spoil your compost.

Don't let newly laid lawns dry out in hot weather - water in the evenings and if there is a heat wave, consider leaving the lawn longer than usual just to help it through the hot weather.

If you are planning to seed a new lawn in the autumn, start preparing the area to allow the earth time to settle.

As the nation welcomes King Charles III to the throne, will we see new hope for our natural world?

King Charles III has been a leading figure in his work to protect the environment and encourage us all to take more notice of the natural beauty we have on our doorstep – our natural world needs more people on its side!

On Warsop's doorstep is an abundance of countryside walks and green spaces, something we hope you share our passion for protecting. We are looking to welcome new members to join Sherwood Forest FoE to help in the important job of protecting our green world, for future generations to enjoy as much as we do today. We are facing a triple whammy of climate crisis, biodiversity crisis and pollution but it is never too late to change things for the better. The action needed to start putting this right and create a low carbon society would be positively beneficial, improving life for 90% of us through improved, well-insulated homes, cleaner air, cleaner, cheaper energy, more green urban spaces and quality public transit, with all the skilled jobs needed to create and maintain it.

So why haven't we done this already?

According to Professor Kevin Anderson, climate scientist at Manchester University, those who influence policy and decision-making are the other (richest) 10%, who create 52% of greenhouse gas emissions from more excessive lifestyles – basically, those running the show benefit most from things staying as they are! His paper, "Getting real: what would serious climate action look like?" on sgr.org.uk, is well worth a read. We can all change things for the better by cutting our carbon footprints and pollution, plant more greenery and prioritise protecting the declining nature around us.

Most importantly, we need to demand more effective action from those in charge!

Our group has been busy since our last article. We have:

- Worked with Feel Good Gardens, near Sherwood Pines, to organise and run courses on growing wildflower meadows, led by Andy Hollis of Ecologic.



Feel Good Gardens

- Andy also held a session especially for local schoolchildren, giving a talk and leading themed activities on wildflowers and planting to help wildlife – whether it was the fresh air or Andy's flair for plants, the kids loved it! They sowed wildflower seeds which have all germinated, been potted on and are ready for planting in the wildflower meadow being created.



Wildflower courses

- Produced an information leaflet as part of the United for Warm Homes campaign. Friends of the Earth website, "50 tips to save money on energy bills" has lots of info too.
- Worked with the Warsop Footpaths group to produce a leaflet for residents of the new Stonebridge estate, introducing them to the wildlife of the Hills and Holes SSSI's and locality, to hopefully enlist their help to protect and nurture the natural area.
- Given away free native wildflower seeds, still available from Allotment Box on Church Street and Mansfield Refillery on High Street which include our leaflets on reducing emissions and plastic waste, plus helping pollinators.
- Given a talk to a local school's "eco warrior" group and handed out FoE Nature packs. Again, the children were incredible, so enthusiastic.



- Published regular articles in Roundabout magazine & Sherwood Life.
- Continued to post on Facebook about the latest climate science and wildlife situation, plus current campaigns and actions people can easily join in with.
- Written to local MP's raising relevant issues and encouraged our supporters to do the same

We have lots of ideas for future projects:

- A website with links to latest climate science, group information, relevant campaigns, etc.
- The wildlife planting project along the riverside at Stonebridge is still in the pipeline
- Possibly helping Warsop In Bloom plant for wildlife, to "green up" local urban areas
- We would love to create a team to take our message on nurturing wildlife to local schools
- Engage with local authorities when consulting on Local Plans and Neighbourhood Plans
- Running a workshop on "How to reduce your energy costs", involving Solar Panel, Air Source Heat Pumps and Infra-Red heating suppliers.

Why we do what we do -

A quick rundown of the latest climate science

The planet is warming, faster than ever:

- The rate of warming has tripled over the last 20 years (NASA/CERES)
- Heat trapped is now equivalent to a million Hiroshima bombs exploding every day!
- Global average temperature has warmed by 1.2C, on land by 1.7C (NASA/GISTEMP)

Oceans absorb 90% of this heat causing:

- Record sea temperatures: highest ever in April at 21.1C (NOAA)
- Polar ice is melting, slowing ocean circulation
- Faster warming Arctic, impacting the jet stream so more unseasonal heat/cold/drought
- Sea level rise of 8-9 inches over last 140 years, and accelerating (NASA Earth Observatory)
- Every 1C of warming means 7% more water vapour, fuelling bigger storms (NASA)

Why is this happening?

- Earth's climate is sensitive - meteors, volcanoes, solar activity have all changed past climate
- Humans have added 1.4 trillion tonnes of CO2 to the atmosphere since 1750's!
- Greenhouse gases (GHG's) trap solar energy instead of it bouncing back out to space
- Add all GHG's together and levels have doubled since pre-industrial How hot will it get?
- Earth won't stop warming until it reaches "equilibrium" temperature (Hansen et al 2022)
- Equilibrium is when solar energy hitting Earth equals energy being reflected back out
- At today's GHG levels, equilibrium temperature is 6-10C of warming, with 3-4C this century
- The more GHG's we keep emitting, the higher that eventual temperature will be
- Stopping emissions and reducing CO2 in the air will lower it
- Earth won't cool down for centuries because of warmed oceans and melting polar ice

What impacts will this have?

- Food, water supplies, shelter and habitat will be affected, for humans and wildlife alike
- Speed and intensity of change is causing more species to go extinct
- Most humans will struggle to survive 3-4C of global average temperature rise
- Record-breaking heat waves, disruption and fatalities are happening at just 1.2C warming

What can we do about it?

- Slash emissions and leave carbon in the ground
- Reduce CO2 through nature restoration
- Tackle overconsumption
- Adapt and prepare for the changes coming our way
- Tell our leaders it's time to listen to the scientists, not the hedge fund managers

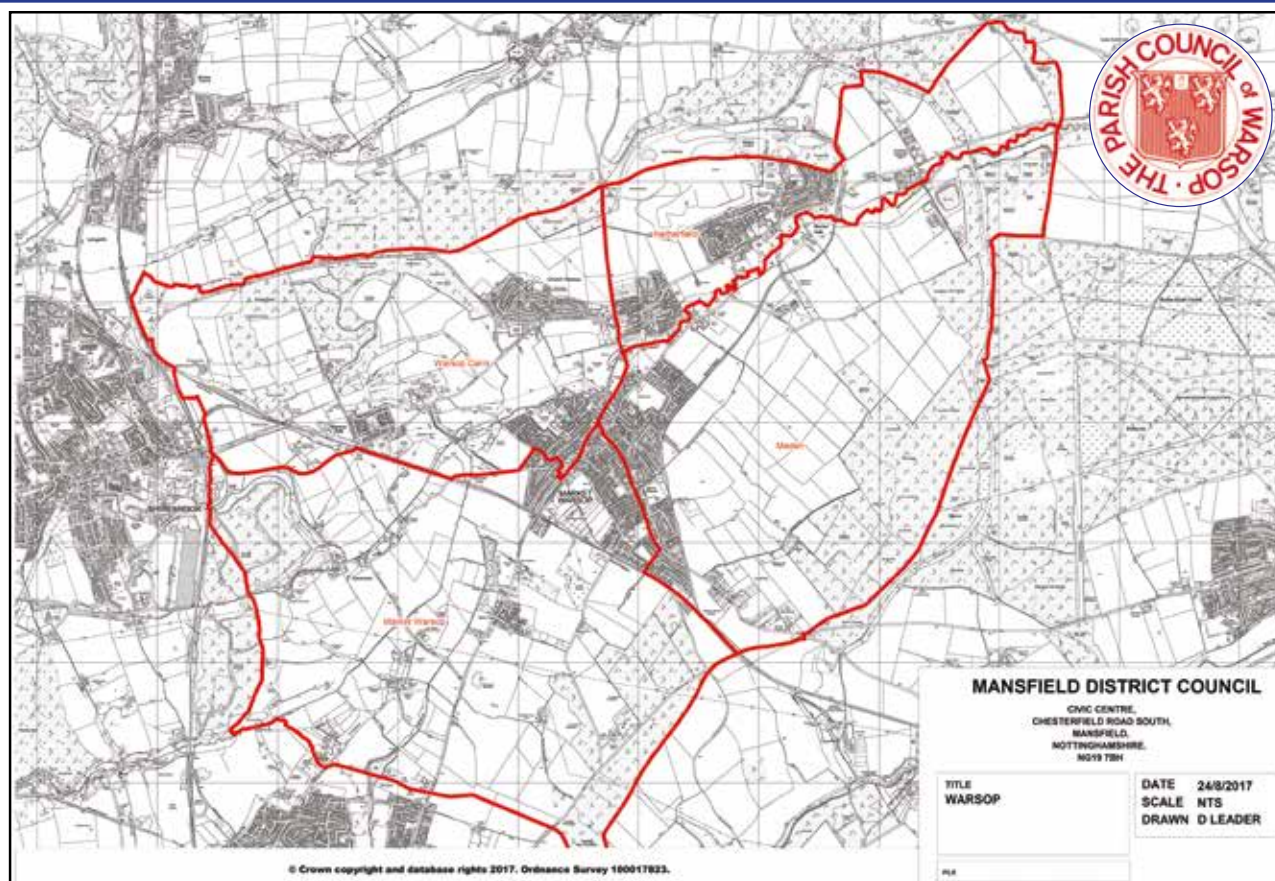
Events will be running again this year meaning the car park will be closed on those occasions. Events help to bring much needed footfall to Warsop Parish businesses.

Streetlights

If you have noticed that a streetlight is not working properly or at all then use this link to report it. Each streetlight will have a number on the column. One of the biggest comments that enters both of our inboxes are issues with the highways and we know there are issues. Winter has unfortunately caused some major damage and we fully recognise they are in a poor state.

However, Warsop has not been forgotten. Over the last couple of months 450 potholes have been repaired, 70 streetlights repaired and 907 gullies have been cleansed. Wood Lane is down to be resurfaced in the next financial year, and we're now embarking on a 'Recovery Plan' with £3m of additional funding to help improve the situation. We know there is more to be done, alongside this work that is already happening.

We both, jointly, recently held a public meeting for Spion Kop attended by residents, VIA, local Councillors and the Police, following a petition we presented at County Hall. They are looking at ways to make it safer, including more signage for the concealed entrance, they are looking at a feasibility study for a crossing at the south end of the village and we will update residents when all the studies are done. Once the studies are completed, we will organise another meeting to update residents.

Bethan recently donated some of her councillor divisional fund money to the Parish Council for them to organise a Speed Watch for the whole of the Parish. This will benefit all areas of the Parish. We know speeding is an issue through all the villages, but they need volunteers who will need to be trained to operate them across the Parish. If you want to get involved, please contact either Bethan or the Parish Council.

We have both been contacted regarding Riverbank Medical. It is the Integrated Care Board (ICB) who are ultimately responsible for providing a GP service for residents. Together we have both been in contact with them and we have been pushing for them to give more information as we know residents are worried. We have been told that no one will be without a GP, but there may be changes. Residents will receive a letter about the changes and another letter to inform them of their new service, they don't need to do anything and should continue to use Riverbank until it closes.

There are some really positive things going on in Warsop and we are getting some major investment with the new Leisure and Health Hub following funding we secured from Government. There's further Government investment to rebuild the Meden School too, after a long campaign to secure funding for improvements. Fantastic news for local children and families. We have a high street that is bucking the trend, with new shops and investment, but there is always more to do. Working together, we can make sure Warsop continues to get investment and the recognition it deserves.'

The money can be used for equipment, promotions and materials as well as revenue and capital but must benefit the community directly.

"It was so pleasing to see that we had many more worthwhile applications to the 500 Fund yet again, so it was tough to choose which should benefit this time around."

"Mansfield is fortunate to have so many community groups, charities and organisations who are working hard to support residents and children in the district, despite these challenging times we find ourselves in currently."

"Their work is invaluable, and I am proud to be doing my bit to support them."

Applications to the 500 Fund are approved by a panel of officers and the Mayor. In the last four years, a total of £25,078 has been donated.

Don't Pay for Your Brown Bin? Mansfield council can't take it away

Residents are being reminded that if they have a brown bin, they must pay for the collection with Mansfield District Council.

If you find that your bin has been tagged on brown bin week, you need to renew your subscription online for your collections to restart. If no payment is made, the council will collect the brown bin from the property and reallocate it elsewhere.

The council empties around 19,000 brown bins fortnightly from March to November and once during December. You can check what you can put in your brown bin, sign up for bin reminders and unsubscribe to our garden waste service online at www.mansfield.gov.uk/gardenwaste.

To make things easy for our crews, the council also advises residents to ensure all bins are clearly labelled with their house number or name.

Executive Mayor of Mansfield Andy Abrahams said:

"At the heart of a clean and sustainable Mansfield community is your commitment to responsible waste management."

"Kerbside garden waste collections are underway for those who have paid for their subscription, and to ensure our customers get the service they pay for and that the service can remain as efficient as possible, I want to remind residents if they have a brown bin that they need to pay for it."

"By renewing your garden waste collection subscription, you play a vital role in preserving our environment. All the garden waste that we collect is taken for composting locally."

You can register for the £32-a-year brown bin collection in just a few clicks at www.mansfield.gov.uk/gardenwaste.

Sign up for an annual direct debit payment, which is the easiest way to ensure continuity of the service from year to year, on the council's customer portal. One-off payments by card can also be made.

You can also sign up for bin collection reminders on the council website and will be notified to put your bin out the day before it is due to be collected.

Bins should be put out by 6am on the collection day and removed from the pavement no later than 12 noon the next day.

Use your brown bin to recycle:

- grass cuttings
- hedge trimmings
- leaves
- small branches and twigs
- plants
- weeds
- cut flowers

Fly-tipping Costs Mansfield Council Tax Payers £100k

Mansfield District Council has urged people to dispose of their waste responsibly after more than 2,000 incidents of fly-tipping cost nearly £100,000 to deal with in the district last year.



The council investigates each fly-tip, and the authority issued 12 £400 Fixed Penalty Notices for either fly-tipping or failing in a householder or business's duty of care during 2022/23.

Figures shared with the council's Overview and Scrutiny (Place) Committee last month showed there were a total of 2,133 incidents in 2022/23. According to estimates based on various load size calculations, these cost £99,054 to clear up.

In 2021/22 they recorded 1,259 incidents which cost a total of £60,535 to clear.

Although this represents a big increase, the council has allowed for some underreporting of the incident figures while it integrated a new system in 2021/22 to record the data.

The report also revealed that the vast majority of fly tips were on public highways, footpaths, bridleways and on council land.

The most commonly dumped item was general household waste. One incident can represent anything from a single black bag of rubbish to a whole transit van load.

The council has a duty to clear fly tips on public land. They can be reported on the council website at <https://www.mansfield.gov.uk/report> or by calling 01623 463463.

Executive Mayor Andy Abrahams said: "Residents are sick and tired of fly-tipping blighting their neighbourhoods."

"The dramatic increase in incidents represents an epidemic that we need to get on top of. Council taxpayers effectively pay for this £100,000 bill to clean up and investigate environmental crimes. Think of what we could do with that money instead!"

"It is the equivalent cost of creating a brand new play area or installing ten large items of play equipment to improve existing play areas. It could resurface and refurbish eight of our tennis courts or buy 200 new dual waste litter bins for the district or 285 benches."

"I want to assure residents we are going to increase our efforts to catch the perpetrators as the collective costs of clearing up all of the rubbish is astronomical, and the fines aren't a sufficient deterrent."

Every household and business has a legal duty of care to ensure waste from their property is disposed of responsibly. If they employ someone to remove waste, they should always check they are a licensed waste carrier and take verifiable details from them.

If they fail to do this and the waste removed from their property is then fly-tipped by the person they paid to remove it, it could be the householder or business fined or prosecuted for failing in their duty of care.

To help tackle fly-tipping, the council offers free bulky waste collections for households on Oak Tree Lane Estate, Bull Farm Estate, Bellamy Road Estate and parts of Portland ward and Warsop, Church Warsop, Warsop Vale and Meden Vale.

Residents in these priority neighbourhoods qualify for one free collection per year for up to three standard items, such as beds, mattresses, wardrobes, and bagged waste.

They can be booked online in the usual way on the council website via the form at <https://www.mansfield.gov.uk/xfp/forms> with no charge to pay for households with postcodes that qualify.

Customers will need an email address to create an account on the customer portal to access the booking form. Bookings for people without internet access can also be made by calling 01623 463463.

Paid-for bulky waste collections are £13 for one item or £24 for two or three items. Each additional item on top of this, up to a maximum of 10 items, is £11 each.

Electrical items, including fridges, freezers, TVs, washing machines, cookers, microwaves and upholstered furniture, need specialist disposal and are charged separately at £17.50 each.

The council cannot collect American-style fridge freezers or hazardous waste, including paint, rubble, tyres, asbestos or gas bottles. However, the Household Waste Recycling Centre at Warsop can accept paint which community groups can then reuse.

Households of six or more people may qualify for an additional general waste bin. Extra recycling bins can be provided to any sized household on request. More information can be found on the council website at <https://www.mansfield.gov.uk/bins-recycling/bin-sizes-additional-bins.page>.



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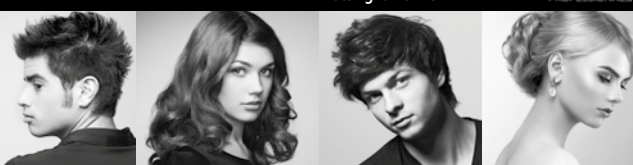

Each newsletter brings news of the achievements of our students outside of their studies and it is always wonderful to hear about their lives beyond Meden School.

This half term there have been more excellent sporting achievements. 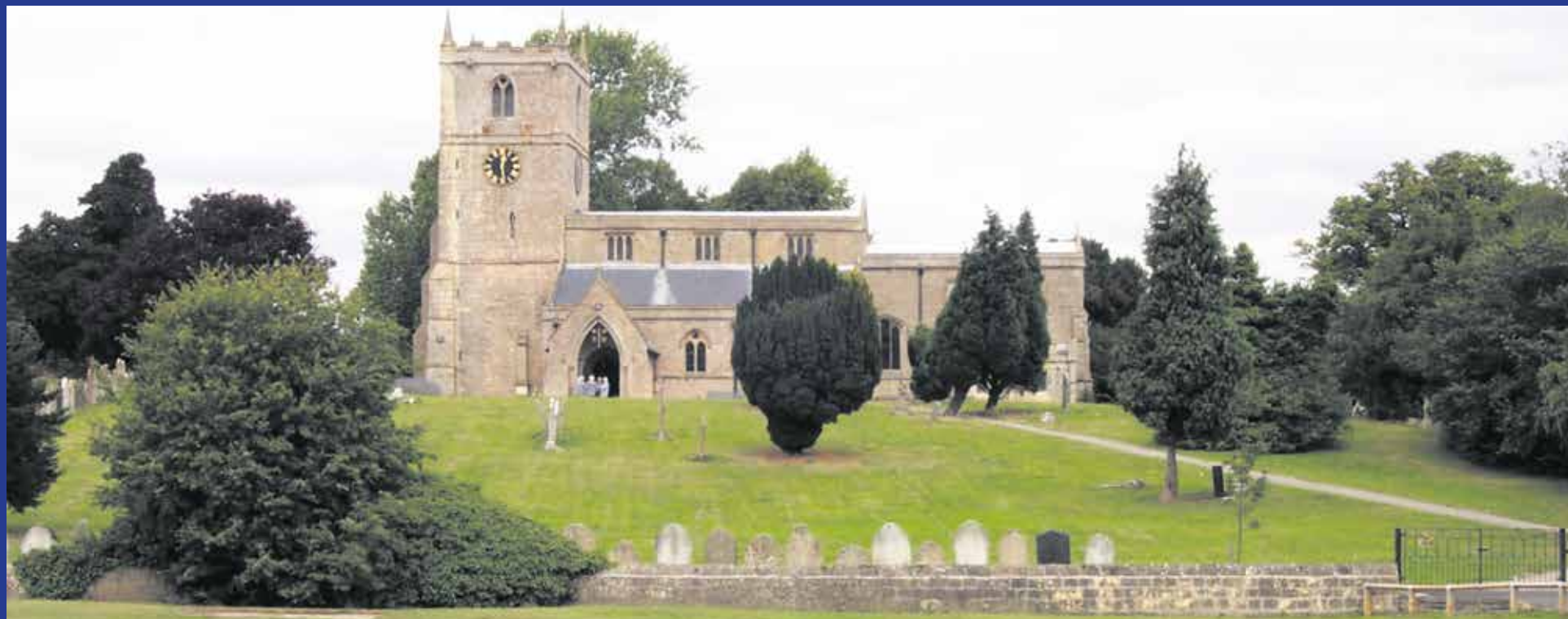

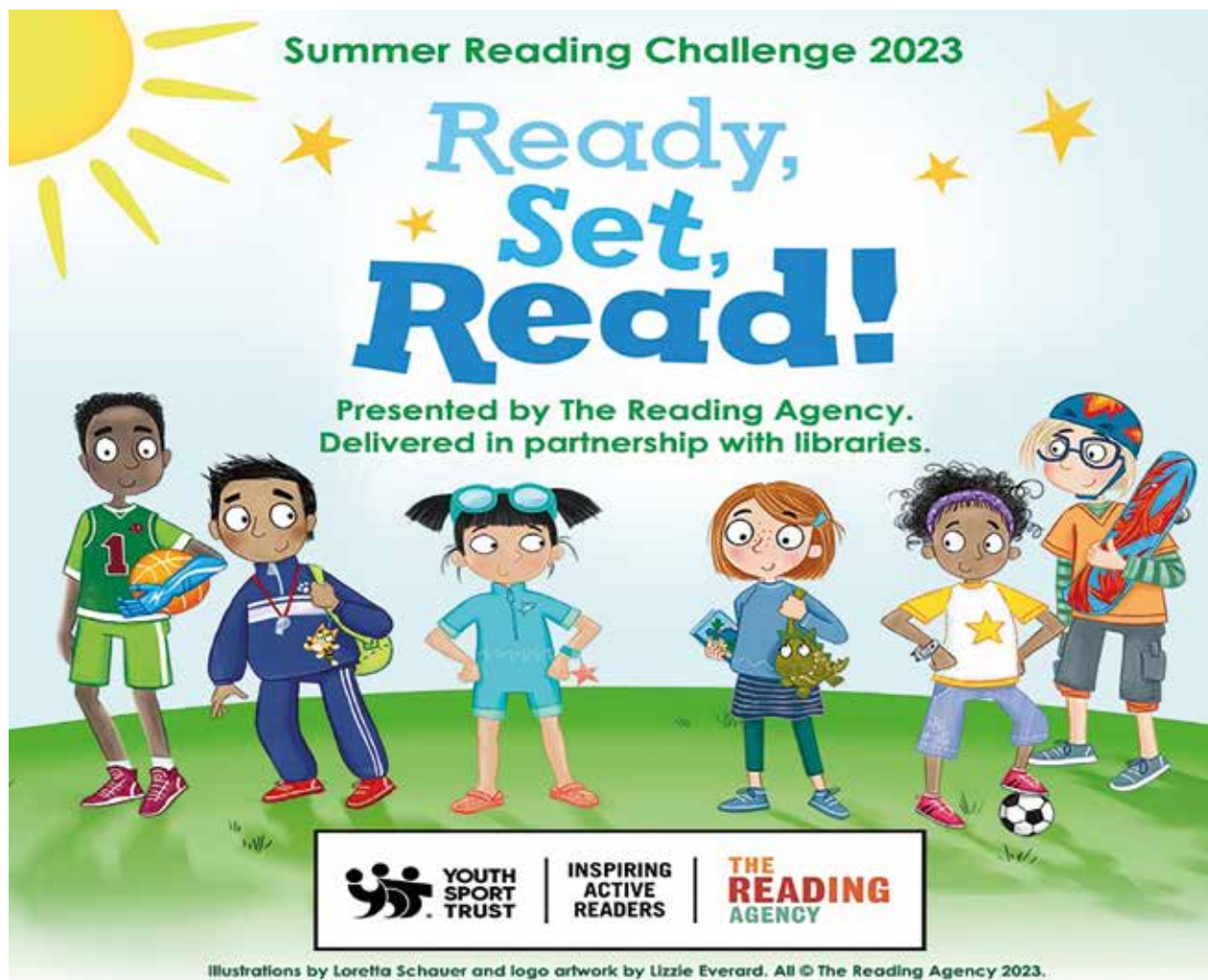
park, managing the live entertainment, selling programmes, and much more.

Footpath & Countryside Group

Summer is here! If you are looking for ideas for some walks around our local area, take a look at the Walking and Publications sections of our: warsopcountryside.wordpress.com website.

If we get another heatwave a walk in the woods will be several degrees cooler and if we get more extreme temperatures like last year an early morning walk will allow you to enjoy the best part of the day.

But if the weather is cool and damp, think back to the 40 degree temperatures of last year, put on a coat and enjoy the fresh smells of the green countryside!



A slow walk on a summer day is a fine time for viewing butterflies. There are at least ten species that you may see around here but you don't need to know their names to enjoy watching them!

At this time of year the Warsop Footpaths & Countryside Group's work involves mowing along Warsop's public footpaths and bridleways.

Get in touch if you would like to join us for a couple of hours in the countryside on a Thursday morning. Recently there have been some work sessions when we have not have enough volunteers to complete the planned tasks.

It is possible that we will not be able to complete the work that we have been doing for the past 26 years if nobody new joins us.

In May we completed our twelfth annual water vole survey along a kilometre stretch of the River Meden between the Mill Dam and Stone Bridge in Warsop.

There is less evidence of water vole activity than in recent years and activity appears to be restricted to only two areas. Ten years ago there were over thirty spots along the riverbanks with evidence of water vole activity, this year we found only seven.

Another important summer task is controlling Himalayan balsam along our waterways. This invasive non-native annual plant can dominate riverbanks. When it dies back in autumn it leaves the banks exposed and liable to erosion which also causes silt problems.

The purple flowers may look attractive but it is important that they are not allowed to seed so if you are fortunate enough to own land with a waterside boundary please pull up these plants. Our volunteers will be checking over 5 miles of waterway within Warsop and we expect to remove several thousand balsam plants.

Great progress has been made in eliminating this plant upstream from the Mill Dam but downstream it continues to be a series problem.

It is pleasing to see the tree and hedgerow planting that has been carried out in the parish this year.

A lot of whips have been planted in gaps in the hedgerows between Assarts Farm and the forest and we helped with planting a new woodland at Warsop Vale as part of the 'Trees for Life' project.

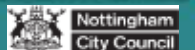
